SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT FOR ALL SOUTH CAROLINA CHESS PLAYERS

MAKE PLANS TO ATTEND THE 1960 CLOSED SOUTH CAROLINA STATE CHESS CHAMPIONSHIP, AT THE Y.M.C.A., SUMTER, S.C., NOV. 25, 26, 27. THE FRIDAY, SATURDAY AND SUNDAY FOLLOWING THANKSGIVING DAY. THE FIRST ROUND STARTS AT 1 P.M., FRIDAY, NOV. 25.

The State Championship will be a 5-round Swiss System affair. The first two rounds will be Friday afternoon and night. The second two rounds will be Saturday morning and afternoon. The last round will be on Sunday morning.

All persons stationed within S.C. at naval or military establishments will be considered as bona fide S.C. residents and so will be eligible to compete in this tournament. Write to the HONORARY MANAGER, SUMTER, S.C. for motel accommodations for the two nights that you will stay in Sumter. The Sumter Y.M.C.A. will not have any rooms available at the time of the tournament, having already made commitments for all their vacant rooms far in advance.

All persons taking part in the tournament must also be members of the U.S. Chess Federation. The \$5 fee for USCF membership will bring you the bi-weekly magazine CHESS LIFE and an official published rating for every USCF member. An entry fee of \$3 will be charged all those taking part in this tournament, to which will be added a \$2 fee for membership in the S.C. Chess Association. Members of the S.C. Chess Association receive the BULLETIN of the Association. All monies from the \$3 and \$2 fees mentioned above are applied to the handsome trophies to be awarded to the winner, runner-up, S.C. State Junior Champion (21 years of age or under) and possibly there will be other trophies if the entrance into the tourney is large enough to bring in money for them.

HAROLD A. MOUZON, JR., winner of the S.C. Closed S.C. Championship for 1959 at the Francis Marion Hotel in Charleston, will not be able to defend his title this year, unfortunately, as he no longer qualifies as a bona fide S.C. resident. Since around last May his new home has been in Washington, D.C., where he has been appointed a management intern in the Bureau of Labor-Management Reports of the U.S. Dept. of Labor. Previously our champion had been working as a Federal Revenue Officer with headquarters in Columbia, S.C., from which point of vantage he provided a welcome stimulus to members of the Columbia Chess Club. Mr. Mouzon was selected for his new position in Washington on the basis of achievement in competitive civil service examinations.

## \*\*\*CARL B. DOVER OF ORLANDO, FLORIDA WINS 1960 TWO CAROLINAS CHAMPIONSHIP

TWO CAROLINAS OPEN CHAMPIONSHIP, SKY TERRACE ROOM, FRANCIS MARION HOTEL  
CHARLESTON, S.C. JULY 29, 30, 31, 1960.

Again and again in our beloved game we see youth triumphant, a recent case in point being that of the mighty Tal over the veteran Botvinnik. Carl Dover is only 19, but he came through with  $5\frac{1}{2}$  points out of a possible 6. The well-known master, Glen E. Hartleb of Washington, D.C. was the runner-up with 5 wins. Five players were tied for third place with  $4\frac{1}{2}$  points each. The outstanding master, Norman T. Whitaker of Washington, D.C., served as Tournament Director. Mr. Whitaker would doubtless have won the tournament if he had cared to participate, but he had just recently returned from considerable chess activity in Europe and so felt that managing our smoothly-run tournament would be a sufficient task for one man to handle. Our hearty thanks to Mr. Whitaker, who handled our tournament with the utmost skill and diplomacy.

At the end of the 5th round Oliver C. Hutaff of Wilmington, N.C. and Carl Dover were leading the field with scores of  $4\frac{1}{2}$  each. These two were therefore automatically paired for the 6th and last round, which meant that the winner of this contest was assured of first place in the tournament. If this crucial game had resulted in a draw, however, then there would have been a three-way tie for first place among Hartleb, Dover and Hutaff.

In the following listing of tournament results no tie-breaking points are used. The reason for not using any such tie-breaking device is given in a later article by Norman Whitaker.

#### CARL B. DOVER — 1960 TWO CAROLINAS CHAMPION

Carl B. Dover was born Feb. 20, 1941 in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. The original family name was Bellman, the name of his father, who was born in Hamburg, Germany. Although Carl Dover's home address is in Orlando, Florida, he is at present extremely busy as a student at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in Cambridge, Mass., preparing himself to take up a career as an engineer, or possibly as a physicist.

Dover is a member of the Orlando Chess Club. In 1958 he came out second in the North Florida Open Junior Championship, and took first place in the Junior Championship. In March 1959 he took second place in the West Florida Open Championship, an event which was won by Master Norman T. Whitaker, and won the Junior title. This year (1960) Dover tied for first place in the Florida State Championship, also winning the Florida Junior Championship. In postal chess he is now in the finals of the 1957 U.S. Junior Correspondence Championship in the Correspondence Chess League of America. He has a score of 8 to 1, with 1 game left to complete.

Dover is majoring in physics at M.I.T., with heavy emphasis on math.

He has also dabbled in philately and conchology at times. In his younger days he used to pursue butterflies and young-elusive nymphets. He also used to play in table tennis tourneys, picking up an occasional trophy.

Our Two-Carolinas champion was tabbed as a "young genius" in grade school, but soon dispelled this myth by engaging in a number of fights.

He learned to play chess in 1955 - played much with Bob Ludlow, then Southern Junior Champion and now Florida State Title Holder. This early competition with a strong expert led to quick improvement. Competition in his first big tournament, the 1956 Florida State Championship, proved a dismal failure for him with his minus score of  $2\frac{1}{2}$ - $4\frac{1}{2}$ , but his fiery determination finally brought him to winning his first big tournament.

Here are Dover's own reflections on the Carolinas Open:

- (1) BIGGEST OBSTACLE - game with fellow Orlandoan Charles Stallings -after getting by this one he felt good.
- (2) HARDEST GAME - against Ronald Simpson of Fayetteville, N.C. in the second round. Dover lost about four pounds during time pressure
- (3) MOST TENSION - obviously against Oliver C. Hutaff of Wilmington N.C. in the last round. Fortunately Hutaff was visibly more affected than Dover.

#### TIE-BREAKING IN SWISS-TYPE TOURNAMENTS - SOME OBSERVATIONS BY

VETERAN MASTER NORMAN T. WHITAKER

All tie-breaking by points is fundamentally unsound. Nothing in U.S. chess has caused so much dissatisfaction.

I understand that Reshevsky, our best known player, will never again enter a Swiss-type contest in which ties are broken by some artificial formulae.

The matter was briefly discussed at the July Carolinas Open, which I directed. I explained: Assume A is directed to play six consecutive opponents. Each time A returns with a win. The same plan is followed with player B. Each has won 6 games, but it is announced by some hocus-pocus computation that B wins because he has defeated stronger opponents!

Our readers will detect the fallacy of such nonsense. It is that a player has no control or voice in whom he plays. So, in the above instance, it would be wrong to penalize A and place him second. He won every game, and did 100% of the tasks assigned to him by the director.

Past tie-breaking in U.S. Opens leaves a sorry picture: New Orleans 1954; Evans  $69\frac{1}{4}$  (or possibly it was  $67\frac{1}{2}$ ), Pomar  $\frac{1}{4}$  point below, whatever that means. In Cleveland in 1957 it was formally announced that Bisguier had won and that Fischer had come in second. This news went to the press, long distance phone calls were made, etc. Then by some hidden arithmetical nonsense an hour later, the result was changed to Fischer first, etc.

With disgust, some of us recall the "mess" (a good word for it) that occurred in Long Beach, Calif. in 1955. Several systems were

tried to break the tie between Rossolimo and Reshevsky, the first prize being a \$3000 Buick and the second prize being \$1000. Those who know what happened can sympathize and admire the decision of Reshevsky never to compete again when such tie-breaking is permitted.

I take the position, as do hundreds of other chess enthusiasts, who want to see fairness, that prizes should be equally divided between, or among, those who have the same score.

If a sensible system of breaking ties by points could have been devised years ago we would not now have a dozen systems: Sonneborn-Berger (perhaps invented as early as 1885), Coons, Harkness, Solkoff of North Carolina, etc.

It was not enough to have the original Solkoff system. It has been macerated, altered and corrected so that now its inventor would hardly recognize his brain-child.

The latest name for this scheme is said to be "the Solkoff, tie-breaking, revised, modernized, stream-lined, up-to-date, super-duper, modified and revitalized, system!"

#### SELECTED ENDGAMES

Chess book reviewers regard this August 1960 release by Norman Whitaker and Glen Hartleb as an outstanding contribution to the theory and practice of endings. These two American analysts and writers have produced a 320-page book of 365 endings culled from thousands. Many of the positions are taken from actual master games. The others appear to us to have great practical value.

The book also contains a discussion of endings and a bibliography or list of books on chess endings. We were astonished to learn that about 300 books have been written on endings alone; they were written in many contries and in many languages. The list of Two Carolinas Champions at the bottom of the preceding page is to replace and supplement the last one of this type, which appeared in the Sept.-Nov. 1959 issue of the BULLETIN. That list contained several glaring errors and was in part based upon insufficient or wrongly-given information. It is now definitely established that our first tournament for the championship of the Two Carolinas was held in 1951. It is also quite certain that no tournament was held in 1952. In order to make sure of the year the first tournament was held, your Editor went to see Ben Rudich for the purpose of seeing what date was on the trophy awarded to this first winner. Sure enough, the year inscribed on the trophy is "1951", so that settles it once and for all. Ben Rudich (who, incidentally, is not playing chess any more) is under the impression that no tournament for the Two Carolinas Championship was held in 1952.

NORTH CAROLINA CHESS ASSOCIATION OFFICERS

At the annual meeting of the USCF affiliated North Carolina Chess Association in Charlotte last Labor Day, the following were elected officers for two-year terms: Dr. Norman M. ERNEST E. HOENCK -- 1960 CHARLESTON CHAMP.

The 1960 Championship of the City of Charleston (S.C.) has been won by Ernest E. Hoenck of North Charleston. Hoenck, who was 1955 S.C. State Champ, has of late usually been the runner-up in the Charleston City Championship, being always a point or two behind the mighty Harold A. Mouzon, Jr. For the last year Harold has not been a Charleston resident, so that the only obstacle to Hoenck's taking first place has been removed. The runner-up in the Charleston Championship for 1960 is Tad Lisicki, pronounced lee-sheet-skee, with the accent on the middle syllable. Lisicki has now been with the Charleston Club for almost a year. "Lis" in the Polish language means "fox" and his surname suggests fox procedure on the chess board. This man is destined to make a name for himself in South Carolina chess.

gave the best years of his life to Converse College in Spartanburg.  
He is now deceased.

Col. Oliver J. Bond, the 1928 State Champion, was president of The  
Citadel at Charleston. As far as is known, chess was his only hobby  
of any importance next to his interest in teaching Chemistry. Until  
his death in 1931 he always kept a class in Chemistry along with his  
many other arduous duties as Citadel President. Oscar Sokol of  
Charleston bought Col. Bond's chess set and board from the latter's  
widow a number of years ago.

Two other former S.C. State Chess Champions are still living in  
Spartanburg. They are Elmer B. Hallman (1930 champion) of 1655  
Rosewood St., Hillcrest, Spartanburg; and Benjamin O. Johnson (1929  
champion) of 441 Connecticut Ave., Spartanburg. E.B. Hallman is  
now 75 years old. A few weeks before the 1933 tournament his only  
daughter was killed in an accident. He did not enter the tournament  
of that year. The only other State Tournament he ever entered was in  
1948, at Columbia, when he delivered over to the present S.C. Asso-  
ciation Secretary, Robert F. Brand, the invaluable records for prac-

tically all State Tournaments held between 1926 and 1933. During the period of the early State Chess Tournaments E.B. Hallman and Edward L. Dashiell (champion in 1931 and 1933) ran a chess column in the Spartanburg Herald for some 18 months. Dashiell is now dead.
