### RESUMPTION OF SCCA NEWS

Resumption of publication of SCCA News was mandated by vote of the membership at the annual business meeting, as reported elsewhere in this issue. The SCCA has published a periodical more or less continuously since the early 1960's, beginning with an occasional publication issued by Prof. Robert Brand of the Citadel, who was for a number of years SCCA Secretary. Prof. Brand's researches on S. C. chess history are an invaluable resource in this area. Prof. Brand left the state around 1965, and there was no publication for over a year. Publication of a periodical called SCCA News was initiated by Lee Hyder in 1967 on assuming the SCCA presidency following the death of longtime SCCA President Lanneau Foster. After he resigned the position of Editor in 1975, the magazine was taken over by the late Charles Walter and published for about two years as The South Carolina Chess Association Newsletter. From

1978 to early 1980, our publication was incorporated into Chessman, and for two issues late in 1980, in Southeast Chess

published by the Georgia Chess Association.

Numbering and identification of the publication have not been consistent since 1976. Originally <u>SCCA News</u> was published in volumes that went from one annual meeting to the next. As we are resuming publication at the beginning of the calendar year, that will henceforth be the basis for volume numbers. As this is the fifteenth year of publication of a SCCA periodical, we are starting with Volume XV, Number 1, even though Volumes 12, 13, and 14 do not exist as such.

### POHL WINS CHAMPIONSHIP -- HWANG TAKES RESERVE

Klaus Pohl of Greer led the field all the way to become the 1980 South Carolina Chess Champion. Pohl, a master, was the highest rated player in the tournament. He justified his rating with a  $4\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$  score that was marred only by a last round draw with young David Erb of Columbia.

Finishing in a three way tie for second at 4-1 were Erb, Lee Hyder of Aiken, and J. Fred Wilson of Clover. Brb took home the Charles Walter Memorial Trophy for the top junior player, while Hyder was awarded the second place trophy and Wilson the Top A award. Lindsay Blanks of Charleston scored  $3\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$  to win the top B trophy.

In the Reserve Section, USC student Irving Hwang posted a perfect 5-0 for a convincing victory. Behind Hwang were Hank Dangerfield and Peter Anderson, of Charleston and Columbia respectively, with 4-1. Dangerfield took second on tiebreak, and Anderson the top Avunrated trophy. Arbie Vega of Lexington was top D player.

Don Lemaster directed the event, which was held at the Tremont Motor Inn in West Columbia. A total of 52 players entered the two sections, 28 in the top and 24 in the Reserve.

### OUR NEW STATE CHAMPION TELLS HIS STORY

Klaus Pohl, South Carolina Chess Champion for 1980, has been a resident of the state since 1975 (with a year away in 1979), and has scored a number of successes in Southeastern chess. Notably, he has twice won the Georgia open championships on tie-breaks, once beating out S. C. expert Charles Walter in this manner. He also tied for first with Ruben Shocron in the Dixie Open in Greenville several years ago.

Mr. Pohl graciously provided us with the following comments on the tournament and on his decisive last round game with David Erb.

"I was in serious trouble in three or four games. To illustrate this fact, see my last round encounter with Mr. Erb, rated 1844 at the time:

White: Pohl. Black: Erb.
1 b4 d5 5 a3 Ed6
2 Eb2 Nf6 6 Be2 Nbd7
3 e3 Ef5 7 d4?

NE3 66

My youthful and uninhibited opponent outplayed me positionally on the white squares. 7 di? is better replaced by 7 Nd4 and 8 ft. Shutting in the black-squared bishop on b2 by its own pawns without hope of freeing it-unless the opponent obliges--is certainly not becoming play for a champion.

7 0-0 10 Ne5 Ne4 8 Nbd2 Qe7 11 Ndf3?

9 c4 c6

I outdid myself. Immediately after this move I saw that 11 -- Nxe5 12 dxe5 BxB4!! wins a pawn for black and takes the castling privilege from white. There was only one thing for me to do: sit there poker-faced staring at e5. It worked. My opponent told me after the game that he was just thinking of how to continue his positional battle on the white squares in the center and did not pay any attention to the tactical possibilities on the queen's wing. This was certiinly his loss. But as the game shows his strategy was correct and executed flawlessly for many moves to come.

11 -- f6?

The cup had passed by.

12 Nxd7 Qxd7

13 0-0

This does not get the king out of trouble, as the game will show, but the white development could not be very well completed otherwise.

13 -- Bg4 14 Rc1 Qf71

Threatens 15 -- Qh5 and 16 -- Bxf3 winning a piece.

### POHL VS. ERB (CONT.)

How precarious the White position still is in a tactical sense can be seen from the fact that 15 Nd2? to exchange some pieceswould be met by 15 -- Qh5 winning a piece because of the weakness on h2.

15 h3 Bh5 17 Qxe2 f5

16 Nd2 Bxe2 18 Qd3

To prevent 18 -- f4 and prepare 19 f3.

18 -- Qh5

19 14

19 f3 did not seem good. On 19 -- Qh4 20 f4 is necessary anyway, because 20 fxe4 fxe4 seems to lose for white in all variations.

19 -- Be7?

But now my opponent embarks on the wrong plan. The bishop is needed on dó to guard the only entry point for a white rook on c7 should white play cxd5 in the future. Then exd5 (instead of cxd5) would allow b5 with immediate counterplay on the queen's wing for white. Secondly, and more important, it minimizes the advantage of the "good" black squared black bishop as the game continuation proves.

20 Nxe4 dxe4 21 Qd1 Qh6

21 Qui Quo 22 Rc21 g5

Too late for a decisive advantage. This was the move called for on black's 19th. The threat would have been 20 -- g4!

23 851

The first counter of white, and well prepared with Rc2.

23 -- gxf4 26 Rd2 cxd5 24 exf4 exd5 27 Rxd5 Qc6?

25 cxd5 Rad8

Black had much better with 27-Qe6 which would have won the open d-file and supported the possible advance of the protected passed pawn on e4, but more important, would have kept the a2-g8 diagonal in black's possession.

28 Rxd8 Rxd8

29 Qb3+ Kf8

30 Rc1

Now white is better. Not positionally, because of black's passed center pawn, but because of the black king's exposed position.

30 -- Rd3 52 Rxc6 bxc6

31 Qxd3 exd3 33 Bc1?? Bh5!! The cover position How many bad moves should a master be allowed before being disqualified? With 33 Bc3 the game would have been all but over, despite black's reply, as in the game 33--Bh5!!. For now white calmly plays g4 (instead of g3 as in the game to win a tempo) and frees his king via g2 and f3. The difference is that Bc3 guards e1 where the black bishop aims to go.

### POHL VS. ERB (CONT.)

If white were not to give up a pawn by 34 g3, he would end up in a complete bind after 34 Kf1 Bg3! 35 Bd2 Ke7 heading for the decisive square c2!

34 g3 Hxg3 35 Bd2 Bh5 36 Kg2 Be7

The Editor and Mr. Pohl analyzed the alternative 36--Bf6. 37 Kf2, heading for the pawn loses, because after Bd4+ the bishop cannot interpose. But 37 Kf3! draws, e. g. 37 --Bd4 38 Be3 Bb2 39 Bxa7 Bxa3 40 Bc5+ (if 39--Bc† in this line 40 Bb8!) or if 38--d2 39 Bxd2 Kf7 40 Ke2 Ke6 41 Kd3 Kd5 42 a4.

### KOLTY'S EASTERN TOUR

The North Augusta Chess Club had the honor of sponsoring the final exhibition on what has been described as George Koltanowski's final exhibition tour. The veteran showman, who celebrated his 77th birthday the month before the tour, spoke before a group of about 25 chess fans, and concluded his show with his famous "knight's tour", a display of memory that is truly remarkable.

Kolty's tour was no small feat for a person of any age. his remarks on the tour that he sent to his friends included the following:

### MY FINAL TOURILL

Was it Chicago, Atlanta, or Timbuktu that Robert F. Sutter, Jr., talked me into accepting his invitation to be guest speaker at the Awards Banquet sponsored by the St. Louis Chess Foundation? As a result, a dozen chess clubs were contacted re a possible "Evening (or afternoon) With Koltanowski". Seven other clubs accepted; others wanted in, but I did not want to be on the tour more than two weeks. I was advised to get a "circular ticket" on Delta Airlines. This ticket does not allow you to miss any flight, which gave me some hair raising experiences.

My shows started in Fort Worth October 8, and concluded in North Augusta, SC, on October 19. There were four appearances on the final four days.

--In Fort Worth I was pleasantly surprised to meet Jim Morgan and David Rogers, from Applied Concepts, makers of Boris 2.5. I naturally approached them during my in erval, and after some discussion, was told to tell all 8 clubs on my tour that a Boris 2.5 chess microcomputer would be presented in my name free to each club!! (These were delivered in early January. ed.) Thank you, Applied Concepts! (We will report on this remarkable device next issue. ed.)

Sunday, October 19. After almost missing my plane in Savannah (it would have cost me my ticket) I had gone to Jacksonville on Saturday, and from there to an early arrival in Augusta on Sunday. I was met by Dr. Lee Hyder and his three sons. Was shown the Towers Hotel where the match Mecking-Korchnoi took place a few years ago.

My show was held in North Augusta, SC, and a reasonable attendance helped me finish my last show of the tour. I finished fairly well, (an understatement--ed.) after all that "jet-lag" and knights tours. Mrs. Hyder treated me royally, as did Lee and his sons. Mrs. Hyder's birth-day is the same as mine!

Once again to Atlanta, then to my home in San Francisco, feeling fine--now that the tour is over. After a day or so, I did have to rest up from the tour, and have been

resting since! After all, at this age of 77 running around is for the birds.

Allow me to thank one and all for the wonderful reception I received everywhere! Hope my visit helped stimulate interest in chess. If it has, then my tour was more than worthwhile. There is no finer game than chess and there are no nicer friends than chessplayers!

### CONSTITUTION AND BYLANS OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA CHESS ASSOCIATION

### ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this organization shall be the South Carolina Chess Association, hereinafter abbreviated SCCA.

### ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

The SCCA is an organization of chess players and those interested in chess who reside in the State of South Carolina, and non-residents declared to be members by the Secretary. The purpose of the SCCA is to encourage and foster the playing of chess in South Carolina through tournament and match competition, assistance in local organization, publication of a periodical, and by all other feasible means.

### ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP AND DUES

- A. Any person is eligible to become a member of the SCCA upon application. There shall be no bar to membership for reasons other than immoral character or abuse of membership privileges.
- 8. 1. There shall be three classes of members, Patron, Junior, and Senior, all of whom shall have voting privileges. Junior members shall consist of those 18 years of age and younger.
- Dues for each class of member shall be established by majority vote of those members present at an annual business meeting, and may be altered by a similar vote at any subsequent annual meeting.

### ARTICLE IV - GOVERNMENT

- A. The government of the SCCA shall be vested in an Executive Committee: a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, the immediate past President, and the Editor of the SCCA NEWS. Their duties shall be those usual to their offices and any additional duties prescribed herein.
- B. Except for the Editor of the SCCA NEWS, who is appointed by the President, the length of term for officers shall be one year. Officers are elected at the annual business meeting. Should the office of President become vacant, the Vice-President assumes the office of President. Vacancies in other offices will be filled by appointment of the President for the unexpired portion of the term only.
- Any member of the SCCA eligible to vote is eligible to serve as an officer, elected or appointed.

### ARTICLE V - MEETINGS

A. A business meeting of the SCCA shall be held on one of the days the annual closed tournament is being played. The time, place, and agenda of the meeting shall be furnished all members a reasonable length of time in advance of the meeting.

- B. A special meeting of the organization may be called by the President, provided that each member is notified by mail at least thirty days in advance of the stated time of the meeting.
- C. A quorum for SCCA meetings shall consist of fifteen members.
- D. The rules contained in Robert's <u>Rules of Order</u> shall govern the organization in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with the Constitution and Bylaws of the SCCA.
- E. The President shall appoint a Nominating Committee of five persons in advance of the meeting to present a list of nominees for the elective offices on the Executive Committee.

### ARTICLE VI - TOURNAMENTS AND MATCHES

- A. The SCCA shall sponsor a closed tournament each year and such other tournaments the organization may decide are practicable. The closed tournament shall be limited to residents of South Carolina; temporary residence, such as that at an educational institution or a military base will qualify a player in this category. The winner of the closed tournament shall be declared South Carolina chess champion. If two or more players tie for first place, they shall be declared co-champions.
- B. In keeping with the purpose of the SCCA, the officers of the organization shall be alert and responsive to opportunities and desires for additional tournaments, such as speed tournaments, team tournaments, and junior tournaments; interstate and interclub matches, chess exhibitions, and chess instruction.
- C. The Executive Committee is authorized to arrange dates, locations, schedules, entry fees, prizes, and special conditions for all tournaments, matches, and exhibitions sponsored by SCCA, not inconsistent with Section A.
- D. In conduction a SCCA sponsored tournament, the tournament director shall have full charge. He shall be governed by the Laws of Chess of the Federation Internationale des Echecs (FIDE) and of the United States Chess Federation (USCF), except as amended by him and announced to all the players in a meeting in advance of play. In all disputes his decision shall be binding providing it is upheld by a majority of the tournament committee.
- E. The tournament director shall have the power to disqualify from the tournament any player, or expel from the playing site any non-player, who violates tournament rules and regulations; interferes in any way with the normal conduct of games in which he is not a contestant; uses the tournament for purposes other than chess, such as solicitation of business; or refuses to abide by the decisions of the tournament director.
- F. The director shall appoint an adjudication committee and a tournament committee and explain their duties before play begins.
- G. No tie-breaking system shall be used to determine final ranking of players in SCCA tournament, although tie-break points may be used by the tournament director himself and may be used with the published results.

### ARTICLE VII - PUBLICATION

A. The SCCA shall publish a periodical at least three times a year. It shall contain announcements, results of chess events, dates for meetings, news items, articles, editorials, games, and other material on chess. The publication shall be named SCCA NEWS.

### ARTICLE VIII - AFFILIATION

- A. The SCCA shall be a franchised affiliate of the United States Chess Federation.
- B. USCF membership shall be required of each entrant in a tournament, match, or exhibition sponsored or co-sponsored by the SCCA.
- C. The SCCA President shall be the USCF Delegate for South Carolina, and the Vice-President shall be a Voting Member or first Alternate Voting Member, if the state does not qualify for a Voting Member. Additional Alternate Voting Members shall be appointed by the President.

### ARTICLE IX - AMENDMENT

This Constitution and Bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any annual meeting held in accordance with the provisions of Article V.

### NORTH AUGUSTA TEAM WINS CSRA TEAM TITLE

A team of players from the North Augusta Chess Club won the championship of the five team CSRA Chess League by winning two matches and drawing two. A team of Augusta, Georgia, players finished second with 2½-1½; three teams sponsored by the Savannah River Plant Recreation Association (ORA) constituted the remainder of the field.

The matches were all close and hotly contested. ORA # 1, captained by SCCA Secretary Chuck Braun, drew all the higher teams and lost to the tail-enders. The decisive match proved to be a 22-12 defeat of Augusta by North Augusta. Members of the winning team included Rex Blalock, Bob Jones, Charles Shaffer, Harry Bell, Bill Bodgen, and Ken Yost.

The outstanding sportsmen had to be ORA Team # 2, who turned down a forfeit win that would have clinched them second place. They eventually lost the game, and were dropped to third.
