

There were two masters, and three experts, and when the 1995 Snowstorm finished, none of them were in first place. Instead, first place was taken by A-Player Mike Williams. Mike won his first four games, including a defeat of Georgia master Rex Blalock in Round 4, and so was able to afford a draw with Doug Holmes in the final round. Holmes could have won the event by winning, but couldn't do it, and so finished in a tie for second at 4-1. Along with him were Charleston master Matthew Morris, who played two draws along the way, and Pat Hart, who got one of the draws with Morris.

A total of 37 players entered the annual Charleston event.

The Spartanburg Chess Club has held several tournaments. David Garvey won the top section of both TechChess I (March 25) and TechChess II (April 22) with perfect 3-0 scores. David R. Williams won the Scholastic Section of TechChess I with a perfect score of 5-0, and he scored 3-1 in TechChess II. Curtis Cantrell won the nonrated section of TechChess I. David K. Williams and Bruce Dillenbeck directed.

The 1995 March Quads were held at the Spartanburg Club March 14 and 21. Spencer Mathews and Davy Williams (1995 S. C. middle school Champion) were section winners. In a blitz tournament on April 11 Mathews, Greg Frady, and David Garvey tied for first with 9 of 11 each.

RECORD TOTAL IN SCHOLASTICS

No fewer than 73 players descended upon Columbia's Airport High School to contest the 1995 S.C. Scholastic Championships. That event thus became one of the largest chess tournaments, for any age of players, in our state's history.

Joe Patterson, Brent Bovay, and Paul Potulicki all went 4-0 to become the state high school co-champions. Patterson and Bovay were old rivals for high-school supremacy; but Potulicki was a new player entering his first event! Following these leaders were nine players with 3-1 scores: Jonathan Dowty, Shabeeb Tauhid, Stanley Puckett, Jonathan Puckett, Kevin Bathurst, John Sanda, James Roy, Michael New, and Buddy Martel. In all, 46 competed in the high-school championship.

The 17-player middle-school tourney was taken by David R. Williams with a 4-0 score. Sheeba Tauhid, Ian Goldberg, Michael Robinette, and Sean Strickland tied for second place.

For the first time, a separate tournament for elementary-school players was held. The ten-player field yielded three co-champions, all with 3-1 scores: Yusef Khalil, Jonathan Lisi, and Timmy Rankin. Parity was the rule in the event, as there were no perfect scores and no zero scores.

The continued growth of the scholastic program is evident in the improved quality of play at all levels. Of the 31 USCF memberships sold, 26 of them were Youth memberships, with Chess Life subscriptions. This is quite a change from the past, when most players insisted on free tournament memberships with no magazine. Later, when those memberships were eliminated, most players demanded the cheaper School Mates subscription even when that magazine was very age-inappropriate. The USCF has taken the position that chess literature provides as much enjoyment as playing, by giving players a sense of belonging to a worldwide organization with a rich history; hopefully, Chess Life exposure will aid the development of the hobby in interested youngsters.

Six high-school teams were represented, with the team score being based on the individual scores of its members. The result was a down-to-thewire race for the team plaque, with Stratford winning it with an 11-5 record from its four players: Jonathan Dowty (3), Stanley Puckett (3), Jonathan Puckett (3), and Raymond Dowty (2). The other five teams all finished very close to that total; the teams were Wade Hampton, Saluda, the Governor's School for Science and Mathematics, Airport, and Sumter.

Special thanks, as always, go to the adult coaches who make scholastic chess a success. Dr. Clyde Smith, Michael Spohn, Wayne Williams, David Williams, Dean Roesner, Bill Corbett, and Curt Landrum all helped in the direction and organization of this event.

The hospitality of Airport High once again contributed immeasurably to the success of these tournaments, and to the many smiles on the faces of the participants.

David Garvey won the top section of TECHCHESS I a tournament held at Spartanburg Technical College on March 25, 1995. Davy Williams, a sixth-grader, was the top elementary player and Timmy Rankin, a third-grader, was the primary winner. Curtis Cantrell won the nonrated section.

THE PRESIDENT'S PAGE

The overall growth of the USCF is apparent in South Carolina, which has now about 450 USCF members. That is presumably an all-time high; in the early 1960's, there were only 17 USCF members in this state!

Wayne Williams, our state's club development chairman, is busily building a database for our membership that will allow him to engage in various promotional activity. Wayne, together with Bill Corbett, is active in reviving the Greenville chess club and putting out its newsletter.

Here in Columbia, Bill Floyd is actively making a go of the new chess center. Donations and tournament profits are so far supporting the \$250 monthly rent, but support is needed on an ongoing basis.

A welcome SCCA membership renewal was received from Cliff Hyatt, who has undergone a long convalescence. A very welcome visitor to the Columbia chess center recently was Dr. Jim Fant, one of the survivors of the Charlotte airplane crash last summer. Jim has fully healed from his injuries and still plays a strong game of chess.

I am in the process of seeking our site for this year's state championship. As you know, I had to find last year's site in a major hurry when our traditional, already-advertised. Tremont venue abruptly went out of business. This year, I will have more time to check out the whole metro area.

I had to change my home phone number to another unlisted one, when some undesirable obtained our old number; and a threatening call in a disguised voice was later left on our machine. I would rather not publish the new number; but anyone wishing to reach me may call one of the other state officers to get it.

The movie "Searching for Bobby Fischer" appeared recently (I think three times) on HBO. The video is now on sale by the USCF.

I memtioned in an earlier magazine the excellent selection of chess books at the giant Waldenbooks at the Columbiana Center (I-26 and Harbison Blvd). I have to add the "Books-A-Million" chain to the list of great places to shop for chess books. (One of their stores is located two parking lots over from the Columbiana.)

Joe Patterson, our state amateur champion and high school co-champion, has helped to publicize chess in Columbia media. An article about Joe appeared in <u>The State</u>, and another article in his high school newspaper. Yes, the papers sometimes do publish good news!

Controversy continues to rage at the national and international level about the planned reunification of the world championship next year. The FIDE finalists, Karpov and Kamsky, have signed a document questioning the reunification plans and demanding to be involved in the negotiations. Their motives are not hard to discern, if one has read their previous interviews and comments. Karpov has been a bitter foe of Kasparov not only for chess reasons; the two are prominent figures (on opposite sides) in their nation's ideological battles between democracy and communism. Karpov was clearly hoping that the PCA would self-destruct, and the idea of a joint venture of FIDE and the PCA is unpalatable to him for a number of reasons. Kamsky, by contrast, has strongly implied in previous publications that he thinks having two world championships may be great because of the extra money! His father, in one interview, said that they would "consider" a single world title if certain conditions were met!

The controversy has affected the USCF leadership, as I mentioned in our last issue, since the USCF cast the deciding vote in re-electing Campomanes and thereby supports the Kasparov-Campomanes proposal. There followed a rash of angry letters and columns protesting the USCF position, on the grounds that Kasparov and Campomanes had engaged in allegedly unethical activities in securing his re-election. I decided to enter the letter-writing frenzy by urging chess leaders to calm down, consider the issues in a different way, and work together pragmatically for the most important goals (particularly preserving the value of the world title).

Needless to say, I don't expect my views to prevail or even be audible in the raging storms of controversy. However, I feel some sense of ethical responsibility in all of this, since I authored the USCF's official pesition of endorsing a collaboration between the PCA and FIDE in achieving a unified title system. At the time I sponsored the motion stating that position last August, it was relatively non-controversial. It replaced a motion by a New England delegate that would have implied support for the PCA title. No one then could foresee that such a unification would be formally offered only four months later--much less the shocking re-entry of the "retiring" Campomades back into the FIDE presidency! Yet, Kasparov's adamant insistence that he would not negotiate unification with any other FIDE president was a major factor in the Policy Board's vote. Thus, I feel a bit guilty when I read about the Board's being so strongly attacked.

Interestingly, I think the USCF's position may have been one of the earliest published calls for a FIDE-PCA collaborative unification of the world title. Although most chessplayers supported a single title, the general expectation was that either the FIDE or the PCA title would stand alone, after the other organization gave up its claim.

We hope to see you all at the S.C. Open and other events coming up!

The Editor's Page


