Educational Director's Report Kroje -- Czech Traditional Costumes

Although we use the word kroj (sing.) (pronounced "kroy") for the elaborate Czech folk costumes seen at festivals, kroj also refers to uniforms, such as the Sokol ceremonial marching uniforms. But we'll look at folk costumes for this article. While some Czech and Slovak descendants and immigrants here are lucky enough to have authentic kroje (pl.) from the "old country," most have made their own or have purchased kroje sewn here in the USA. Either way, they are a way to keep Czech and Slovak heritage traditions alive.

Before 1850, there were 17 areas in Bohemia and more than 40 districts in Moravia where people wore folk costumes. In the borderland between Moravia and Slovakia, there were 27 such districts at the beginning of the 20th century. (*Note: It was during the late 1800s that most of our great-grandparents immigrated to the U.S.*) Folk costumes differed from district to district. Although kroje within a district had a certain "look" relating to color, lace, embroidery styles, length, blouse/shirt style, each town had their own variations in design. This allowed others to identify the district that the wearer came from, as well as to their social status.

Some of the most beautiful kroje originated during periods of cruel oppression, when the peasants suffered under serfdom, so decorating their costumes was one way to show their personal individuality, self-expression, and taste. They were a sign of status and nationality.

Billowing skirts are worn over stiffly starched petticoats. The skirts may be made of flax linen, serge, wool, satin or

brocade fabric. The predominant colors are red, yellow, blue and black. Some regions use stripes or floral skirt fabrics. Blouses/shirts can be trimmed with lace, eyelet, colored or black embroidery. The women's huge puffed sleeves might be stuffed with tissue paper, or held in place with cardboard at the pleats. Ladies' aprons might be white eyelet or elaborately embroidered on black fabric. It's all about regionality.







We have many picture books, picture calendars, and dolls in our museum identifying kroje from different regions. Come visit our Sokol Ennis museum during our next Czech special event. Or call 972-765-3733 to schedule a private visit.

It's going to happen! Thanks to generous donations from our members, we have the money to refurbish the Sokol Swimming Pool. On Monday July 18, 2022 President Thomas Betik and Treasurer Ray Elleven signed the first of two contracts to start the work.

This contract is with *RockPile Stone-N-Nursery Too* who will resurface the pool, install new decking around the pool, all new equipment, piping, and electrical. All work is expected to be completed by the end of the year assuring we will be open for next season.

The second contract will be signed in two or three weeks with *Bond Pro Restorations*. This contract is to remodel and upgrade the pool house. The new pool house will meet all handicapped standards and improved dressing rooms. This work should be completed by the end of the year.

The Sokol Pool is an important asset not only to our members but to the Ennis community. "It is the closest we have to community pool," said President Thomas Betik.

Ennis received pleasant news on Monday, July 18, when it was announced the Sokol pool and pool house will undergo a large renovation program that will reopen the city's only swimming pool that will now be open to the public.

Pool Project Manager, Joanna Wilson, hosted a ceremony with officers and contractors, who signed agreements about who is responsible for the work outside of the Sokol Activity Center. The Save the Pool project will be done thanks to the contributions from many members and a few large, enabling donations from anonymous Sokol backers.

"The Sokol pool has been around a long time," said Wilson. "It has given families something to do, to make memories, have a good time, and meet new people. Renovating the pool will bring that back since we had to close ours for repair. I think it will bring joy back to Ennis, so people can start coming back with their families."

Treasurer Ray Elleven said the cost, previously, for access to the pool was roughly \$65, the yearly membership rate at Sokol. He indicated there will be a new plan for swimming only, which will include multiple pricings, including family annual fees, though the costs have yet to be announced. As for donating to the cause, Sokol is still accepting financial gifts to help with renovation expenses.

Wilson, in her fourth year on site, said the work to be done encompasses electrical and plumbing, plaster and tile as well as equipment. Blue tile will mark individual swim lanes.

Brandon Nichols, representing Rockpile Stone, of Corsicana, added decking as part of the work. The pool has a 300-foot perimeter and ranges from 4-to-12 foot deep, and will have at least two diving boards.

"It will take about five months to finish," said Wilson, with Nichols clarifying, "or, the end of the year." The pool is heated and will reopen in early 2023. Built in 1972, it has been closed in recent summers during which time repairs were planned. Becoming fully ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990) compliant will involve both the pool and pool house areas.

Keith Pollard is another contractor on the project. His focus will be on the pool house. It is slated to have privacy locker rooms and showers.

Shreveport-native, Wilson, and her husband, Wes, a mechanic, share a

14-year-old daughter, Madelin. She said her responsibilities as Physical Director at Sokol, involves a number of activities, like their volleyball league, gymnastics, and tumbling, take place inside their gym. The pool has both water aerobics and scuba.

The largest of all halls in Ennis,

Sokol (SO-kuhl) is located at 2622 E. Highway 34, approximately 1.5 miles east of Interstate 45 on what is East Ennis Ave. Additionally, the clubroom, positioned on the north end of the hall, is also facing a revamping project. - The Sokol memorabilia display and Sokol museum provided an excellent backdrop for the convention experience WE DID GOOD!
- Shuttle service between the hotel and Convention venue worked well; Outings were enjoyed by the guests attending. Shuttle service back to the airports was timely WE DID GOOD!
- The Convention minutes have been completed by the secretarial staff; they have been reviewed and updated with minor corrections, and approved by the National Executive Board. A big thank you goes out to the secretarial staff for a well done, timely effort WE DID GREAT!
- The Convention sessions were productive National Bylaws were updated, officer reports were
 presented and discussed, a new 4-year budget was adopted, and new national officers (Executive
 Board) were elected; and general discussion and sharing of ideas ALL DID GOOD!
- The total final expense of the convention to the American Sokol was \$71,709; That FINAL EXPENSE FIGURE is <u>\$4956 UNDER</u> the approved, projected budget (\$76,665) submitted by the Committee in July, 2021 – WE DID GREAT!

Since the convention, the Committee and Sokol KHB leadership and members have received praise from individual delegates and Sokol Districts for a JOB WELL DONE. They particularly like the idea of holding the convention in a Sokol hall.

Sokol KHB represented itself well and can truly be proud! We all showed the entire American Sokol community some real Sokol Spirit and southern hospitality.


