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# Introduction

# **Pre-Wedding Responsibilities**

#### **Financial Commitments**

Be prepared for these potential expenses:

- Bridesmaid dress (average \$150-\$300)
- Dress alterations (\$30-\$100)
- Shoes (\$50-\$150)
- Hair and makeup (\$75-\$250)
- Travel to/from wedding location
- Accommodation for wedding weekend
- Bridal shower contribution (\$50-\$100)
- Bachelorette party costs (\$100-\$500+)
- Wedding gift (\$50-\$150)

## **Event Planning & Participation**

- Engagement Party: Usually optional attendance
- Bridal Shower: Help plan, contribute to costs, assist with games/activities
- Bachelorette Party: Coordinate with maid of honor, share planning responsibilities
- **Dress Shopping**: Provide honest, supportive feedback
- **Dress Fittings**: Schedule and attend your fittings promptly
- Rehearsal & Dinner: Mandatory attendance, arrive on time

## Supporting the Bride

- Be responsive to communications
- Offer specific help rather than vague offers
- Listen without judgment to concerns and stresses
- Be flexible and understanding with changes
- Keep a positive attitude about wedding choices
- Remember this is her day, not yours



# **Bridesmaid's Timeline**

#### 6+ Months Before

- Accept invitation to be bridesmaid
- Provide your measurements for dress ordering
- Block wedding date(s) on your calendar
- Save for anticipated expenses
- Discuss bachelorette party dates and preferences

#### 4-6 Months Before

- Purchase bridesmaid dress
- Book accommodations for wedding weekend
- · Begin planning bridal shower with other bridesmaids
- Help address invitations if asked
- Schedule dress alterations appointment

#### 2-3 Months Before

- Attend bridal shower
- Finalize bachelorette party details
- Purchase wedding gift
- Check in with bride about any needed assistance
- Schedule hair/makeup trials if having professional services
- Break in wedding shoes

#### 1 Month Before

- Confirm all travel arrangements
- Attend final dress fitting
- Prepare for bachelorette party
- Check in with maid of honor about day-of logistics
- Begin planning any speech or toast if asked to give one

#### 1-2 Weeks Before

- Pack for wedding weekend
- Pick up dress from alterations
- Get any beauty treatments (manicure, facial, etc.)
- Confirm hair and makeup appointments
- Attend bachelorette party
- Check in with bride to offer last-minute help

# **Day Before Wedding**

- Attend rehearsal and rehearsal dinner
- Give emotional support to bride
- Prepare bridesmaid emergency kit
- Get plenty of rest
- Set multiple alarms for wedding day
- Confirm transportation to getting-ready location

# **Wedding Day Checklist**

## What to Bring

- [] Bridesmaid dress (wrinkle-free and on hanger)
- [] Appropriate undergarments
- [] Shoes for ceremony
- [] Comfortable backup shoes for reception
- [] Jewelry
- [] Hair accessories
- [] Makeup for touch-ups
- [] Emergency kit items
- [] Cell phone and charger
- [] Wedding invitation/details card
- [] Small purse or clutch
- [] Cash for unexpected expenses
- [] ID and credit card
- [] Any items promised to the bride
- [] Speech notes (if applicable)
- [] Snacks for getting ready
- [] Water bottle
- [] Change of clothes for end of night

# **Getting Ready**

- Arrive at designated location on time or early
- Eat breakfast before hair/makeup
- Wear button-down shirt for easy changing
- Help keep bride calm and on schedule
- Assist bride with dress, veil, and accessories
- Keep getting-ready space tidy for photos
- Stay off phone except for necessary coordination
- Be available for photos when needed



## **Ceremony Responsibilities**

- Line up in correct order for processional
- Walk at appropriate pace down aisle
- Hold bride's bouquet during ring exchange (if maid of honor)
- Stand with good posture during ceremony
- Be present and attentive
- Know when to be seated/standing
- Assist with dress/veil adjustments as needed
- Sign marriage license as witness (if asked)
- Help coordinate guests for recessional

# **Reception Duties**

- Join receiving line (if applicable)
- Help bustle bride's dress
- Direct guests to guest book, gift table, etc.
- Be present for formal photos
- Keep bride's drinks filled
- Make sure bride eats
- Dance and encourage guests to dance
- Help collect gifts/cards at end of night
- Assist with send-off coordination

# **Emergency Kit**

# **Beauty Fixes**

- Bobby pins and hair ties
- Hairspray
- Clear nail polish
- Nail file
- Lipstick/gloss for touch-ups

- Oil blotting sheets
- Makeup remover wipes
- Cotton swabs
- Travel-size deodorant
- Mini perfume
- Breath mints/strips

# **Dress & Clothing Remedies**

- Fashion/double-sided tape
- Safety pins in various sizes
- Mini sewing kit with coordinating thread
- Lint roller
- Static Guard spray
- Stain remover pen/wipes
- Extra pair of nude underwear
- Blister bandages/moleskin
- Clear straps for dresses

### **Health & Comfort**

- Pain reliever
- Antacids
- Bandages in various sizes
- Tampons/pads
- Tissues
- Eye drops
- Allergy medication
- Hand sanitizer
- Granola bar or small snack
- Portable phone charger



# **Photography Tips for Bridesmaids**

# **General Tips**

- Be ready on time for photos
- Put personal items away for group shots
- Stay off your phone during important moments
- Follow photographer's posing directions
- Keep emergency touch-up items handy
- Help scout photo locations if needed
- Ensure bride looks her best in photos
- Be genuine with emotions (don't force smiles)

## **Posing Tips**

- Practice good posture
- Hold bouquet low at waist level
- Keep arms slightly away from body
- Angle body slightly rather than face camera straight-on
- Create slight space between arms and torso
- Chin slightly down and forward
- Relax hands and fingers
- Natural smiles think happy thoughts!

## **Group Photos**

- Stand at slight angle toward bride
- Maintain consistent spacing between bridesmaids
- Hold bouquets at same height (practice this!)
- Be attentive and ready to adjust positioning
- Know the family formal photo list to help gather people
- Keep energy high for consecutive photos
- Help photographer get candid moments
- When not the focus of a photo, still look engaged

# **Getting Ready Photos**

- · Keep personal items organized and out of view
- Create beautiful "detail" shots with dress, jewelry, etc.
- Help create special moments for the photographer to capture
- Dress in coordinating robes/outfits if requested
- Save special moments (gifts, letters) for when photographer is present
- Be genuinely present for emotional moments



# **Bridesmaid Speech Guide**

#### If You're Asked to Give a Toast

#### **Preparation Timeline**

- Start brainstorming 1 month before wedding
- Write first draft 2-3 weeks before
- Practice weekly
- Finalize and memorize key points 1 week before
- Keep speech to 2-3 minutes

### **Speech Structure**

- 1. **Introduction**: Introduce yourself and relationship to couple
- 2. Thank yous: Thank hosts and acknowledge guests
- 3. **Story**: Share brief meaningful anecdote about bride/couple
- 4. **Compliments**: Express what's special about the couple
- 5. Well wishes: Share hopes for their marriage
- 6. Toast: Invite guests to raise glass

### **Delivery Tips**

- Speak slowly and clearly
- Make eye contact with couple and guests
- Hold microphone 3-4 inches from mouth
- Smile and be animated
- Use note cards rather than phone or paper
- Take a deep breath before starting
- End with clear toast: "Please raise your glass to [couple's names]"

#### What to Avoid

- Inside jokes only few will understand
- Mentions of exes

- Embarrassing stories
- Crude humor or profanity
- Focusing only on one person in the couple
- Drinking too much before speech
- Speaking for more than 3 minutes
- Winging it without preparation

# **Etiquette & FAQ**

#### **Common Questions**

#### Q: How much should I expect to spend as a bridesmaid?

A: Total costs typically range from \$500-\$1,500 depending on location, dress requirements, pre-wedding events, and travel needs. Have an honest conversation with the bride early about your budget limitations.

### Q: How can I support a stressed bride?

A: Listen without judgment, offer specific help rather than vague support, take on tasks without being asked, stay positive about wedding decisions, and plan relaxing moments during the planning process.

#### Q: What if I have a major life event that conflicts with bridesmaid duties?

A: Communicate early and honestly. Pregnancy, job changes, or other major life events happen, and a good friend will understand. Offer alternative ways to support if you can't fulfill all duties.

#### Q: Can I post wedding photos on social media?

A: Always check with the couple first. Many prefer to share their professional photos before wedding party posts appear. Some couples use wedding hashtags or photo-sharing apps to coordinate this.

#### Q: How do I handle disagreements with other bridesmaids?

A: Keep the bride out of any conflicts. Address issues directly and privately with other bridesmaids. Remember your shared goal of supporting the bride and be willing to compromise.

#### **Etiquette Tips**

#### DO:

- Respond promptly to all communications
- Offer specific help: "Can I research florists for you?" rather than "Let me know if you need anything"
- Keep the bride's preferences central to all decisions

- Be flexible with your schedule for wedding-related events
- Show enthusiasm for wedding elements important to the bride
- Handle any issues discreetly away from the bride
- Set aside money early for expected expenses
- Remember you're part of a team supporting the bride

#### DON'T:

- Complain about costs, dress choice, or other decisions to the bride
- Make the events about you or your preferences
- Post unflattering photos or pre-wedding surprises on social media
- Disappear during important wedding moments
- Bring wedding planning drama to the wedding day
- Get too intoxicated at pre-wedding events or the wedding itself
- Miss deadlines for ordering attire or RSVP'ing to events
- Invite additional guests without explicit permission



## **Final Thoughts**

Being a bridesmaid is about more than just wearing a matching dress and standing beside the bride. It's about providing emotional support, practical help, and being fully present during a significant life transition for someone you care about.

Remember that while there are traditions and expectations, each wedding is unique. The most important "rule" is to support the couple's vision for their day and help create a stress-free, joy-filled experience. Years from now, what everyone will remember most is not the perfect execution of duties, but the love and friendship that surrounded the couple as they began their married life together.
