- Diapers (disposable or cloth)
- Paper towels
- Condoms
- Feminine hygiene products (tampons, pads, sanitary wipes)
- Baby wipes and "flushable" wipes (these do not break down well)
- Cotton balls, swabs, or pads
- Dental floss
- Bandages
- Disposable gloves
- Facial tissues
- Cat litter (even "flushable" types)
- Q-tips
- · Plastic items of any kind
- Rags, towels, washcloths, or clothing
- Food scraps, grease, oils, or fats
- Coffee grounds, eggshells, or nutshells
- Paints, solvents, or chemicals
- Medications (pills, liquids, creams)
- Cigarette butts
- Hair (from shaving or brushing)
- Paper other than toilet paper (such as napkins, receipts, wrappers)
- Household cleaning wipes
- Bleach or harsh chemical cleaners (use septic-safe alternatives instead)
- Pesticides, herbicides, or automotive fluids
- Expired or leftover pharmaceuticals

Only human waste and septic-safe toilet paper should be flushed. Everything else should go into the trash, compost, or appropriate disposal method.
