Traditional vs. Modern Responsibilities

Traditional Financial Division

- **Bride's Family:** Ceremony, reception, bride's attire, photography, flowers
- **Groom's Family:** Rehearsal dinner, marriage license, officiant fees, honeymoon

Modern Approaches

Today's families might consider:

- Equal division between both families
- Proportional contribution based on financial ability
- The couple covering most expenses themselves with parental gifts for specific items
- A combination approach based on what matters most to each party

Beyond Financial Responsibilities

Remember that your contributions of time, emotional support, and practical help are often more valuable than financial contributions. Consider:

- Addressing invitations
- Coordinating with extended family
- Managing certain vendors
- Organizing welcome bags for out-of-town guests
- Hosting pre-wedding celebrations
- Offering transportation assistance

Communication Guidelines

With Your Child and Their Fiancé(e)

- Schedule regular check-ins about wedding planning

- Ask how you can be most helpful rather than imposing help
- Respect their vision even when it differs from yours
- Express concerns privately and constructively
- Remember it's their wedding, not yours

With the Other Parents

- Arrange an early get-together to establish rapport
- Discuss financial expectations clearly and early
- Share family traditions you hope to incorporate
- Keep lines of communication open throughout planning
- Address potential conflicts directly but diplomatically

With Extended Family

- Act as liaison for your side of the family
- Help manage expectations of family members
- Communicate important information about accommodations and events
- Buffer your child from excessive family demands
- Coordinate family photos and special moments

Tips for Financial Discussions

1. Be honest about what you can afford

2. Clarify whether your contribution is a gift or if you expect input on decisions
3. Consider opening a separate account for wedding expenses
4. Track all expenses in a shared spreadsheet
5. Build in a 10-15% buffer for unexpected costs
6. Discuss priorities early to allocate funds accordingly
7. Be clear about who has final say over vendor selections
8. Get major financial commitments in writing
9. Remember that money discussions now set precedents for your future relationship

12-Month Parent Checklist

12+ Months Before

- ☐ Meet the future in-laws if you haven't already
- ☐ Discuss general wedding expectations with your child
- ☐ Begin researching financial contribution capabilities
- ☐ Start compiling your guest list suggestions
- ☐ Research appropriate attire for your role
- ☐ Consider hosting an engagement celebration
- ☐ Research venues for any events you'll host (rehearsal dinner, etc.)

9-12 Months Before

- ☐ Finalize financial contributions and communicate clearly
- ☐ Submit your guest list with complete addresses
- ☐ Book accommodations for out-of-town guests (block of rooms)
- ☐ Book venue for rehearsal dinner (traditionally groom's parents)
- ☐ Begin shopping for your wedding attire
- ☐ Discuss cultural or religious traditions important to your family
- ☐ Offer to help with specific tasks that play to your strengths

6-9 Months Before

- ☐ Check in on planning progress and offer support
- ☐ Plan and send invitations for rehearsal dinner if hosting
- ☐ Continue attire shopping and alterations
- ☐ Discuss ceremony roles you might play (readings, escorting, etc.)
- ☐ Consider if you'll make a speech/toast at appropriate events
- ☐ Help coordinate travel/accommodations for elderly relatives

- ☐ Begin considering wedding gift for the couple

3-6 Months Before

- ☐ Attend tastings or vendor meetings if invited
- ☐ Finalize your attire and schedule final fittings
- ☐ Order gifts for couple and/or wedding party if applicable
- ☐ Assist with tracking RSVPs if needed
- ☐ Plan welcome bags for out-of-town guests if providing
- ☐ Confirm all details for events you're hosting
- ☐ Schedule hair, makeup, and other appointments for wedding day

1-3 Months Before

- ☐ Write your toast/speech if giving one
- ☐ Follow up with any guests who haven't RSVP'd
- ☐ Coordinate roles for extended family members
- ☐ Finalize details for rehearsal dinner or other events you're hosting
- ☐ Purchase thank-you gifts for helpful friends/family
- ☐ Review timeline for wedding day
- ☐ Confirm all reservations and bookings

1 Month Before

- ☐ Attend final dress fittings and pick up attire
- ☐ Touch base with other parents to coordinate
- ☐ Prepare payment envelopes for vendors (if that's your responsibility)
- ☐ Finalize transportation plans for wedding day
- ☐ Break in wedding shoes and finalize accessories
- ☐ Arrange for house-sitting/pet care during wedding events
- ☐ Create emergency kit for wedding day

Wedding Week

- ☐ Welcome out-of-town guests
- ☐ Attend and possibly host rehearsal dinner
- ☐ Give gifts to couple and wedding party
- ☐ Confirm day-of timeline and transportation
- ☐ Pack emergency kit (pain relievers, sewing kit, etc.)
- ☐ Get plenty of rest and practice self-care
- ☐ Prepare emotionally for this significant milestone

Wedding Day

- ☐ Eat breakfast and stay hydrated
- ☐ Be punctual for all appointments and photos
- ☐ Bring tissues for the ceremony
- ☐ Be available for last-minute assistance but don't hover
- ☐ Remember to be fully present and enjoy the day
- ☐ Connect with new family members and welcome them

After the Wedding

- ☐ Help collect gifts and personal items after reception
- ☐ Ensure vendors receive final payments if responsible
- ☐ Host post-wedding brunch if planned
- ☐ Assist with gift returns/exchanges if needed
- ☐ Check in with newlyweds after honeymoon
- ☐ Send thank-you notes to those who helped with events you hosted
- ☐ Organize and share photos you took

Wedding Weekend Survival Guide

What to Pack

- Complete wedding outfit with all accessories
- Comfortable shoes for dancing/after ceremony

- Touch-up makeup kit
- Pain relievers/personal medications
- Tissues (waterproof mascara for mothers!)
- Snacks for getting ready (nothing messy or that could stain)
- Phone charger
- Contact information for all vendors
- Small sewing kit
- Static guard/lint roller
- Weather contingency items (umbrella, shawl, etc.)
- Copy of all important schedules

Emergency Kit for Parents

- Safety pins in various sizes
- Double-sided tape
- Stain remover pen
- Pain relievers
- Antacids
- Band-aids
- Clear nail polish (for stocking runs)
- Small scissors
- Breath mints
- Extra phone charger
- Cash for unexpected expenses
- List of vendor contacts

Self-Care During the Wedding Weekend

- Schedule quiet time between events
- Stay hydrated (balance water and alcohol)
- Eat regular meals despite the busy schedule
- Have comfortable shoes available
- Take short walks to clear your head
- Practice deep breathing during emotional moments

- Set a reasonable bedtime for night before
- Delegate last-minute tasks to trusted friends

- ☐ Special dance with son/daughter
- ☐ Toast or speech if planned

For Fathers

- ☐ Getting ready with your child (if invited)
- ☐ First look with bride (if invited)
- ☐ Walking daughter down aisle (traditionally)
- ☐ Giving away the bride (if tradition is followed)
- ☐ Special dance with daughter
- ☐ Welcome speech or toast (traditionally)
- ☐ Private moment before ceremony

For Both Parents

- ☐ Family photos (prepare emotionally)
- ☐ Reception entrance
- ☐ Greeting guests (informally or receiving line)
- ☐ Family dances
- ☐ Meaningful religious or cultural moments
- ☐ Quiet observation moments (take mental photographs)
- ☐ End-of-night farewell to couple

Self-Care Throughout the Process

Emotional Support Strategies

- Recognize this is a major life transition
- Share feelings with spouse or close friend
- Remember that stress and joy can coexist
- Take breaks from wedding talk when needed
- Maintain perspective on what truly matters
- Set boundaries when necessary
- Seek professional support if feeling overwhelmed

Managing Family Dynamics

- Address potential conflicts early and privately
- Act as buffer between difficult family members

Nurturing New Family Relationships
