Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

I am writing to share with you an update on the 2025 Lenten Collection. To date, we have received a total of \$89,825.73 from our parishes to be allocated to agencies serving our vulnerable populations. I want to thank you for your generosity towards "the least of these" (cf. Matthew 25:40) as our community needs continue to evolve and grow. Our finance department has rounded the total to \$89,800 to make distribution easier. The remaining funds and any additional donations received in 2025 will be rolled over to the 2026 collection.

St. Paul's Great Hymn to Charity (cf. 1 Corinthians 13:1-13) reminds us that even our most noble endeavours come to nothing without love. Animated by this Christian love that honours the inherent dignity of the stranger and demands radical hospitality, the Lenten Committee sought to prioritize agencies that are providing immediate relief to those who are experiencing deep material and spiritual need in our communities. As in past years, agencies assisting with food insecurity, pregnant mothers, disadvantaged youth and the unhoused were identified as recipients for donations in 2025. Human trafficking was also identified as a new priority during this collection cycle.

When I look upon the continued generosity and service of our faithful, I see "pilgrims of hope" on the move. This hope, born from a deep love of God, rooted in the promise won by the death and resurrection of Jesus, and constantly renewed by the Holy Spirit, is salt and light to a weary world. In this jubilee year of hope and beyond, continue to "[I]et your light shine before others, so they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven" (Matthew 5:16).

Based out St. Mary's Cathedral, the Drop-In Centre and winter overnight shelter provide hospitality to Kingston's most vulnerable population through nourishing meals, clothing, laundry and shower services.

Provides food, fellowship, prayer, and other essential services to vulnerable people looking for community and connection in the Napanee area.		
Grace Inn Shelter, Belleville	Western	\$7,500
Grace Inn provides emergency housing for adults in a safe environment, with a special focus on dignity, community, and mentorship.		

St. Mary of Egypt Refuge, Madoc  Provides a natural setting for respite and support to various groups, including vulnerable populations.	Western	\$7,500

Provides education, resources, and peer support to mothers and their families through pregnancy into the postpartum period.		
The Natural Family Planning Association – Ontario	Northern, Eastern, Central, and Western	\$500
The agency provides free natural family planning services and education based on the Billings Ovulation Method to anyone residing within the Archdiocese of Kingston.		
Help our Students Program	Eastern	\$3,200 (Sponsors two students
The program provides financial assistance to students living in difficult circumstances to help them graduate high school.		in the Eastern Deanery at \$1,600 each)
The San Damiano Foundation (SDF), Locations in Madoc, Trenton, & Tweed	Western	\$5,000
The SDF provides safe places for youth where prayer, love, kindness, and virtuous behavior are acceptable norms.		
Religious Hospitallers of St. Joseph, Peru, Mexico, and Dominican Republic	Abroad	\$6,000 (\$2,000 per site)
Helping the affirmed with their medical needs. In spite of the limited facilities, the clinic in Dominican Republic can receive up to 200 out-patients a day. The Education Centre teaches skills such as sewing, carpentry, and cooking to the impoverished young people. They provide care for		

the elderly in St. Anthony's Home for the destitute aged.
