HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS HOW DID WE BEGIN?

PILOT PROGRAM

Addressing Workforce Development Barriers May 2018 - July 2020

The organization's foundation is rooted in a mother's fight against systemic injustices, focusing on black and brown communities. The President initiated a pilot program to address challenges in areas plagued by mass incarceration, prison reform, and community healing. Running from May 2018 to July 2020, the Pilot Program in Maryland identified risks and operational challenges in reentry practices, emphasizing safety, service delivery, and community resources.

Pilot Program Participants:

Gender: 59 females, 42 males, 11 unspecified.

Age Groups: 112 (adults (24-58), 23 young adults (16-24), 12 youth (11-19); Total: 147. Religion: 28 Muslim, 50 Christian, 15 Baptist, 10 Jewish, 18 Catholic, 26 non-affiliated.

Race: 89 African American, 11 Caucasian, 47 Hispanic.

Identified Barriers:

Challenges included criminal backgrounds, homelessness, limited education, language barriers, citizenship issues, healthcare challenges, lack of parental support, no medical insurance, financial literacy, poor school attendance, and low confidence.

Service Inquiries:

Focused on workforce development, technology literacy, vital records assistance, poverty management, healthcare coordination, academic guidance, vocational training, entrepreneurship challenges, and personal struggles. For example, Academic Goals (What am I supposed to do after high school? How do I pay for college? What about starting a business?)

Pilot Success:

Some of the noted improvements are academic performance, community support (carpooling, childcare, time management), social media engagement for tutoring and resume building, and access to business networking and professional resources. The pilot program effectively transformed a challenging situation into a healing opportunity, engaging 147 Maryland residents. It underscored the need for comprehensive support, blending practical and emotional aid. The program's success in developing strategic management and linking tailored services has been crucial for those involved with the criminal justice system, both pre-and post-release, offering a replicable model for similar challenges in other communities.

HOW NSNS SURVIVED THE PANDEMIC: HYBRID

O2 RE-ENTRY MODEL Launch of Reentry Model

Launch of Reentry Model for Returning Citizens

In the next phase, NSNS launched its Reentry Model tailored for juvenile offenders and returning citizens. This model was a response to the findings from the pilot study and was designed to provide targeted support for individuals reentering society. This period saw the introduction and implementation of new programs and strategies aimed at enhancing skill development, providing support systems, and creating life sustaining opportunities to facilitate a smoother reintegration process.

Empowerment and Change: The No Struggle No Success, Inc. Vision

With a steadfast commitment to breaking the cycle of re-incarceration, "No Struggle No Success" (NSNS) emerges as a pivotal force in societal transformation. Recognized as a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, NSNS is more than an entity; it's a dynamic movement championing the cause against the systemic barriers that contribute to repeated imprisonment and high rates of mass incarceration within the state.

NSNS's mission is clear and compelling: To remove all obstacles and excuses from returning to prison and delivering readily available resources to change the justifications that lead to using illegal "street" alternatives. This strategic approach aims to bridge the critical gaps in freedom, family, and finance, facilitating a transition from a life of constraints to one of opportunities.

Throughout the pandemic, "No Struggle No Success" (NSNS) successfully adapted and expanded its operations, showcasing resilience and commitment to its mission. The organization effectively leveraged technology to maintain and enhance its program delivery, ensuring uninterrupted support for its beneficiaries. This adaptability not only sustained but also strengthened NSNS's capacity to serve the community during these challenging times.

Additionally, NSNS capitalized on the heightened awareness of social and economic disparities brought on by the pandemic. This led to an increase in collaborations with other organizations and the securing of additional funding. These strategic partnerships and resources were instrumental in expanding NSNS's reach and impact, allowing it to offer more comprehensive and tailored services to those reentering society post-incarceration.

The impact of NSNS is both profound and quantifiable. Over 600 criminal justice involved individuals, encompassing both youth and adults in Maryland, have recharted their courses, stepping through NSNS's doors into new beginnings. This significant achievement is a testament to the organization's effectiveness in reducing recidivism rates. NSNS's comprehensive reentry model, enclosed a suite of program services and resources, stands as a beacon of hope. It's not just a program; it's a preventive strategy against the revolving door of the prison system, fortifying family ties and planting the seeds of generational wealth. NSNS's dedication and results underline its role as a catalyst for change, transforming lives and shaping futures.

HOW IT IS DONE?

03 MASTERED RE-ENTRY MODEL

MASTERY OF REENTRY YOUTH AND ADULT

NSNS concentrated on refining the Reentry Model for re-entry citizens. During this phase, the Reentry Model was expanded to include a comprehensive range of services, addressing various aspects of their lives at a realistic level.

Empowering Transformation: The unwavering commitment and inspiration by NSNS leadership led the effectiveness of NSNS's programs is not just evident, it's remarkable. Dominating a 97% success rate in preventing recidivism, NSNS stands as a beacon of successful rehabilitation. Its diverse roster group all can benefit from the program's personalized, inclusive, and empathetic approach. The substantial number of successful discharges, coupled with an impressively low rate of re-offenses, speaks volumes about the impact and efficacy of the program.

Since March 2021, the inclusion of adult women has highlighted NSNS's dedication to reaching a wide range of demographics. The program's high success rate, even among more challenging cases, is a testament to its thorough and caring methodology to snap back, improve, and grow. NSNS's vision extends beyond individual transformation. It's bridging critical gaps in freedom, family, and finance. The growth of each participant contributes to personal safety, family unity, and generational wealth. This vision aligns with the organization's ethos of creating safe and prosperous communities, starting with each person it touches.









NSNS Analysis of Offenses 2020-2023 (Graph 3)




Graph 3 depicts the prevalent offenses for which NSNS has received referrals. Sex offenses and manslaughter are the least common charges, each making up 2% of the total.

Graph 6: illustrates the number of participants who received re-entry services vs. referral management services from NSNS. NSNS services adult participants 7 times more than youth. In response, NSNS has sought to increase youth engagement by implementing The Social Cube and conducting workshops at Baltimore City Public Schools.

2020-2023 NSNS Direct Services Versus Referral Management Services: A Comparison (Graph 6)



BJS reports that across 34 states 21% of recently released state prisoners re-offend within the first year of release.* Comparatively, NSNS reports a recidivism rate of less than 1% yearly.



RE-ENTRY GLOSSARY

Case Management: This encounter is between NSNS and a participant who is currently incarcerated and/or receiving services in the community. It includes status progress updates, home plan services, and linkage to resources.

Referral Management: This service is provided to incarcerated individuals and offers onsite school services to students. NSNS completes the youth transition or re-entry screening, which involves communication with the referring agency, requesting supplemental documents, and conducting re-entry interviews, among other associated tasks.

Successful Discharge: This occurs when individuals have completed their customized re-entry home plan. An active program participant commits to 6, 12, or 18 months of NSNS programming and community linkage. Participants who reach a satisfactory level of community supervision, complete program requirements, exhibit positive behaviors, and report an increase in their overall well-being are considered successfully discharged.

Unsuccessful Discharge: This is categorized as:

- 1. Violating the code of conduct (includes community partner) with unfavorable conduct.
- 2. Failing to show or call for appointments three times and/or over 45 days of no communication.
- 3. Displaying inappropriate behaviors, disrespect, or an increase in behavioral health concerns with NSNS staff, community partners, or at public events.
- 4. Exhibiting a threat to public safety.
- 5. Declining the use of program services offered or the intervention planning agreement.
- 6. Engaging in inappropriate communications with community partners (including independent living units).
