FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Today is the first Sunday of Advent! So, what is Advent?

Advent is the time when we get ourselves ready for the birth of Jesus. We start getting excited for Christmas, with all the decorating, and baking and shopping. But there is much, much more to Christmas than the excitement of Christmas day!

We have to remember that the BIG celebration of Christmas is because it was the day the Jesus was born. Jesus was born to save the world. That is HUGE! So we have to get our hearts ready to celebrate the birth of Jesus. How do we do that?

We can start by marking each week of Advent by lighting an Advent Candle. This helps us realize how close we are to the big day. Ask your mom or dad if you have an Advent wreath in your home. If not, I have attached an advent wreath that you can color. But each week, the candle is a special color and gives us something special to think about that week. So let's talk about the Advent wreath.

THE ADVENT WREATH

The Advent wreath has four candles.

Week One: This week you color the first candle PURPLE. This candle reminds us to be **HOPEFUL** and trust that God is with us and will guide us.

Week Two: This week you will light two candles PURPLE. This week we will pray for **PEACE** and ask Jesus to help us bring peace to others.

Week Three: This week you will light two PURPLE candles and one PINK candle. This week we think about the **JOY** we feel we think about Jesus' arrival.

Week Four: This week like three PURPLE candles and one PINK candle. The theme this week is **LOVE**. We tell Jesus how much we love him and ask for his help in loving others.

[Open arms upward, then cheer!]


As Advent begins, we hear Jesus warn his listeners—and us—to be alert and watchful. What are we to be watching and waiting for? In the Gospels, Jesus was referring to his Second Coming and the end of the world as we know it. In fact, the apostles and his early friends and followers were so certain that Jesus was returning soon that they believed it would happen in their lifetimes.


Now, 2,000 years later, we sometimes take for granted that the world probably isn't about to end anytime soon, despite the COVID pandemic, natural disas-

ters, and racial tensions of 2020. Yet maybe Jesus is still calling us to be alert to all of the opportunities we have to love and be loved right now, today, because we don't know how much time we have left on this earth.

It is common to hear victims of natural disasters or tragic violence say, "I never imagined this would happen to us. I never imagined this would happen here." Maybe part of what they are saying is that they were sleepwalking through life, taking their lives and the lives of their loved ones for granted.

If we knew we only had a short time left to live, how would we want to spend our remaining time? What

if we knew our child or spouse or parent would be taken from us soon? How might our priorities change? Even if we aren't motivated to stay watchful for the end of this world, Jesus is still calling us to be alert so that we don't miss the opportunities to love and serve the people of this world while we have the chance. What is passing us by because we are too busy and distracted to notice?

Questions of the Week

Every few years a small Christian group predicts that the end of the world is in sight. We might not pay much attention, but how would you live life differently if you only had a few weeks or days to live? What would you change? What concrete actions would you take?

In what particular area(s) of your life do you take things for granted? How could you change?

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
