


The 1900 storm that hit Galveston is one of the best examples of the power of the people to make a difference. Government was smaller back then and the folks simply did not expect outside help of any significance. As a result, the people of Galveston literally took to the streets to save their community. While much has changed since then, the fact remains that without volunteers life is worse in a community. EPP knows that not everyone has the time, the money or the ability to make a commitment to a particular organization, but volunteerism can be as simple as helping an elderly neighbor maintain their yard or picking up trash from a nearby ditch. Fix UR Pets appears regularly in this publication providing low or no cost services for area pets. They exist because volunteers exist.

Local churches provide meals, comfort and often work crews to help the communities where they are located and some send teams to help outside the area when disaster strikes. 


Texas Crab Festival Charities 2024 Christmas Drive Press Release

PORK CHOPS 'N POTATOES BAKE

6 pork chops vegetable oil seasoned salt 1 can cream of celery soup (10 oz.) 1/2 c. milk 1/2 c. sour cream 1/4 tsp. pepper 1 pkg. frozen hash browns or O'Brien potatoes (24 oz). thawed 1 c. Cheddar cheese, grated 1 can French fried onions, (2.8 oz)

Brown chops in vegetable oil with seasoned salt. Set aside. Mix soup, milk, sour cream, add potatoes and 1/2 of cheese and 1/2 of onions. Put in casserole, place chops on top.

Bake at 350 degrees for 40 minutes. Last 5 minutes add remaining cheese and onions.

San Leon VFD Runs 943 Calls

In 2024, the volunteers of the San Leon fire department responded 943 times to calls for service. Most of those calls were what are referred to as first responder calls. That typically represents a call for an injured or sick person needing assistance. Some of the calls are for vehicle accidents, RV and structure fires, downed cables and utility poles or trees, gas leaks, mutual aid and a smattering of call not easily categorized. The residential customers of the San Leon MUD pay \$10 per month on their water bill for all the services provided by the department. That amount has not changed in years and inflation has taken its toll on the department budget. Bacliff VFD recently asked for and received a bit more than a 20% increase in their residential fees and San Leon VFD needs additional funding as well. It should be noted that neither department has any obligation to provide more than basic fire protection services. The volunteers at both departments chose and choose to provide the additional level of service that is represented by first responders. EPP asks that every person served by a volunteer fire department strongly support the volunteers that sacrifice to serve their communities. That said, thanks are earned and appreciated, but the departments need continuing financial support from their communities. EPP request that those who can volunteer do so, those that cannot volunteer pay their MUD bills, donate when possible and support reasonable requests for additional monthly fees.






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















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This week's Galveston County Animal Resource Center Pet of the Week is Zoey.
