The 2nd Marshall Chess Club International a 10-round invitational Swiss played March 10-19 at New York's Marshall Chess Club, was sponsored by the American Chess Foundation and conducted by the Continental Chess Asso ciation. 40 players competed, including 4 GMs, / IMs, and 35 with FIDE ratings.

19-year old IM Michael Rohde, a student at Yale, won the tournament with an outstanding, undefeated 8-2 performance, achieving his first GM norm.



There are 73 contestants, 27 of whom, are Grandmasters, and most of the rest International Masters! Naturally the early favorite is Victor Korchnoi, the number two player in the world today, but the road to the \$15000 first prize will be strewn with thorns like, Larsen, Browne, Hort, Gligoric, Miles etc. etc.

This little one horse town has become (due to the efforts of Mr. and Mrs. Statham) the chess capitol of the world. Here one can meet the worlds most famous Grandmasters and even get to speak with them. I highly recommend a visit to Lone Pine if you are a chess enthusiast and can spare the time. It is a great little place and the natives are very friendly.

Which reminds me of the time I met my friend Smyslov here, and the problem that he was then showing around. I think that it is one of the greatest of its kind for its sheer purity and simplicity. If you get tired of working on it I suggest that you peak at the first few moves of the solution and then try to get the last 4 or 5 moves. It ain't easy.

If there is a chance to attack he'll find it, and the following games should help to convince you.



REMEMBRANCES OF CHICAGO

The Pan Am Intercollegiate Chess Championship

by John Nardandrea

The University of Florida chess team of December 1978 began to take shape in April 1978. That was when University of Florida first came into serious consideration as the university to which I would team spirit. In the early stages of the match, as I surveyed the transfer. At that time, I also became aware that Greg Small (the current National High School Champion) would also be attending U. of F. I began to seriously consider the possibility of entering the Pan Am. While visiting Greg during the summer, Dr. Walter Cunningham, a faculty member of the University of Florida, and a USCF Master, invited us over for a few games of speed chess. We were fortunate at that time to meet Russ Garber, also a USCF Master, who

prospects were definitely enhanced for a good team! In September we began to seek support in earnest, and this task

was facilitated by the University of Florida student government. They contributed \$500, as well as their cheers and votes of confidence, which gave me a big psycological boost. It was a very emotional scene, not seen often in chess, and one I am glad to have been a part in causing. I feel as though everyone in the state were behind us, and this is evidenced by the fact that Art Sandeen, the vice president in charge of student affairs, the intermural department at the University of Florida, and last but not least, the Florida Chess Association all lended their support, Gill Cantrell, Doug Carpenter, IM Arnold Denker, Mark Solomon, and Larry Storch (listed in alphabetical order!) were all instrumental in recieving the FCA support, and my heartfelt thanks to them all! Once again. thanks to all that helped us.

The flight to Chicago was uneventful, and we arrived to a snowy welcome on Christmas Day in O'Hare Airport. To help team spirit, I purchased team shirts at a local sporting goods store, and we were one of the few teams there with that advantage.

All of the team members were extremely enthusiastic and devoted, but especially noteworthy was the attitude of Russ Garber. He always conducted himself in a professional manner, and added extra inspiration to the team. Rounding out the team were: Greg Small (2208), myself (2130), and Steve Schounhaut (2086). Steve, through steady play, achieved the best personal score on the team. He also had the most difficult name to spell. In sizing up the competition, we were rated third in a field of approximately 85 teams. That is Yale #1 (2256), University of Pennsylvania (2196), and University of Florida #3 (2156). Not bad for some Florida boys! The first 6 teams received a separate room for their games where the conditions were optimal. The tournament directors room was easily accessible, and it was quieter than the main room. All in all the conditions were very good.

The following account of the games of the Pan Am are purposely written with an emphasis on Florida, although I will keep the read er apace with the results of the top teams, with respect to us. A competent account of the Pan Am is written by Harold Winston in the ghtly worse (again!). The position became very complicated, and I March-April issue of The Chessman. ROUND 1:

This round saw gross mismatches in rating of the teams paired. We won easily against University of Rochester (rating 1568) with a 4-0 sweep. Yale and Penn. also scored 4-0 to win. ROUND 2:

My game became particularly important, because the score was 2-1 in our favor, but I was a pawn down after blowing a great game. But then...

ROUND 5:

gining of the round, there were only 3 teams with perfect scores. It seems cassia was not with us this round. Rhode outplayed Russ (no shame there!); Greg gave Tisdell a great fight, but made a bad move in a defensible position; I was outplayed by Wuerch, but fought back only to miss at least a draw in terrible time pressure; Steve had his man on the ropes only to lose on time in the last move of time pressure! Suddenly, Gregg's opponent got tremendous compensation, and Steve got careless for the first time in the tournament. You can't win them all, but we could informed us of his intent to attend Florida. I had a solid endgame advantage, but transposed moves thus making it very unclear. I still thought I could win, but he defended well. Florida against I.I.T. "A" was a very strange affair. Our team was really let down, and this was the only time we were relegated to the aquarium (err, I mean the main tournament room). Gregg was having bad luck, and lost because of a bad break. Russ sacrificed a pawn, and was forced to give up another He was two pawns down, in a double rook endgame. Steve was a clear pawn down, and his position seemed hopeless. All in all we needed a minor miracle to win this match. All seemed lost, and I couldn't bear to watch. Steve came up to me and asked whether he could accept his opponents draw offer. I stated that he should play for a win! I considered Russ lost, and if he won (improbable as it may be), we could draw the match. Gregg was concerned, and commented that it was probably best to let Steve take a draw. I was almost convinced, when Steve came up and exclaimed, "This ones for the team!" I left to play speed chess with Sprenkle, and when I returned...Steve had won his game (Schounhaut-Klepacki see Round 7 opposite page). Meanwhile Russ was actually drawing the game that I had considered dead lost! We won a squeaker, $2\frac{1}{2}$ - $1\frac{1}{2}$ to put us in contention for third place. All we had to do was to beat the University of Toronto, and we would probably finish third!

ROUND 8:

Everyone got "up" for the last round, and I felt that we had a reasonable chance for victory, I felt that if we would all play our best, then we would win decisively. The pivotal games would be mine and Gregg's (in case you hadn't noticed, we were both badly off form!), and so the round began ... Russ, missed a tactical threat, and lost early. Gregg had a great game, and it looked as if he would coast to an easy victory. Steve had the better game, and I was slireached an unclear position, but the game tells the story much better (See Round 8 Toronto-Florida opposite page).

Gregg won easily, and Steve drew. The final score was Florida $1\frac{1}{2}$ Toronto $2\frac{1}{2}$. We ended up in approximately 10th place, but somewhat dissapointed.

The tournament was a great event to participate in and I will The rating differences were getting smaller, and Russ Garber had remember it well. The team members played with desire and Russ had a fine result, as did Steve. Gregg was somewhat off form, but he came through in the crucial last round. My play was inaccurate and lackluster; not representative of my style. You pay your money, and you take your chances. After a poor result at a chess tourney, I know I would have rather played and done poorly; than not to have played. For you Shakespeare fans, "It is better to have loved and lost, than never to have loved at all".

In conclusion (and I know all the readers are glad to hear that) Florida came out in force this round and destroyed University of I would like to thank all of our supporters, especially the great University of Florida student government, and the players of the team !! I will remember the snow, the snack time grill, and the incessant "freak out" song (sorry all you disco fans), and the tremen dous feeling of participating in a national event. Just wait till next year, and given the opportunity we will win it all! 

Chess in Pennsylvania by Ira Lee Riddle

This editorial is being written both gingerly and tardily. The date is April 6th, and I am still recovering from a pulled muscle in my back. I had just finished a week and four days of jury duty, and was taking out the garbage before going off to school, when a piece of paper fell out of the can. I quickly reached down to grab it, and wound up in bed for four days of pain. During that time, I did get some PSCF business transacted--- more on that later. By the way, during jury duty, I was well prepared for the boredom. I took four magazines, five books, (read all of the mags. and four of the novels), two decks of playing cards (no bridge games, but lots of double deck pinochle), and a CHESS SET. How many games of chess did I play, you ask? ONE!!! (I did win it, but only one game.) Jury duty was boring. I sat on one case that lasted for two days. Otherwise. it was pinochle.

While flat in bed, I was able to set up a playing spot for the State Championship, to be held in September. Tony Acchione of the Embassy Chess Club phoned to offer any help he could, and I told him of my problems in finding a site. We were offered the Hilton Inn Northeast (Philadelphia) if we could guarantee fifty rooms and not use the facilities on Saturday night, when they have a Disco. It was felt by those I contacted that 50 rooms was impossible to guarantee, and no Saturday evening round would be very bad. So, I went into downtown Philadelphia, and the only place that seemed interested wa the Ben Franklin Hotel, but they wanted \$430,00 a day for the room. I told Tony this, and he offered to check into the place where the Embassy Chess Club meets. The owner was willing to give us a very reasonable figure; I went over there to look over the facilities, and it is usable. Pete's Embassy House is a restaurant in Folsom, Pa., a Philadelphia suburb, on Pa. Route 420, just below US 1, at the intersection of 420 and McDade Boulevard. It will host our State Tournament this September 1,2, and 3. It is not next to a hotel, but there are four or five within 2.8 miles (measured on my odometer), and I will be contacting them about rates for PSCF players that weekend. I will have more details next issue. Tentatively, six roun ds in three or four sections, with a PSCF business meeting on Sunday morning. It will hopefully be listed as a grand prix tournament.

If you have recently received your April <u>CLAR</u> (mine came in to-day), you will have noticed our next two tournaments, the State Scholastics and Orrie's Perm Palace #1. We also have just gotten some extra publicity, courtesy of the Pa. Dept. of Education. Every two weeks, the D of E puts out Pennsylvania Education, a sort of newspaper. In the March 26th issue, we have a listing for the State Scholastic Chess Tournament. This had never been listed in P.E. before, and I wrote to them last December on a hope. The Editor repli ed that they were always looking for some news like that to print. So, if you are doing something for the schools, here is another sou rce of publicity. Also on the scholastics, Vaux and Douglass have changed their trip to Yugoslavia so that they can play in the tournament after all. (I don't actually think that was the only reason, but I can davdream a little.)

On the first weekend in March, Centerville Jr. High School hoasted 11 other teams in its Black Knights Tournament (the 9th Annual) It was a non-rated tournament run by Frank Meyer of Centerville, and any time you have 72 plus players in one room, it gets hectic. Frank did a fine job in keeping everything moving, (his team won the B

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Earle. March 25, 79 Thanks for your letter. And the last issue of The Chessman was the greatest.

Dr. Lipkin and myself have been meeting with Mr. Pfefferkorn for the past few weeks to work out the details of the upcoming LPO. I have one more meeting with them to work out final arrangements.

Leland (Fuerstman) and I are good friends and we had a long talk about chess in the Charlotte area. The Metrolina Chess Club has 40 members and the Korchnoi simultaneous may boost that figure. The Knight Publishing Company went all out to make the event as successful as possible. Indeed, it was. There were 1300 responses to a chess problem as part of a contest to select opponents against Korchnoi. I will write them a letter to see if they are interested in other chess activities and perhaps sponsor a major tournament. Perhaps they may want to sponsor a Carolinas Open.

Back to the LPO. I'll suggest to Dr. Lipkin your suggestion about the 45/2 time control for the Open Section. It sounds reasonable to me. The hotel will be the Ramada Inn in Clemmons (10 miles to the west of Winston-Salem).....

The current problem that I am having is that I have had a few individuals write to me saying that they joined the NCCA at a small tournament, but haven't received their magazine yet, that their friends have gotten. In a few cases I have found out that such an individual may have renewed his membership, but changed addresses within the past few months. The old files indicate the old address and the person forgot to tell the TD of his new address.

I agree with your editorial about the addition of states and the coverage of the magazine. It seems to me that a lot of that local news makes up much of the regional news. I can easily accept Pennsylvania along with the other states in the area. The Chessman is covering the area very well with games from all levels from all the states. In my opinion, one of the most harmful editorials that ever appeared in the <u>Carolina</u> <u>Gambit</u> was a letter by one of our higher rated players in the state. He thought the Gambit was publishing too much trash and too many games by weak players and dumb articles by Wall and others. The magazine should have only top level games where something instructive (games by weak players could not be very instructive) and more quality chess would appear. After that editorial Lee Taylor told me that he was not receiving any material at all except for more of my dumb articles. What had happened was that all the contributers from the lower-rated players quit sending in games, thus chess articles, and the higher rated players simply did not contribute enough. The magazine lost its touch with the vast majority of chessplayers.

You are right about the notation. Too many players around here cannot adapt to algebraic and prefer The Chessman to keep its games in descriptive. Leave the algebraic to FIDE, ECO, and Chess Informant.



The event was covered in the press by the 3 local television stations, at least 3 local newspapers, and WINZ radio. The press was treated to a 40 minute press conference by Mr. Korchnoi prior to the exhibition.

Despite the strong field of players, Korchnoi managed 35 wins, 3 draws, and 2 losses. He was beaten only by Dr. O.H. Graham and Richard Fatigati, who had helped to organize the event.

of the meeting were Arthur Bisguier, Matthew Green, Edgar Mc-Cormick, Neil McKelvie, Edmar Mednis, Eugene Meyer, John Meyer, and John Watson. Also present for part of the meeting were Asa Hoffmann, Bruce Pandolfini,Saul Wanetick, and M. Wilder.

The following resolutions were adopted:

1. We consider the posts of USCF FIDE Delegate and Zonal President to be of great importance to all American chessplayers, and especial ly to American Masters. USCF should choose its best qualified representatives for these post, regardless of their ability to pay their own expenses. USCF should always provide these expenses. as the cost involved is minor considering the great significance of

these posts. (passed 10-0 with no abstentions.) 2. We recommend that no

8. We suggest that the PCA write FIDE President Olafsson in support of the title application of Edmar Mednis. (passed 10-0 with no abstentions.)

- 9. We recommend that the PCA suggest to our FIDE Delegate that:
 - A) The FIDE rules changes pertaining to GM norms which were adopted at Buenos Aires be scrapped, and the previous rules restored.

U.S. Chess Saga Report by Steve Schneider

From Friday December 29, 1978 until Monday January 1, 1979, 21 Icelandic chess players under 16 years of age visited a like number of their American piers to play chess and to participate in other appropriate events in New York City.

Jay Schneider was invited to participate as part of the U.S. team (Collins Kids). This was the return match from the previous year when Jack Collins took a group of his youngsters to Iceland. Jack Collins is the former teacher of such players as Bobby Fischer, Bill Lombardy, the Byrne brothers, Salvatore Matera and many others. Jay was also invited to go to Iceland the previous year, but could not. This trip we did not miss. On Friday morning the combined groups with TV cameras going met with Allen Kaufman, Executive Director, American Chess Foundation, Gary Sperling, USCF President, Mayor Edward I. Koch of New York City and others. After several speeches and the proclamation by the Mayor of December 29 to January 4 as "Icelandic - American Chess Week" in New York City, the group went to the top of the World Trade Center. The view from there was magnificant. After that we all had a banquet at the Four Five Six Restuarant. It was great. Then in the afternoon we toured the UN. That evening a 21 board match was played at the Marshall Chess Club. We found out that not only were the Icelandic Kids interesting, but they also knew how to play chess. They won the match 18-3 with the U.S. Collins Kids team getting only 6 draws. Jay playing on board was one of those. The next day we had our second match in Wayne N.J. There we were welcomed by the community of Wayne. The mayor Walter Jasinski, and Anthony Cottell of the USCF Policy Board were our hosts. Guy Buzzonis (one of the Collins Kids) mother had prepared a large cake with a chess board and chess pieces made of cake and candy on top. The position on the cake was interesting. It was mate in one no matter which side was to move. We then were given a violin concert by Sabena Jovanovic Adrians mother and another of the Collins Kids.

Our second match was better, but we still lost 13 to 8. Jay again played board 10 and he was the top U.S. board to post a win.

That evening we all attended the Nutcracker Suite at the New York State Theater. I must add here that all the NYC food we were getting was great and Jay got his five meals every day.

On Sunday December 31, 1978 we held a speed tournament after lunch. Their top 10 boards beat ours 70-30. Jay as board 10 won only against boards 9 & 10 from the Icelandic Kids. That night we all attended a New Year's Eve party at the Marshall Chess Club. Everyone was gone before midnight as the last match was on everyone's mind.

The last match was played on Monday January 1, 1979 at the Manhattan Chess Club. The lineup was changed and the Collins Kids came closer, but still lost this time 11-9. Jay again won his game to give him 23-2 and the top U.S. score. That evening all the kids par ticipated in a tandem simultaneous exhibition given by GM William Lombardy and DM Salvatore Matera. It was a lot of fun and the kids really played well. Jay had a Rook and pawn endgame that he should have drawn, but in losing he learned how to draw it next time.

This was quite an event and several more trips are being planned for the Collins Kids of which Jay is now a member. I want to thank all of the individuals and organizations for their support of this activity which goes beyond a simple chess match.

Fuerstman Wins !

The Southern Chess Association is awarding Leland Fuerstman the chess organizer of the month award for his fantastic promotion of the Korchnoi Simultaneous in Charlotte, N.C.

Leland was able to get the Knight Publishing Company to sponsor the event and make it a big success. Knight Publishing ran, at leas two huge ads in The Charlotte Observer for the event. The color ad was 16 by 12½ inches, the more modest black and white ad was 8½ by 141 inches. You can imagine the interest stirred up by these ads, or you can read where they drew 1300 responses.
