SHOCRON TAKES \$1500 DIXIE OPEN

The biggest chess tournament in the history of South Carolina was won by Ruben Shocron, a USCF Master from Millegdeville, Georgia. Don Hull of Gastonia, North Carolina and Roane Carey of Birmingham, Alabama shared the honors in the Amateur Section.

ADDISON, SMELTZER, HYDER SHARE S.C. TITLE

The South Carolina Closed Chess Championship produced tri-Champions this year: Jim Addison of Walterboro, Jeff Smeltzer of Greenville, and Lee Hyder of Aiken with identical 4-1 scores. Smeltzer emerged as the only undefeated player in the Championship Section; Addison took the trophy on tiebreak points despite losing to Hyder in the fourth round. Charles H. Walter of Columbia won the Intermediate section. Ted White, also of Columbia, claimed the 1st prize in the Reserve Section. The overall competitiveness of the tournament is best seen in this interesting statistic: no player in ANY section was able to finish with a perfect score!

SOUTH CAROLINA CELEBRATES CHESS DAY

Governor James Edwards proclaimed September 13, 1975, as CHESS DAY in South Carolina. Chess players across the state turned out for the festivities, which included rated tournaments, junior tournaments, and chess club "open houses." Several other states followed the Palmetto State lead. USCF President George Koltinowski has suggested a national observance in 1976 as part of the Bicentennial celebrations.

NOTES FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

--SCCA INCENTIVE PROGRAM ---

As I reported during the annual business meeting at Fort Jackson, SCCA has received a generous donation from an individual who wishes to remain anonymous; the money to be used in the manner described in the following paragraphs to promote SCCA membership.

 During the coming year, starting on January 1st, 1976, an extension of one year's SCCA membership will be credited to an SCCA member in good standing that brings (sponsors) a new member into the state association, or renews a member who has been out of the association for at least two years. The only SCCA members that will not be eligible to receive credit for new members and old renewals will be:A. Members of the Membership and Growth Committee; B. Tournament Directors that sign-up members at a tournament which they are either TD's or assistant TD's; and C. Tournament Promoters and organizers at a tournament they are involved with.

What does this mean to you, a member of SCCA?

This means that you have the opportunity to have your SCCA membership <u>free</u> for one, three, five or more years, depending on how much effort you are willing to exert to enlist new members. There is no limitation as to how many members one person can sponsor, but this offer applies only to the <u>first one hundred</u> that are reported to us. If we have a good response, the chances are good that the program will be repeated next year.

This is your chance to do something for SCCA, and get something for your effort. We all know chess players who are not USCF or SCCA members, and many of these people do not attend local clubs. Let us get to work on them and see how many we can involve in organized chess.

The gauntlet has been tossed to the ground before us! Do we pick it up and accept the challenge, or do we just sit back and "let George do it?" Remember, being part of an organization is a give and take proposition. We, the officers of SCCA can only do so much, and cover limited ground. We need your help and support if we are to grow and prosper. Come on! Do your part, and together we can put South Carolina on the chess map as a progressive and active state.

- 2. The same benefactor will make a donation of one hundred dollars to the chess club that has demonstrated, in four areas to be listed below, their efforts to promote chess in South Carolina in an effective and productive manner. This award will not be automatically awarded. It will have to be earned. A panel of judges will decide if it is merited, and to which club it will go, if any qualifies for it. Their decision will be final. The four areas the judges will look at, in the order of their importance are:
 - 1. Percentage of SCCA increase
 - 2. Number of Published and rated tournaments
 - 3. Junior Chess Promotions
 - 4. Other Chess Promotions

Item 2, Number of Published and rated tournaments, needs more explanation. A tournament Published in both <u>Chess Life and Review and SCCA News</u> will receive more credit than if published in our newslotter alone. The purpose for this is simple. We want chess players to look at the Tournament Announcement section in <u>Chess Life and Review</u> and see several tournaments available in South Carolina, not just occasionally, but on a frequent basis. We want people to wonder just what we are doing to have so many tournaments, and as I said before, to put our state on the national chess map.

If any of you have any questions about this program, please write to me. Above all, let us get involved: let us get active; let us become united toward a common goal; the promotion of chess in our great state. It can be done. Let us start now.

"CHESS 4.4" WINS U.S. COMPUTER CHAMPIONSHIP

Chess 4.4, the computer chess program of Northwestern University, has won the 1975 US Computer Chess Championship held in Minneapolis, Minnesota. The program, written by David Slate and Larry Atkin, had held the title from 1970-74, having been unseated in '74 by Tree Frog (a Canadian program from the University of Waterloo). Chess 4.4 finished second in the 1974 World Computer Chess Championships to the Soviet program Caissa.

Despite its victory against a 12-computer field, Chess 4.4 fared no better than its colleagues in the post-tournament simultaneous exhibition versus IM D.N.L. Levy. Levy is probably second only to Botvinnik in knowledge of computer chess, and is known to feel that machines will not overtake the stronger human players in the forseeable future. He has gone so far as to make a little wager (one thousand English pounds) that no program will be able to defeat him by 1978. Thus far no electronic brain has put Levy's money in danger, largely for two reasons: (1) their inability to make subjective evaluations of a given position, and (2) the time limit which restricts the machines' calculations.

ADDISON NEW SCCA NEWS EDITOR

James R. Addison of Walterboro has been appointed the new Editor of SCCA NEWS. Addison recently returned to South Carolina from Virginia, where he served as Editor of the Virginia Chess Federation NEWSLETTER since 1973. In that capacity, he published letters-to-the-editor from 14 states and was quoted by several state and regional publications on a variety of topics, A member of the Association of United States Chess Journalists, Jim was a USCF Delegate in 1975, and has been appointed to the USCF Prison Chess Committee.

Not only had Governor James Edwards proclaimed September 13 as CHESS DAY in South Carolina, but the Mayor proclaimed that date as CHESS APPRECIATION DAY in North Augusta.

Taking advantage of the new USCF rule allowing rated games atione minute per move, a 40/40 round robin was conducted, making our club the first in South Carolina, and undoubtably one of the first in the nation, to use the new time control. The top section was won by Chuck Braun of Aiken with a 3-0 score, and the second section honors went to Tom Wilson of North Augusta, also scoring 3-0. An unrated section was conducted for players who were not members of USCF or SCCA; it was won by Luke Barefoot of North Augusta with a score of 4-0. Several people wandered in throughout the day and enjoyed skittles games with club members. --Bill Dodgen

DIXIE OPEN BIGGEST-EVER S C EVENT !

Ruben Shocron of Milledgeville, Georgia won the \$1500 Dixie Open at Greenville in September with a perfect score of 5-0. First place in the Open Section brought the USCF Master \$300 and a trophy. Tied for second with identical 4-1 scores were Mike McCann of Dobson,NC, Jewell Watson and Jared Radin of Atlanta, Richard Searles of Cleveland, TN, Steve Cabaniss of Mt. Pleasant, SC, and Bill Layton of Milledgeville,GA. In the Amateur Section, Don Hull of Gastonia, NC and Roane Carey of Birmingham, AL were equal first with scores of 5-0. Filadelfo Cunanan of Fort Meyer, FL took third place with $4\frac{1}{2}$.

150 players from eight states participated, to make the event the largest chess tournament ever held in South Carolina. Rick White of East Lansing Michigan received a prize for travelling the greatest distance to play.

Dr. E.B. Hallman, age 90, played in the Amateur Section; he won 3 games and lost two. It was his first rated event! Dr. Hallman, now a resident of Brerand, NC, was a chess promoter in the 1930's and 40's. During that period he directed many South Carolina Championships when that tournament was held in Charleston. He won the state championship in 1930.

The \$1500 Dixie Open was sponsored by the Greenville Chess Club. Bill Grady, the club treasurer, guaranteed the prize fund. Jeff Smeltzer and S. Donald Johnson directed. --Jeff Smeltzer

1975 SOUTH CAROLINA CHESS CHAMPIONSHIP

Fort Jackson was the scene of a hard-fought SC Closed. Twenty-four players competed in the Championship Section, which produced three state chess Co-Champions for '75-76: James R. Addison of Walterboro, Jeff Smeltzer of Greenville, and Dr. M. Lee Hyder of Aiken (in tiebreak order). Addison recently moved to South Carolina from Richmond, Virginia where he was 1975 Richmond Area Champion. Smeltzer is SCCA Vice-President, and promoted the largest tournament ever held in the Palmetto State (Dixie Open '75). Hyder was the overwhelming victor in this summer's election for USCF Secretary, defeating former President Dubeck to become the first Southerner on the Policy Board.

The close competition is illustrated by the crosstable below (compiled by TD Don Elton). After Round II, there were only two perfect scores: Addison, and Charleston's Larry Crawford, who upset Lee Hyder. When Addison downed Crawford in Round III and Lee Purvis $(2\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2})$ had to withdraw due to illness, Jim had a full-point lead. But Lee Hyder beat him decisively in Round IV to pull even going into the final round. Also tied at 3-1 were Jeff Smeltger (who had suffered two early draws), Frank Kelley, and Kenneth Cockrell. Round V saw Addison beat Kelley, Hyder down Cockrell, and Smeltger defeat Jimmy Hill $(2\frac{1}{2})$ to yield the triple-tie.

In the Intermediate Section, Charles H. Walter of Columbia took clear first with a 3-0-2 record. Second was David Cruzado, also of Columbia, scoring 3-1-1. Marion E. Mahaffey of Lancaster copped third place with 3-0-1.

Columbian Ted White claimed top honors in the Reserve Section, 4-0-1. **Jack Berry of Orangeburg won the second prize with 4-1.** Third place went to Chris Falter of Columbia, who scored 3-1-1.

The tournament was directed by Donald Elton. Patricia Willis and the staff of Rcreation Center #2 attended to the comfort of the players, and very commendably so (see "YOU MISSED IT" on Editorial Page--Ed.).

WALTERBORO CHESS: FROM TINY ACORNS. . .

Earlier this fall, Richard Price and John Caldwell of the Walterboro--Colleton County Recreation Commission decided to include a beginners' chess class amongst their many programs. Neither had much knowledge of chess, so they began with a saturation campaign in the local media. Robert Smoak, who had played rated chess in Delaware, and Richard Gaskins (who had played in the clubs of New York City) responded to the W-CCRC initiative, and the course was set to begin November 17. When SC Co-Champ Jim Addison followed up the ad in the local newspaper, he was drafted to teach the class. All parties concerned have been pleasantly surprised with the response from the community; apparently several small groups of players were in the area, but had no contact with each other. A club is now being formed and plans are in the works for eventual USCF affiliation and rated events.

This is not my best game, but it is recent and one of my favorites. It was played June 29, 1975, in the Richmond Area Championships in Virginia.

EDITORIAL COMMENT: YOUR SCCA MAIL BALLOT

Members of the South Carolina Chess Association have an opportunity to actively participate in SCCA affairs not available to members of most other states' organizations. You may deliberate on the proposals and vote through the mail ballot included in this issue. In virtually all other states, members must physically attend the annual meeting in order that their voice be heard and vote count. SCCA conducts its most important business through the mail, feeling that each dues-paying member has an equal right to vote on issues that affect him or her directly. Unfortunately, in last year's "debut" of the mail ballot, less than 10% of the membership exercised their privilege.

Those who argue against more democratic practices in USCF and state associations say "most players are concerned only with playing, and care nothing for organizational matters." If this is true to any extent, it only shows chessplayers' shortsightedness: Everything national and state groups do affects your opportunity to play, directly or indirectly.

Organizers--good organizers--are always willing to listen to the players; many even solicit players' views. However capable an organizer may be, his effectiveness is limited if he gets too little input from the people he is trying to serve.

You owe it to yourself to vote the mail ballot. There are strong indications that the Policy Board will recommend the mail ballot be discontinued next year if the response does not increase significantly.

By the way, it has probably taken you longer to read this editorial than it will to complete and return your SCCA mail ballot, --Jim Addison

POLICY BOARD ENDORSES DUES INCREASE

H.M. Kelley, Treasurer

The SCCA Policy Board has decided to endorse one of the dues increase proposals found on your mail ballot elrewhere in this issue. The Board urges that the annual dus be raised to \$4 adult, \$3 junior, a \$1 increase ecross the board, without increased frequency of publication for SCCA NEWS. As President Dodgen pointed out, the Board can authorize extra issues at any time the treasury will bear it. But any increased revenues from the dues increase will not be felt until late next summer or early fall when most memberships come due for renewal, so that the proposals to raise the dues and publish SCCA NEWS six times per year do not provide a source of funding for even the three scheduled issues that must be published before the benefits of the dues hike become available late next year. The Policy Board feels that SCCA should avoid any deficit spending if at all possible, and therefore wait until the effects of increased dues can be measured before making SCCA NEWS a bi-monthly publication. While both the Board and the Editor favors bi-monthly issues, they feel we need some idea of the fiscal immet of any dues raise before committing SCCA to increased expenditures.

YOUNG PLAYERS NOT FORGOTTEN

The SCCA has not given up on the Palmetto State's young chessplayers, in spite of the obstacles presneted by the regulations of the SC High School League. The entire matter is being referred to the National Association of High School Leagues. There are eight states with the restrictive rules that have crippled efforts to effectively promote junior chess in South Carolina. In the meantime, SCCA is looking for new ideas to work within the narrow framework allowed at the present. EDITOR'S NOTE: The SCCA Policy Board has endorsed one of the dues increase proposals, # 6 below. The Board feels it is imperative that SCCA avoid any possibility of deficit spending. Members are urged to review the short article "Policy Board Endorses Dues Increase" on the SCCA business pages before making a decision on the dues increase proposals.
