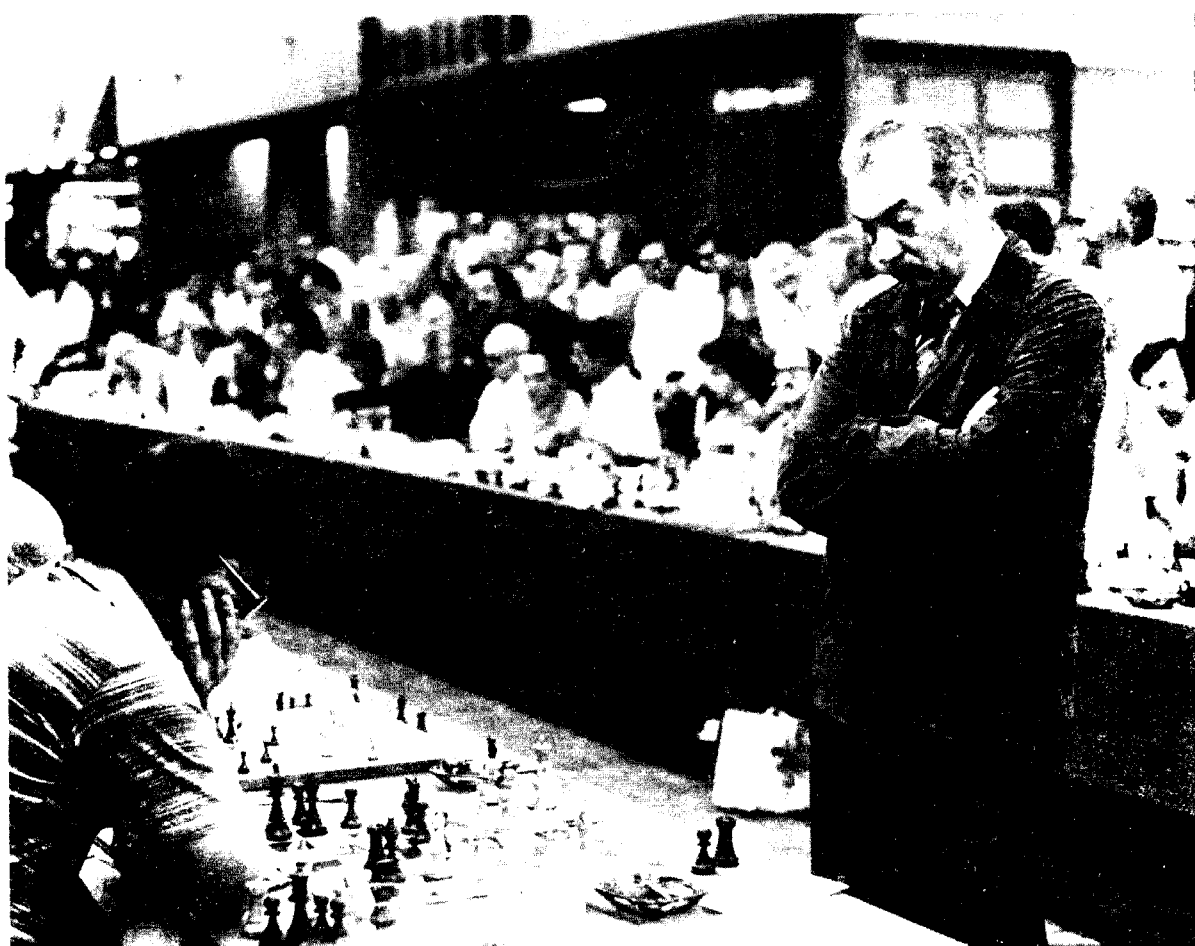


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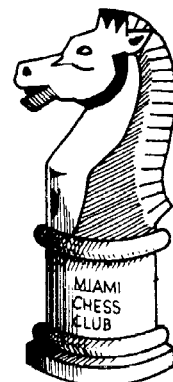
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Korchnoi in North Carolina by Bill Wall

On March 21 Viktor Korchnoi played a simultaneous exhibition match in Charlotte, North Carolina. The exhibition was sponsored by the Charlotte Observer and the Metrolina Chess Club. A total of 50 opponents were selected to play against the world's No. 2 ranked chess player. Thirty of Korchnoi's opponents were members of the Metrolina Chess Club; the other 20 were selected from persons who correctly solved two chess problems (made in two) that appeared in the Charlotte Observer newspaper.

More than 1300 readers attempted to solve the problems with approximately two-thirds of the entries being correct. The winners of the contest were drawn from the correct entries.

I interviewed Mr. Korchnoi prior to the exhibition. Here is an excerpt from the interview.

Wall: At what age did you begin to play chess?

Korchnoi: I began to play chess at 13 in Leningrad. My trainer was Zak. At 23 I became a professional and at 25 a Grandmaster. Wall: Is it wise to start teaching chess to children at a very early age?

Korchnoi: No. One needs a well rounded education and time for schooling first. Children should learn chess around 12 or 13 and still have time for school. I had time for chess and graduated from the university with a degree in history.

Wall: Is there any secret in becoming such a strong chessplayer? Korchnoi: No. It takes a lot of hard work. We had the help of trainers. You learn to memorize ideas not moves. Study the openings and endgames.

Wall: Have you heard from Bobby Fischer recently?

Korchnoi: Yes. He is interested in a match with me. But first, he would like to play a weaker Grandmaster (implying Gligorich of Yugoslavia).

Wall: You were recently invited to an international tournament in Yugoslavia, but were later denied from playing. What happened?

Korchnoi: After I had accepted to play, the Soviet players Petrosian and Kasparov threatened to withdraw if I played. So the organizing committee withdrew my name. The Russian chess federation are protesting tournaments that I might play in that have Soviet players.

Wall: Are you planning to move to Israel?

Korchnoi: No. I like Switzerland and have been offered a nice deal to stay in the U.S. I may buy some land in Israel, but I don't think I'll live there.

Wall: What is the situation with your family in the Soviet Union? My wife and son have been denied visas twice. I have written to Breznev about it. The only reply is that mr Soviet citizenship has been revoked and that I am making anti-Soviet remarks. Until I stop, they will hold my family hostage.

Wall: I understand you played Kreskin in New York and was impressed.

Korchnoi: Yes. He played both me and Robert Byrne with opposite colors. He was blindfolded and making the right moves. He was trying to play the two of us against each other. If I played P-Q4 he played P-Q4 against Byrne. If Byrne played N-KB3 he would play the same against me. He was not even told the moves. He finally got mixed up with P-QN3 and P-QB3. But he made fairly reasonable moves for 30 moves. At one point I played a B-N5 move and put him in check. I wrote on a piece of paper that he was in check and that it was illegal to castle. But I said on the paper to consider the move as if it were legal. He castled.

Wall: Was it a trick?

Korchnoi: I don't think so. In the Soviet Union there is much work into parapsychology. In the U.S. there isn't much emphasis on it.

Wall: Are you still involved with Yoga?

Korchnoi: Yes, a little. It helps me concentrate a little better

Mr Korchnoi elaborated on the details of the World Championship match. Briefly, he talked of the hassles of getting a Swiss flag, the matter of shaking hands before each game, and having the Soviet parapsychologist removed from the first 7 rows. There were KGB agents and rumors of microwave beams to distract his attention. He told of the incident of Karpov gulping down his yogurt and playing like a machine as if doped with something. He mentioned that when the Soviet delegation were bothered by his team of gurus, and the parapsychologist removed even further from the playing area, that Korchnoi won 3 in a row since Karpov did not have that moral support. But once his aids of gurus were expelled from the city and the Soviet delegation was back in full force for that final game, he lost. Korchnoi last statement was to the fact that there should never be a repeat of such a World Championship match, of such disturbing circumstances.

Finally, the exhibition. Korchnoi gave up only three draws, winning 47 and losing none. The draws went to Grady Brown, Jon Pietras (both are top players of the Metrolina Chess Club), and Gregory Rowland. The exhibition lasted over four hours with my game the last one to tip the king.

Much of the credit goes to Leland Fuerstman, President of the Metrolina Chess Club. He arranged for Mr. Korchnoi's visit and supervised the entire exhibition in excellent fashion.

Only a thousand points separated the Grandmaster from the grandpatzer. I had all the advantages - playing at the home court, lights and cameras flashing in his eyes, sitting comfortably and spending several minutes on each move when he had only a few seconds. Besides, I was familiar with hundreds of his games and knew his weaknesses and he didn't know a thing about any of my games, except for one trivial game in Informant 19.

Rohde wins the Marshall International by Bill Goichberg

The 2nd Marshall Chess Club International a 10-round invitational Swiss played March 10-19 at New York's Marshall Chess Club, was sponsored by the American Chess Foundation and conducted by the Continental Chess Association. 40 players competed, including 4 GMs, 7 IMs, and 35 with FIDE ratings.

19-year old IM Michael Rohde, a student at Yale, won the tournament with an outstanding, undefeated 8-2 performance, achieving his first GM norm.

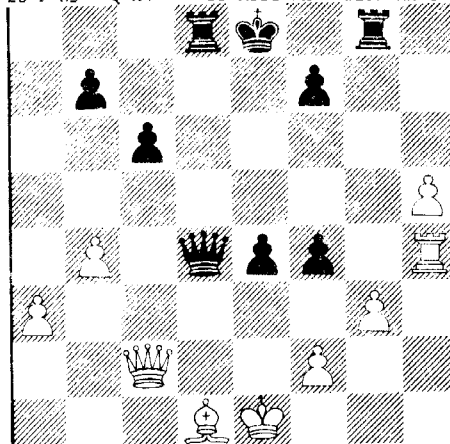

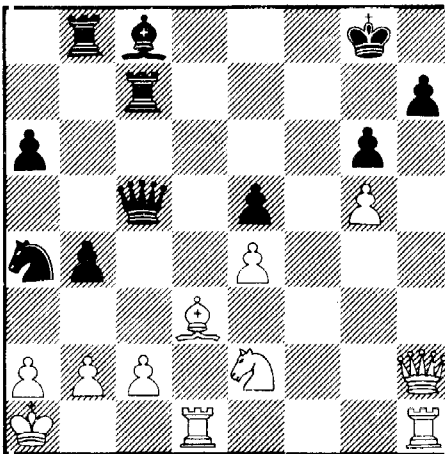

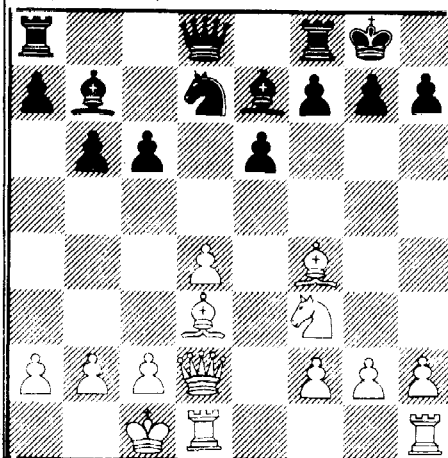

REMEMBRANCES OF CHICAGO

The Pan Am Intercollegiate Chess Championship

The University of Florida chess team of December 1978 began to take shape in April 1978. That was when University of Florida first came into serious consideration as the university to which I would transfer. At that time, I also became aware that Greg Small (the current National High School Champion) would also be attending U. of F. I began to seriously consider the possibility of entering the Pan Am. While visiting Greg during the summer, Dr. Walter Cunningham, a faculty member of the University of Florida, and a USCF Master, invited us over for a few games of speed chess. We were fortunate at that time to meet Russ Garber, also a USCF Master, who informed us of his intent to attend Florida. No doubt about it, the prospects were definitely enhanced for a good team!

In September we began to seek support in earnest, and this task was facilitated by the University of Florida student government. They contributed \$500, as well as their cheers and votes of confidence, which gave me a big psychological boost. It was a very emotional scene, not seen often in chess, and one I am glad to have been a part in causing. I feel as though everyone in the state were behind us, and this is evidenced by the fact that Art Sandeen, the vice president in charge of student affairs, the intermural department at the University of Florida, and last but not least, the Florida Chess Association all lent their support. Gill Cantrell, Doug Carpenter, IM Arnold Denker, Mark Solomon, and Larry Storch (listed in alphabetical order!) were all instrumental in relieving the FCA support, and my heartfelt thanks to them all! Once again, thanks to all that helped us.

The flight to Chicago was uneventful, and we arrived to a snowy welcome on Christmas Day in O'Hare Airport. To help team spirit, I purchased team shirts at a local sporting goods store, and we were one of the few teams there with that advantage.

All of the team members were extremely enthusiastic and devoted, but especially noteworthy was the attitude of Russ Garber. He always conducted himself in a professional manner, and added extra inspiration to the team. Rounding out the team were: Greg Small (2208), myself (2130), and Steve Schounhaut (2086). Steve, through steady play, achieved the best personal score on the team. He also had the most difficult name to spell. In sizing up the competition, we were rated third in a field of approximately 85 teams. That is Yale #1 (2256), University of Pennsylvania (2196), and University of Florida #3 (2156). Not bad for some Florida boys! The first 6 teams received a separate room for their games where the conditions were optimal. The tournament directors room was easily accessible, and it was quieter than the main room. All in all the conditions were very good.

The following account of the games of the Pan Am are purposely written with an emphasis on Florida, although I will keep the reader space with the results of the top teams, with respect to us. A competent account of the Pan Am is written by Harold Winston in the March-April issue of The Chessman.

ROUND 1:

This round saw gross mismatches in rating of the teams paired. We won easily against University of Rochester (rating 1568) with a 4-0 sweep. Yale and Penn. also scored 4-0 to win.

ROUND 2:

The rating differences were getting smaller, and Russ Garber had to play Sprenkle (a strong expert), who has an approximate 2150 rating. Florida held up under the pressure, and overcame University of Illinois/Urbana with a 1884 rating $2\frac{1}{2}$ - $1\frac{1}{2}$. This match was made closer than expected through my sloppy play versus Krause. I started snatching pawns, and was punished. Russ offered a draw in an advantageous position to assure the victory. A surprisingly close round!

ROUND 3:

Florida came out in force this round and destroyed University of Chicago "A" 4-0. Although their rating was 1951, we handeled them with style, and sweeping the series.

ROUND 4:

This round we really had to play some clutch chess. York, the sister school of University of Toronto, proved to have a really tough team, and we had to pull out all the stops to beat this #11 ranked team with a 2003 rating. A very exciting round, for this enabled us to join the elite group of undefeated teams, which included Yale, Penn., and Florida only! My game became particularly important, because the score was 2-1 in our favor, but I was a pawn down after blowing a great game. But then...

ROUND 5:

The match against Yale is no pleasant duty to report. At the beginning of the round, there were only 3 teams with perfect scores. It seems cassia was not with us this round. Rhode outplayed Russ (no shame there!); Greg gave Tisdell a great fight, but made a bad move in a defensible position; I was outplayed by Wuerch, but fought back only to miss at least a draw in terrible time pressure; Steve had his man on the ropes only to lose on time in the last move of time pressure! The net result: a 4-0 sweep for Yale.

ROUND 6:

Arizona State versus Florida

This round was the turning point (for you movie buffs) of the team spirit. In the early stages of the match, as I surveyed the boards, I felt that it would be another University of Chicago "A" all over again. On board 1 Russ had a tiny advantage on the White side of the Caro-Kann. On board 2 Greg had an extra pawn against his opponent who had negligible compensation. I had a solid positional edge, and Steve was two pawns and the attack ahead! Suddenly, Gregg's opponent got tremendous compensation, and Steve got careless for the first time in the tournament. You can't win them all, but we could still draw the match if Russ and I could win. Russ played an absolutely perfect endgame against Rowley to hand him the loss. It was unfortunate that I could not win my game. I had a solid endgame advantage, but transposed moves thus making it very unclear. I still thought I could win, but he defended well. Arizona State, really got lucky, but such is the capricious smile of cassia.

ROUND 7:

Florida against I.I.T. "A" was a very strange affair. Our team was really let down, and this was the only time we were relegated to the aquarium (err, I mean the main tournament room). It seems that luck was back on our side, but it was a little late. I played my first decent game, winning the exchange by force to have my opponent concede on move 24. Gregg was having bad luck, and lost because of a bad break. Russ sacrificed a pawn, and was forced to give up another. He was two pawns down, in a double rook endgame. Steve was a clear pawn down, and his position seemed hopeless. All in all we needed a minor miracle to win this match. All seemed lost, and I couldn't bear to watch. Steve came up to me and asked whether he could accept his opponents draw offer. I stated that he should play for a win! I considered Russ lost, and if he won (improbable as it may be), we could draw the match. Gregg was concerned, and commented that it was probably best to let Steve take a draw. I was almost convinced, when Steve came up and exclaimed, "This ones for the team!" I left to play speed chess with Sprenkle, and when I returned...Steve had won his game (Schounhaut-Klepacki see Round 7 opposite page). Meanwhile, Russ was actually drawing the game that I had considered dead lost! We won a squeaker, $2\frac{1}{2}$ - $1\frac{1}{2}$ to put us in contention for third place!

All we had to do was to beat the University of Toronto, and we would probably finish third!

ROUND 8:

Everyone got "up" for the last round, and I felt that we had a reasonable chance for victory. I felt that if we would all play our best, then we would win decisively. The pivotal games would be mine and Gregg's (in case you hadn't noticed, we were both badly off form!), and so the round began...Russ, missed a tactical threat, and lost early. Gregg had a great game, and it looked as if he would coast to an easy victory. Steve had the better game, and I was slightly worse (again!). The position became very complicated, and I reached an unclear position, but the game tells the story much better (See Round 8 Toronto-Florida opposite page).

Gregg won easily, and Steve drew. The final score was Florida $1\frac{1}{2}$ Toronto $2\frac{1}{2}$. We ended up in approximately 10th place, but somewhat disappointed.

The tournament was a great event to participate in and I will remember it well. The team members played with desire and Russ had a fine result, as did Steve. Gregg was somewhat off form, but he came through in the crucial last round. My play was inaccurate and lackluster; not representative of my style. You pay your money, and you take your chances. After a poor result at a chess tourney, I know I would have rather played and done poorly; than not to have played. For you Shakespeare fans, "It is better to have loved and lost, than never to have loved at all".

In conclusion (and I know all the readers are glad to hear that), I would like to thank all of our supporters, especially the great University of Florida student government, and the players of the team!! I will remember the snow, the snack time grill, and the incessant "freak out" song (sorry all you disco fans), and the tremendous feeling of participating in a national event. Just wait till next year, and given the opportunity we will win it all! Dispute not my dreams, for I am a man, and as Shakespeare so aptly put it in the Tempest, "For dreams are the stuff which men are made on, and our life is shrouded in a sleep."

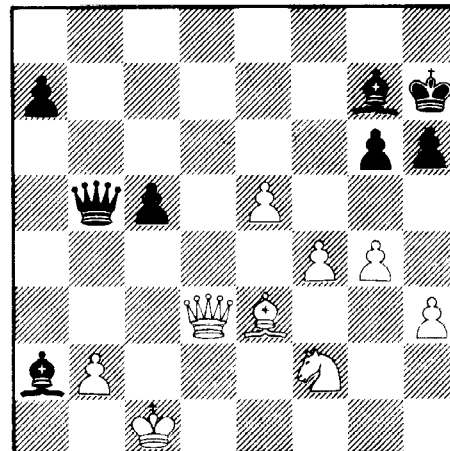

THE QUICK KILL

Most players love nothing more than to crush their opponent in the opening. One famous player once said "Before the middlegame and the endgame the gods have placed before us the opening". The following games taken from tournament play illustrates how the lack of opening knowledge can be fatal.

White Robert M. Snyder
Black T. Ellis (1942)

1 P-K4 P-K4 3 B-B4 N-B3

A poor capture. Standard book is 4...PxP 5.0-0 (best) and now Black can avoid the Max Lange with 5...NxP 6 R-K1 P-Q4 7 BxP (7 N-B3! is playable) QxB 8 N-B3 and White will recover his piece in a well known book line. 5...B-B4 6 P-K5 P-Q4 (or 6...N-KN5) 7 PxN PxP 8 R-K1ch B-K3 is the famous Max Lange Attack. For further analysis see the Two Knights Defense by Estrin for accuracy which is critical in this opening.

5 PxP

Simple and best. White recovers his pawn and makes it difficult for Black's King Knight.

5 ... B-B4?

The last and fatal blunder. Black should have played 5...N-B4.

6 Q-Q5! Resigns

Black must lose a piece because of the threat of mate and QxN.

A gross blunder. White should

THE MARSHALL ATTACK

The Marshall attack is a viable weapon against the Ruy Lopez. Though some authorities have analyzed it to a draw it offers good chances to the player who has an understanding of it. From time to time I use it in tournament play with a reasonable amount of success.

EDITORIAL

Chess in Pennsylvania by Ira Lee Riddle

This editorial is being written both gingerly and tardily. The date is April 6th, and I am still recovering from a pulled muscle in my back. I had just finished a week and four days of jury duty, and was taking out the garbage before going off to school, when a piece of paper fell out of the can. I quickly reached down to grab it, and wound up in bed for four days of pain. During that time, I did get some PSCF business transacted--- more on that later. By the way, during jury duty, I was well prepared for the boredom. I took four magazines, five books, (read all of the mags. and four of the novels), two decks of playing cards (no bridge games, but lots of double deck pinochle), and a CHESS SET. How many games of chess did I play, you ask? ONE!!! (I did win it, but only one game.) Jury duty was boring. I sat on one case that lasted for two days. Otherwise, it was pinochle.

While flat in bed, I was able to set up a playing spot for the State Championship, to be held in September. Tony Accione of the Embassy Chess Club phoned to offer any help he could, and I told him of my problems in finding a site. We were offered the Hilton Inn Northeast (Philadelphia) if we could guarantee fifty rooms and not use the facilities on Saturday night, when they have a Disco. It was felt by those I contacted that 50 rooms was impossible to guarantee, and no Saturday evening round would be very bad. So, I went into downtown Philadelphia, and the only place that seemed interested was the Ben Franklin Hotel, but they wanted \$430.00 a day for the room. I told Tony this, and he offered to check into the place where the Embassy Chess Club meets. The owner was willing to give us a very reasonable figure; I went over there to look over the facilities, and it is usable. Pete's Embassy House is a restaurant in Folsom, Pa., a Philadelphia suburb, on Pa. Route 420, just below US 1, at the intersection of 420 and McDade Boulevard. It will host our State Tournament this September 1, 2, and 3. It is not next to a hotel, but there are four or five within 2.8 miles (measured on my odometer), and I will be contacting them about rates for PSCF players that weekend. I will have more details next issue. Tentatively, six rounds in three or four sections, with a PSCF business meeting on Sunday morning. It will hopefully be listed as a grand prix tournament.

If you have recently received your April CLAR (mine came in today), you will have noticed our next two tournaments, the State Scholastics and Orrie's Perm Palace #1. We also have just gotten some extra publicity, courtesy of the Pa. Dept. of Education. Every two weeks, the D of E puts out Pennsylvania Education, a sort of newspaper. In the March 26th issue, we have a listing for the State Scholastic Chess Tournament. This had never been listed in P.E. before, and I wrote to them last December on a hope. The Editor replied that they were always looking for some news like that to print. So, if you are doing something for the schools, here is another source of publicity. Also on the scholastics, Vaux and Douglass have changed their trip to Yugoslavia so that they can play in the tournament after all. (I don't actually think that was the only reason, but I can daydream a little.)

On the first weekend in March, Centerville Jr. High School hosted 11 other teams in its Black Knights Tournament (the 9th Annual). It was a non-rated tournament run by Frank Meyer of Centerville, and any time you have 72 plus players in one room, it gets hectic. Frank did a fine job in keeping everything moving, (his team won the B division), and there should be a report elsewhere in this issue about it. I just wanted to mention it again, and to present you with a problem. The following position had to be adjudicated during the tournament.

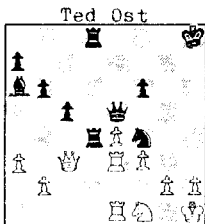

Dr. Lipkin and myself have been meeting with Mr. Pfefferkorn for the past few weeks to work out the details of the upcoming LPO. I have one more meeting with them to work out final arrangements. ...

Leland (Fuerstman) and I are good friends and we had a long talk about chess in the Charlotte area. The Metrolina Chess Club has 40 members and the Korchnoi simultaneous may boost that figure. The Knight Publishing Company went all out to make the event as successful as possible. Indeed, it was. There were 1300 responses to a chess problem as part of a contest to select opponents against Korchnoi. I will write them a letter to see if they are interested in other chess activities and perhaps sponsor a major tournament. Perhaps they may want to sponsor a Carolinas Open.

Back to the LPO. I'll suggest to Dr. Lipkin your suggestion about the 45/2 time control for the Open Section. It sounds reasonable to me. The hotel will be the Ramada Inn in Clemmons (10 miles to the west of Winston-Salem)....

The current problem that I am having is that I have had a few individuals write to me saying that they joined the NCCA at a small tournament, but haven't received their magazine yet, that their friends have gotten. In a few cases I have found out that such an individual may have renewed his membership, but changed addresses within the past few months. The old files indicate the old address and the person forgot to tell the TD of his new address.

I agree with your editorial about the addition of states and the coverage of the magazine. It seems to me that a lot of that local news makes up much of the regional news. I can easily accept Pennsylvania along with the other states in the area. The Chessman is covering the area very well with games from all levels from all the states. In my opinion, one of the most harmful editorials that ever appeared in the Carolina Gambit was a letter by one of our higher rated players in the state. He thought the Gambit was publishing too much trash and too many games by weak players and dumb articles by Wall and others. The magazine should have only top level games where something instructive (games by weak players could not be very instructive) and more quality chess would appear. After that editorial Lee Taylor told me that he was not receiving any material at all except for more of my dumb articles. What had happened was that all the contributors from the lower-rated players quit sending in games, thus chess articles, and the higher rated players simply did not contribute enough. The magazine lost its touch with the vast majority of chessplayers.

You are right about the notation. Too many players around here cannot adapt to algebraic and prefer The Chessman to keep its games in descriptive. Leave the algebraic to FIDE, ECO, and Chess Informant.

Hatchcock's puzzle was interesting. Black plays P-K4, Q-B3, QxBP, and B-K2 mate.

Witness the poor results visitors have when they play in Atlanta, and the fine results the Atlanta players get when they travel north. I am happy to report that I have carried our colors reasonably well in the few tournaments I have managed to enter.

In December I played in the Atlantic Open, put on by the CCA in Philadelphia. Playing in the 1600-1800 section, along with 95 other folks, I went through the five rounds undefeated, tying for second and third with a guy from New York, $\frac{1}{2}$ point behind the winner. Along the way, I managed to beat the winner of the most recent 1800 class World Open.

A few weeks later, I won the top open section of a smaller tournament; and in match play between chess clubs in Philadelphia and Wilmington, Delaware, I have $3\frac{1}{2}$ out of a possible four - all against higher rated opponents.

Maybe my style is confusing them, or even more likely, they are underestimating the Atlanta chess player.

Despite the strong field of players, Korchnoi managed 35 wins, 3 draws, and 2 losses. He was beaten only by Dr. O.R. Graham and Richard Fatigati, who had helped to organize the event.

EXPAND YOUR HORIZONS

Orlando: Where Youth is King

Orlando chess is in a Logans Run sition, there isn't a quality player over 30! Along with this youth comes a high level of enthusiasm and tournament participation.

Central Florida's number one player is annual City Champ. Mark Ryan. Although Mark rarely travels from his home turf, he is not a "local rating points scavenger" evidenced by his clear second behind Shocron at the last Atlanta Classic and his KO of Tom Algeo in a telephone match.

Mikel Peterson, Orlando's newest expert, has been hanging around the grade for a while, but never could seem to crack the barrier. A former city champion, Mike has the distinction of holding a certain Joe Bradford to a draw at the last LPO (This unknown went on to win his very next tournament!).

Harold Alford is another of the strong Orlando experts. Larry Storch, FCA Vice President and Orlando CC President, is without a doubt, one of the most liked and respected persons in the world of chess. He is Florida's answer to Mike Decker, and very shortly Larry should be equal to Mike over-the-board as well.

One gentleman that can't be left out when talking of Orlando is Dr. Roger Alilin. Though not the best player in the area, he more than makes up for it by being the most exciting. MASTERS MEETING AT THE MARSHALL CHESS CLUB, NEW YORK, MARCH 11, 79 by Bill Goichberg

New York area masters and former masters and participants in the Marshall International (March 10-19) were invited to this meeting by organizer Bill Goichberg. The major purpose of the meeting was to make proposals for consideration at the PCA meeting in Lone Pine, in view of the fact that most eastern masters will be unable to attend the PCA meeting.

Unfortunately, many Marshall International players did not attend due to the early starting time throughout all or most of the meeting were

Arthur Bisguier, Matthew Green, Edgar McCormick, Neil McKelvie, Edmar Mednis, Eugene Meyer, John Meyer, and John Watson. Also present for part of the meeting were Asa Hoffmann, Bruce Pandolfini, Saul Wanclick, and M. Wilder.

The following resolutions were adopted:

1. We consider the posts of USCF FIDE Delegate and Zonal President to be of great importance to all American chess-players, and especially to American Masters. USCF should choose its best qualified representatives for these posts, regardless of their ability to pay their own expenses. USCF should always provide these expenses, as the cost involved is minor considering the great significance of these posts. (passed 10-0 with no abstentions.)
2. We recommend that no Policy Board member should serve as FIDE Delegate or Zonal President. (passed 10-0 with no abstentions.)
3. We recommend that the post of FIDE Delegate and Zonal President not be held by the same person. (passed 10-0 with no abstentions)
4. We recommend that American team representatives be consulted at the Olympiad about title applications and other FIDE matters. (passed 10-0 with no abstentions.)
5. Our FIDE representatives should consider it top priority to submit all possible title applications and use every effort to insure that these applications get fair consideration. (passed 10-0 with no abstentions.)
6. The names of our title applicants should be published in CIAR early enough to insure no one will be overlooked (as in the Fedorowicz case). (passed 9-0 with 1 abstention.)
7. We suggest that the PCA write FIDE President Olafsson in support of the title application of John Fedorowicz. (passed 10-0 with no abstentions.)
8. We suggest that the PCA write FIDE President Olafsson in support of the title application of Edmar Mednis. (passed 10-0 with no abstentions.)
9. We recommend that the PCA suggest to our FIDE Delegate that:
 - A) The FIDE rules changes pertaining to GM norms which were adopted at Buenos Aires be scrapped, and the previous rules restored.
 - B) FIDE appoint an ethics committee empowered to investigate and penalize the buying and selling of points and other breaches of ethics.
 - C) A new World-GM title be created, with norms of 2651-plus. (passed 11-0 with no abstentions.)
10. We suggest PCA appoint a committee to investigate American

FIDE ratings and attempt to secure timely corrections of inaccurate ratings. (passed 7-0 with one abstention.)

U.S. Chess Saga Report by Steve Schneider

From Friday December 29, 1978 until Monday January 1, 1979, 21 Icelandic chess players under 16 years of age visited a like number of their American peers to play chess and to participate in other appropriate events in New York City.

Jay Schneider was invited to participate as part of the U.S. team (Collins Kids). This was the return match from the previous year when Jack Collins took a group of his youngsters to Iceland. Jack Collins is the former teacher of such players as Bobby Fischer, Bill Lombardy, the Byrne brothers, Salvatore Matera and many others. Jay was also invited to go to Iceland the previous year, but could not. This trip we did not miss. On Friday morning the combined groups with TV cameras going met with Allen Kaufman, Executive Director, American Chess Foundation, Gary Sperling, USCF President, Mayor Edward I. Koch of New York City and others. After several speeches and the proclamation by the Mayor of December 29 to January 4 as "Icelandic - American Chess Week" in New York City, the group went to the top of the World Trade Center. The view from there was magnificent. After that we all had a banquet at the Four Five Six Restaurant. It was great. Then in the afternoon we toured the UN. That evening a 21 board match was played at the Marshall Chess Club. We found out that not only were the Icelandic Kids interesting, but they also knew how to play chess. They won the match 18-3 with the U.S. Collins Kids team getting only 6 draws. Jay playing on board was one of those. The next day we had our second match in Wayne N.J. There we were welcomed by the community of Wayne. The mayor Walter Jasinski, and Anthony Cottell of the USCF Policy Board were our hosts. Guy Buzzonis (one of the Collins Kids) mother had prepared a large cake with a chess board and chess pieces made of cake and candy on top. The position on the cake was interesting. It was mate in one no matter which side was to move. We then were given a violin concert by Sabena Jovanovic Adrians mother and another of the Collins Kids.

Our second match was better, but we still lost 13 to 8. Jay again played board 10 and he was the top U.S. board to post a win.

That evening we all attended the Nutcracker Suite at the New York State Theater. I must add here that all the NYC food we were getting was great and Jay got his five meals every day.

On Sunday December 31, 1978 we held a speed tournament after lunch. Their top 10 boards beat ours 70-30. Jay as board 10 won only against boards 9 & 10 from the Icelandic Kids. That night we all attended a New Year's Eve party at the Marshall Chess Club. Everyone was gone before midnight as the last match was on everyone's mind.

The last match was played on Monday January 1, 1979 at the Manhattan Chess Club. The lineup was changed and the Collins Kids came closer, but still lost this time 11-9. Jay again won his game to give him 2½ and the top U.S. score. That evening all the kids participated in a tandem simultaneous exhibition given by GM William Lombardy and IM Salvatore Matera. It was a lot of fun and the kids really played well. Jay had a Rook and pawn endgame that he should have drawn, but in losing he learned how to draw it next time.

This was quite an event and several more trips are being planned for the Collins Kids of which Jay is now a member. I want to thank all of the individuals and organizations for their support of this activity which goes beyond a simple chess match.

Fuerstman Wins!

The Southern Chess Association is awarding Leland Fuerstman the chess organizer of the month award for his fantastic promotion of the Korchnoi Simultaneous in Charlotte, N.C.

Leland was able to get the Knight Publishing Company to sponsor the event and make it a big success. Knight Publishing ran, at least two huge ads in The Charlotte Observer for the event. The color ad was 16 by 12½ inches, the more modest black and white ad was 8½ by 14½ inches. You can imagine the interest stirred up by these ads, or you can read where they drew 1300 responses. Certainly this could be the nucleus of a large chess community in Charlotte.

Charlotte, as many of you know, has the least number of USCF members of any city its size in America. Many of us, led by Bill Wall, are working to reverse this situation. The further development of chess in Atlanta and the Carolinas is dependant on the development in Charlotte, and this issue of The Chessman brings that point out as clearly as any.

The Sunbelt Classic (Aug. 4-5) and the Atlanta Open this year will be held at the Atlanta Marriott, the hotel President Ford stayed at when he came to Atlanta, and what has that got to do with Leland Fuerstman? Leland, and people like him, booked those tournaments just as surely as if he walked into the lobby with pen in hand.
