Oakley Park was completed by Capt. Daniel Byrd Jr. in 1835 and opened as a museum in 1941 and is on the National Register of Historic places. The house was most famously home to General Martin Gary, a key influence during Reconstruction. The house was purchased in 1941 to be used as a shrine to his memory by the United Daughters of the Confederacy who operate the museum within. Displays include topics of American history including The War of 1812, Edgefield pottery, the Civil War, and the Spanish American War. We welcome academic researchers and interns. The museum is available for tours, teas, luncheons, and private events. Oakley Park is a 501(c)(3) Nonprofit.
