When the Board met with a professional in cemetery restoration at their first meeting last September, his first suggestion was that gates and a fence be installed. This will make the area much more secure from vandals and drive-thru vehicles. There is open access for individuals near each gate.

Border lines were not definitely established when the Cemetery had its first burials. A few stones had to be moved a short distance to remain in Thomas, or to not be under the fence. Care will be given in replacing these close to their original spots.

Other good news is that North Little Rock Parks and Recreation Department will be in charge of maintaining the grounds in the future. regular mowing, trimming and spraying provided will permit the Association to work toward additional restoration projects.



To Honor a Hero of War

Body of Lieut. Elmus Coleman will lie in State at City Hall. The body of Second Lieut. Elmus Coleman who was killed overseas in 1918, will lie in state from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. today at the City Hall. All city offices will be closed during these hours. Lieutenant Coleman formerly was in Company H, 16th infantry and was wounded in action in France and taken to a hospital, where he died of his wounds July 19, 1918. He is survived by his wife, Annie Wells Coleman and his five year old daughter Thelma Coleman, four brothers George Coleman, Emmett Coleman, Marion Coleman and John Coleman and one sister Mrs. Bertha Elstrom.
