Four men from the Disaster Relief Team came on March 29 and accomplished a great deal toward clearing the underbrush and overgrowth in the cemetery. They were able to cut down a couple of trees that needed to go, but didn't have the proper equipment to cut dead limbs, etc. Others have plan to do that in the near future.

One Civil War Veteran was mentioned in the earlier newsletter. Further research has found that burials include a total of 13 men who fought in the Civil War, 2 who fought in World War I and 2 veterans of World War II. Both Confederate and Union soldiers are here. Most of them do not have stones, but are on earlier lists of burials. Being sure there is a marker for each of them is planned, although their individual graves are no longer known.
