### DREHER WINS STATE HIGH SCHOOL EVENT

Dreher High School was host to the annual S. C. High School Team Championships this year and won it convincingly with a perfect 8-0 score. This was something of an upset, despite the strength of the top two boards, since Dreher had finished third of four in Spartanburg a couple of months before. Brookland-Cayce, the defending champs, have not been active this year--we don't know why--and so weren't there to defend their title. Details of the tournament are given elsewhere, and a description by Norman McCurry appears below.

### ON THE SPOT ACCOUNTS OF STATE TOURNAMENTS, BY NORMAN MCCURRY

Mr. McGurry, one of the state's most active young players, has sent us a series of on-the-spot accounts of some of the tournaments listed above in which he participated. We are pleased to print them to give a better picture of what happened than cold statistics could ever convey. And we welcome more of the same from other correspondents.

Tournament at Dorman H. S., Feb. 21: The most exciting high school tournament yet was held on February 21st (continued on page two)

On-The-Spot-Accounts, Continued at Dorman High School in Spartanburg. Teams from Spartanburg, Dreher, Dorman, and Greenville competed. Spartanburg won the tournament with 52 points; Dorman scored 5, Dreher 42, and Greenville 1.

Before the tournament everyone was wondering if Spartanburg could beat Dreher. Dreher's first and second board players are Charles Walter and Ed Garvin, who have USCF ratings of 1835 and 1733 respectively. Both these players scored a perfect 2 points, but the other two Dreher players could only get  $\frac{1}{2}$  point.

Spartanburg's bottom boards scored  $3\frac{1}{2}$  points while the first two got 2 of 4. Steadman and McCurry both dropped a game to one of the Dreher top boards after hard fights.

Dreher thus did not have the depth to beat the Spartanburg teams. Could this have been a dry run for the state championships? Spartane burg certainly hopes so!

Spartanburg One Day Open, February 28. The Spartanburg One Day Open was held at Spartanburg High School on February 28. The four section event drew 25 players and was considered a great success. Players came from S. C., N. C., Georgia, and even one from Ohio! And the tournament even received coverage from the Spartanburg <u>Herald</u>, including photographs.

It may seem monotonous to say this, but Charles Walter again won the top section, this time with  $2\frac{1}{2}$  points. Dan Purvis took the second section with the same score after a hard fight with Steven Hunt of Athens. Norman McCurry found the winning formula and swept the third section with a 3-0 score; and Paul Clemens duplicated this in the fourth section. In view of Paul's consistently good results, his rating is sure to rise considerably.

The event was ably directed by Mr. J. M. Smith, who passed up the chance to play because he has found it difficult to play and direct at the same time. (He isn't the only one!--Ed.) several members of the Castle Chess Club assisted. The spacious and very comfortable facilities of Spartanburg High School made this an even more enjoyable tournament. (McCurry is absolutely right: I have not seen these facilities matched anywhere. Ed.)

Spartanburg Two Day Open, March 28-29. The Spartanburg Two Day Open on March 28 and 29 had 19 participants. The slim turnout was probably because the tournament had mistakenly been scheduled on the Easter holidays.

Despite this some very lively action took place. The field was divided into two sections: B and above, and C and below. There were six players in the top section, so they played a round robin.

This time Charles Walter, the usual winner of such affairs, had some tough competition. Randy Dolinger of N. C., who is 14th in the nation in the under 16 category, drew Walter in the first round, and then scored four straight while Walter yielded another draw to Airman Joseph Szepanski of Aiken. Thus Randy took the trophy home.

In the second section Dr. J. S. Earr of Greenville took first place with a score of 4-1. Dr. Earr finished the first day with a perfect 3-0 score, and it appeared then that he would not be caught. He drew Venson Steadman of Spartanburg in the 4th round, however, and there was a slim chance of catching him. But I let a slight positional advantage slip away to a draw in the last round, and it was all over.

Final scores: Barr 4, McCurry 32, Greene32; with McCurry ahead on tie-break.

# EDITOR'S CORNER

For this issue this space will be devoted to correspondence and accounts of various activities around the country, as reported in our exchange publications.

First, a very helpful letter from Russell W. Miller, former Editor of NORTHWEST CHESS:

"I agree there should be more organization news in the pages of CHESS LIFE and REVIEW. President Dubeck does send a letter out once in a while; the latest one is enclosed.

"I assume the terms of the (CHESS LIFE and CHESS REVIEW) merger will come out at the USCF annual meeting.

"I read somewhere that Fischer got no money for Lugano. There was a figure in the Treasurer's report on "International Expenses" is CHESS LIFE several months ago Ithink, but it did not show how much to whom. It might not be a good idea to publish just how much each one got. "A young fellow .n Spokane, Washington played chess for 72 straight hours--a new record. This raised about \$140 in donations to a kidney fund and got a lot of publicity for Spokane Chess Club, which they needed."

The Dubeck letter, noted above, contained the following items: --The merger has led to a total subscription of about 20,000. --The USCF rating system is under review; the problem is the large number of new, unrated players (more than 40% of the membership is only provisionally rated.) These revisions will be set and published in CLAR by June.

--Plans for the match, USSR vs. rest of world. --Criteria for selecting a site for the U. S. Junior Open.

From the October, 1969 Minnesota Chess Journal comes information on The USCF rating system, thus: Winning a game now gets you at least one rating point; if in a tournament you score two or more points above the value anticipated from previous ratings, for that tournament only your rating will be adjusted using a larger factor; i. e. you will gain more points.

Incidentally the Minnesota Chess Association must be the shining light among all state associations. They now have more than #000 members and a wonderful schedule of activities. As a result, and due to the efforts of Dr. G. van D. Tiers, they publish their journal eight or more times a year for dues of \$1 a member. It's the same format as SCCA NEWS, but they gain an economy of scale which we can't match.

The annual Hastings tournament in England was about to die, it seemed, due to the Grandmaster draw. But this last winter they invited some players who play to win<sup>2</sup> Portisch, Gligorich, Smyslow, et al, and had a fine tournament with many interesting games. We commend the February issue of GHESS to you; it contains them all, including Smyslow's loss to young Martyn Corden of England. Here are a couple of interesting ones: the first is a rare example of a player developing his R at QR3--twicel--and doing fine thereby. But don<sup>9</sup>t ask me why they agreed the draw. Another South Carolinian whom we have not met, but who is doing well for himself, is Chris Fitzaimons IV of Columbia. Chris is a student at Georgia Tech, and he scored 3-2 in the 1970 Atlanta Metropolitan Championship to win the Junior title--in his first tournament!

# CORRESPONDENCE CHESS (Subtitle: Galloping Confusion)

Here are a number of items which have come to our attention; the reader can form his own conclusions and judgments.

Excerpt from "The International World of Correspondence Chess", by Walter Muir, THE CHESS CORRESPONDENT, February, 1970: "The Federation Internationale des Echecs (FIDE) and the Inter-national Correspondence Chess Federation (ICCF) have concluded an agreement for the promotion of chess throughout the world. Each organization remains legally, economically, and technically indepen-dent. ICCF recognizes FIDE as the supreme organization of world chess, and FIDE recognizes ICCF as the only international federation which organizes correspondence chess tournaments and championships by mail, telegraph and radio. In effect then, FIDE is the sole authority in over-the-board chess and ICCF is the sole authority in correspondence chess. Both FIDE and ICCF have agreed to guide their activities and decisions so that the interests of neither partner are violated in the development of all forms of chess.

"The agreement between the two bodies was ratified by FIDE at their Lugano meeting in 1968 and by ICCF at their Brussels Congress last August. "It should be pointed out that this new agreement confirms the

right of the Correspondence Chess League of America to hold the official U. S. Correspondence Chess Championship Tournament through its affiliation with ICCF.

"Our readers should know that CCLA membership is now required for U. S. correspondence chess players who wish to enter ICCF tour-naments. FCLA is the only official representative of the ICCF in the U.S. All entries must be made through the office of the ICCF-U. S. Secretary."

The ICCF-U. S. Secretary is Mr. Walter Muir, 1722 Orchard Dr., Salem, Virginia 24153. CCLA Secretary is Donald R. Taylor, 706 Mt. Hope Ave., Cincinnati, Ohio 45204. Entry in the 38th CCLA Grand National Tournament for the U. S. Correspondence Chess Championship is open to all residents of the U. S., Canada, or Mexico, through Mr. Taylor, for \$3.00 per section.

CHESS LIFE AND REVIEW now advertises the "Twelfth annual United States Open Postal Chess Championship and the Twenty-third Golden Knights Postal Chess Championship". This is sponsored by the USCF, the "official governing body and FIDE unit for chess in the USA"

Excerpt from NORTHWEST CHESS, February, 1970: "The Canadian Correspon-dence Chess Association announces the North American Correspondence Championship, open to residents of Canada, USA, and Mexico; the winner will play off with his counterpart from South America for the Championship of the Western Hemisphere. The eventual winner will participate in a world title event. Entry fee is only \$1.00 --- Register with John Cleeve, 4745 W. 6th Ave, Vancouver 8, British Columbia, Canada."

Correspondence chess is a lot of fun and a great teacher. We hope some South Carolinian wins a Championship; there seem to be enough to go around!

After the above was written came the March, 1970 CHESS CORRESPONDENT, with proposed changes in CCLA tournaments: The "Grand National" will become the "U. S. Open Correspondence Championship"

The CCLA will hold a U. S. Correspondence Championship, with entry restricted to at most 225 players who establish a high rating in previous play; rules similar to those of the ICCF; play to start this fall. They also announce the opening of negotiations with the Canadian CCA regarding a North American Championship Tournament.

Entry in international (ICCF) tournaments is available to CCLA members through Walter Muir for \$1.50 per 7-man section.
