JOHN G. WALLENBURG OF AIKEN WINS 1961 S.C. CHESS CHAMPIONSHIP

Playing superbly against an exceptionally strong field of contestants John G. Wallenburg. 20, won five straight games in five rounds of play to capture the 1961 South Carolina closed chess title. This was Wallenburg's first win of the State Title in a field of 16 contestants, including three former State Champions, Prof. Lanneau Foster, Peter Grant and Max Edelsburg.

This very successful tournament, conducted under the auspices of the South Carolina Chess Association, was held in Columbia on Nov. 24, 35 and 26 at the New Foster School of the Dance, at 4600 Trenholm Road. In comfortable playing quarters generously donated by Prof. Foster the event was thoroughly enjoyed by chess enthusiasts from throughout the state.

Dewey Varn, now in his second year at Furman University, was runner-up. losing only to Wallenburg. Ties for third and fourth places were Lanneau Foster and Norton Jacobi, the latter a student at Coker College in Hartsville. All four were presented trophies as was Joan Varn, the lone contestant of the gentler sex.

At the annual business meeting following presentation of trophies members reelected their present officers: President, Prof. Lanneau L. Foster and Secretary, Prof. Robert F. Brand.

The host club for the 1961 tournament was the Palmetto Chess Club of Columbia. Club meetings are held weekly on Wednesday evenings and are open to the public. Chess players and others interested in learning are invited to attend. For information call the Columbia, S.C. numbers SU 7-2072 or SU 7-3490.

JOHN G. WALLENBURG

Our new State Champion was born in Aiken, S.C. on April 9, 1941. He is now in his Junior year at the University of South Carolina in Columbia and is still undecided as to whether his major will be in Mathematics or in English, since he has enough credits in both fields to swing over into a major in either. His rise to prominence in chess has been very recent, dating only from the summer of 1961. His first appearance in "big-time" chess was at the 1960 Two Carolinas Open in Charleston, where he won only 3 out of 6 games played. Then a year later, in the summer of 1961, he suddenly skyrocketed to prominence by taking third place in the Two Carolinas Open at Southport, N.C., winning 4½ and losing 1½.

DEWEY VARN OF CHARLESTON, after winning second place in the 1961 State Chess Championship, then proceeded to win, for the second time, the S.C. and Charleston GO CHAMPIONSHIP. He was also the 1959 GO Champion, but lost the title in 1960 to Thomas P. Bold.

The game of GO is today very widely played in Japan, and also in China, where it goes under the name of WRI CHI. It is mentioned in old Chinese manuscripts as early as 1000 B.C. Edward Lasker, eminent chess master and America's foremost authority on the game of GO, calls GO the world's "best strategic game including chess." Like chess, GO is a game of pure skill which has occupied the attention of some of the world's greatest minds for ages. Go is a board game like chess, but in all other respects it is entirely unlike chess. GO is a struggle to gain territory, play being alternate on intersections of lines, 19 running each way at right angles to each other. The mentality of the chess player makes him singularly susceptible to GO, and the best place to introduce GO is in a chess club. There are now GO clubs in many of the larger American cities and in Charleston, S.C. All S.C. chess players who are interested in lazrning about the game or in starting a GO CLUB in their community, send  $25\phi$  in stamps for a booklet on the game to Robert F. Brand, Secretary, Charleston GO Club, The Citadel, Charleston, S.C.

!!!! 1962 SOUTH CAROLINA STATE CLOSED CHAMPIONSHIP, HOTEL FORT SUMTER At the annual business meeting following the 1961 S.C. State Closed Championship it was voted by the membership to hold the 1962 State Tourney in Charleston. Robert F. Brand, State Association Secretary, was commissioned to carry out local arrangements in Charleston. Reservations are now completed to hold the 1962 Tourney on the Friday, Saturday and Sunday following Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 23, 24 and 25, in a room on the Mezzanine Floor of the Hotel Fort Sumter. This will make the sixth S.C. State Chess Championship Tournament to be held in Charleston, and the fourth to be held at the Hotel Fort Sumter. Previous tournaments at the Hotel Fort Sumter were in 1927 (won by James Henry Rice, Jr., second State Champion); in 1930 (won by Elmer B. Hallman, still living in Spartanburg); and in 1932(by P.J. Walker of Varnville, winner). The Hotel Fort Sumter is one of Charleston's most distinguished old hostelries. It is primarily a tourists! resort. GET A HIGH SCHOOL CHESS ORGANIZED IN YOUR LOCAL HIGH SCHOOL High schools are the one place where your organizing talents will not be wasted. Young men and women of high school age naturally show an unbounded enthusiasm for the game. When you see your high school authorities about such a club, however, you should emphasize to them that the chess club will inevitably die for lack of attendance if meetings are attempted following completion of regular school hours. The proper way to do this is arrange for any number of clubs of different types to hold their meetings about one hour a week, or even one hour every two weeks, ON SCHOOL TIME. At the beginning of the school year each student signs up for the club of his choice (as for instance Chemistry Club, English Club, Latin Club, Chess Club, Checker Club, etc.). Also, if the student thinks it more advisable, he may sign up for study hall instead of joining a club. Once the student signs up, he is then obliged to attend the club of his choice. We already have four high school chess clubs in South Carolina. See if you can't do something in your community to help along the cause of our beloved game and be of real service to your community at the same time. Then write the story of your organial results to Robert F. Brand, Secretary, S.C. Chess Association, The Citadel, Charleston, S.C. and we will give your club some publicity in a forthcoming issue of the BULLETIN.

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THE SPARTANBURG HIGH SCHOOL CASTLE CHESS CLUB

FORMER S.C. CHESS CHAMPIONSHIPS UNDER THE OLD STATE ASSOCIATION OF 1926—Most of the material used in these historical sketches is taken 33 from the year by year reports of tournaments delivered in 1948 by ELMER B. HALLMAN, former president of the old State Association, to Robert F. Brand, now Secretary of the State Association and Editor of the Bulletin. Your editor has added information which was gleaned from old musty Charleston newspapers. Some of the gray-beards among our present-day players will still remember some of those whose names are given below:

Of the chess players listed above the only one known for a certainty to
be still alive is Mr. Elmer B. Hallman. The great Ambrose Bierce, in his

All players taking part in the tournament mentioned at the beginning of this article were guests of Col. R. John West on a tour of inspection of Fort Moultrie on July 5. The trip was planned an arranged by the Rev. George J. Gongaware, a member of the local chess association.

At the annual business meeting held July 7, 1927, the following officers were elected: Elmer B. Hallman, Spartanburg, President; G.M. Hamilton, Greenville, Vice President; W.B. Simpson, Jr., Columbia, Secretary; Robert A. Lamble, Jr., Charleston, Treasurer; W.R. Hale, Greenville, Honorary President. Presentation of the trophy was made by Col. Oliver J. Bond, President of the Citadel.

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1928 S.C. CHESS CHAMPIONSHIP (3RD ANNUAL EVENT), SUMTER, S.C., JULY 1928

WON BY COL. OLIVER J. BOND, PRESIDENT OF THE CITADEL

The 1928 meeting was held in the Masonic Hall in Sumter, S.C., starting on Monday, July 4. President Elmer B. Hallman of Spartanburg presided and players representing Spartanburg, Greenville, Charleston, Wiggins and Sumter were present.

Play continued from 2 P.M., July 4 until Thursday, July 7th, at midnight, when Col. Oliver J. Bond, Citadel President, from Charleston, defeated E.B. Hallman of Spartabburg, in the finals, and was awarded the silver trophy cup, emblematic of the State Championship. The cup was presented by President Clarence Haynsworth on behalf of the Sumter Chess Club, acting as hosts to the Association.

On Tuesday evening, July 5, a supper was given the visiting chess

players at the Sunset Country Club. C.H. Haynsworth acted as toastmaster. The annual business meeting was held Wednesday morning, July 6th, at which the nominating committee, Messrs, W.R. Parker (died in 1959) and A.S. Volpin made their report. Col. Oliver J. Bond was named as president; Edward L. Dashiell of Spartanburg, Vice-President; L.C. Bryan, Secretary-Treasurer. L.C. Bryan is still living and makes his home in Sumter. Messrs. William B. Whaley of Charleston; James Henry Rice, Jr. of Wiggins; W.R. Hale of Greenville and E. Clarence Haynsworth (died about 1951) were named Honorary Presidents, President Bond later named A.S. Volpin of Greenville, C.H. Haynsworth and James Henry Rice, Jr. as members of the Executive Committee,

Mr. Rice extended an invitation to the Association members to play in the Myrtle Beach Chess Tournament for the Championship of America.

A challenge from the North Carolina Chess Association for an interstate Chess Match at Rockingham, N.C., on the Friday and Saturday following Thanksgiving was accepted and appointment of members of the South Carolina team was left to the Executive Committee.

The annual dues were fixed at 50¢ for each member of the Association. The invitation extended by Mr. A.S. Volpin to hold the next (1929) meeting of the Association in Greenville was unanimously adopted. As it later turned out, however, a change in plans was made and the 1929 meeting was held in the Spartanburg Y.M.C.A.

A rising vote of thanks was given Mr. Elmer B. Hallman, retiring president, whose efforts had been successful in making the annual tournament the success it was. Mr. E.E. Wright is the name of another player present whose name was omitted in the above account.

The minutes for this meeting were signed by L.C. Bryan of Sumter, Secretary, and corrected a year later at the 1929 session by Elmer H.
