STATE TOURNAMENT GETTING BIGGER

Lee Hyder and Alex Edelsburg drew in the last round and tied with $4\frac{1}{2}$ points each to share the S. C. state championship for this year. They were awarded identical trophies. Twenty eight entries completed in this S. C. Annual Closed Chess Tournament which was held last December 1, 2, and 3. This number of entries equals the highest previous entry list of 1965. Bob Fickling won third place trophy. Paul Neil won the junior championship with 3-2.

The contestants played at the Columbia YWCA. Excellent accommodations were furnished by the Y. The tournament had to be rescheduled at a late date because of unavailability of accommodations on Thanksgiving weekend. The membership voted to move the tournament from Thanksgiving to an earlier date (October 11-13) next year.

Your president solicits comment on the two items below. If you wish to support or oppose them please drop him a card.

- 1. Proposal for a State Amateur Tournament. By James M. Smith, Spartanburg.
 - a. The State Amateur Tournament would be held in conjunction with the S. C. closed championship.
 - b. Dues and fees and trophies would be the same for both sections.

c. Championship Section: Open to all.

d. Amateur Section: Open only to players with USCF rating under 1650.

e. Unrated players are paired up from the bottom.

- f. Top rated paired with each other Harkness method.
- g. For the second and remaining rounds the unrated players are paired as follows: Those with drawn games remain in that section. Those that won in the first round are paired in the Championship section, and those that lost in the first round are paired in the Amateur section.
- 2. Support of U.S.C.F. Actions

Question: Should the U.S.C.F. use its funds to pay either the costs of U.S. teams in international competition or of individual players in interzonal and other tournaments?

It is presently the policy of the organization to pay part of such costs. Your president feels that this may be to the detriment of more proper needs and functions of the organization, and also be an undesirable expense to the membership. What do you think?

ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING

The annual SCCA business meeting was held at the South Carolina Closed Tournament last December. Major items of business included the following:

Constitution

The constitution proposed by Mr. Houston was ratified with one amendment which removed the amount of annual dues from the constitution. The amendment will be published in the Summer Newsletter; the remainder of the constitution was published in the last edition.

Officers

Officers elected for 1968 included Lee Hyder (Aiken) President; Thomas C. Davis (Columbia) Vice-President; John Chalmers (Columbia) Secretary-Treasurer.

1968 Tournament

The 1968 S. C. Closed Championship was again awarded to Columbia, to be held again at the YWCA, if possible. An early October date was selected (See Announcements of forthcoming events.)

Interscholastic Tournament

The S.C.C.A. will again provide a trophy for the annual interscholastic team tournament.

Dues

Annual dues were set at \$3.00 except for members under age 19, who will pay \$2.00.

How do you organize a chess club? The account below by Harold Kelley tells how it was tried in Aiken. It has not been a total success, as you will see. He would like someone to suggest what might have been improved.

CLUB CALAMITY

By radio and newspaper announcements, gratis, a rejuvenation of the defunct Aiken Club was attempted in January, 1966. Personal contact was made with the dedicated dependables who then drove up to 20 miles to play. Initial attendance was spectacular. The first four months attendance averaged 25 per week; 72 people came at least once. May and June ran an average of 12 and the number has since drifted down to about four per week while 92 people have shown interest at one time or another.

Although the initial campaign was successful, interest was not developed or maintained. The goals were to play chess, form an Aiken team, run internal competitions, both tournament and ladder and to interest beginners. The latter item seemed most vital to provide sustained interest by the majority of those attracted to the club.

Four excited and delighted players were 6-8 years old; they were the only ones interested in trying to learn more about playing. They made some progress and attended faithfully until summer vacation. Since then they play mostly at home since it was a chore for parents to bring them in the evening.

Continuing publicity was a problem and slowly fell off because it became repetitious. The small local paper offered to print a full column of material on chess news per week. Not enough material was available for this, but occasional reports are published. (Other clubs may also find local papers willing to publish a column if asked.)

At the initial meeting it was decided not to have a formal club with officers, dues, etc. Organizational effort thereafter was left to those two or three men who were willing to perform it. This can be a burden on those persons.

So at the present time 12 players account for the average attendance of four per week. What to do?

SOUTH CAROLINIANS IN AUGUSTA OPEN

The Georgia Chess Association sponsored the Augusta Open, held in Augusta, Georgia, last April, but out-of-staters including two South Carolinians wound up with most of the prizes. S. C. Co-Champion Lee Hyder was first with $4\ 1/2-1/2$, and Charles Braun of Aiken was one of three players with 4-1.

The early rounds of the tournament were full of surprises. Greenville's Harry Lofton took advantage of a blunder by Master Emeritus Norman Whitaker to win material, but the master managed to draw. In Round 3 Braun took the exchange in the opening against Whitaker and held it to win. In the same round the second rated player, expert Nowak of Milwaukee, was defeated by Ream of D. C., and Hyder played a draw with Joiner of Atlanta.

At this point Ream and James Inman of Florence led with 3-0. In the next round Ream won after Inman missed a chance to turn the tables. Hyder defeated Ream in the last round.
