THE NEWEST MEMBERS OF THE 47th ANNUAL SOUTH JERSEY BASKETBALL HALL OF FAME ANNOUNCED

The Albert Carino Basketball Clubs of South Jersey have announced their selections to be inducted into the South Jersey Basketball Hall of Fame on Sunday, February 1st. **Bob DeLambily**, President of the Carino Boys' Basketball Club and **Terry Durkin**, President of the Albert Carino Girls' Basketball Club have announced the ceremony will begin at 5:30 P.M. at the Holiday Inn, Route 70, Cherry Hill, NJ.

Al Carino, the founder and longtime President of the Basketball Club of South Jersey, set the wheels in motion for the establishment of a South Jersey Basketball Hall of Fame in 1980.

This event will recognize players, coaches and contributors to our game and typically draws a large number of attendees to celebrate the occasion.

Ticket purchasing: Reservations are required and need to be made prior to Wednesday, January 23, 2026. No tickets will be sold at the door on the evening of the event.

Credit cards (Amex, VISA or Mastercard) or Venmo may be used to secure your reservations.

Biographies and photographs of the inductees follow below.

The Inductees of the Class of 2026:

Adrienne Ankola-Rochetti

Adrienne is a 2003 graduate of Sacred Heart High School in Vineland, playing for Coach Steve DiPatri.

She amassed twelve varsity letters playing Tennis, Basketball and Track and Field. Adrienne was selected *Most Valuable Player* ten times (3 basketball, 3 Track and 4 in tennis).

While at Sacred Heart, she led her basketball team to a 27-2 record and a New Jersey State Championship as a Senior. This was the first ever for the girls' basketball program.

Adrienne scored 1,913 points (averaging 19 ppg) with 5 assists and 4 steals per game as a Senior.

All-South Jersey 1st Team by the Carino Club 2001, 2002 and 2003 and All-South Jersey Non-Public also in 2001, 2002 and 2003.

She was recognized as Co-Girl Athlete of the Year (2003) of the Cape-Atlantic League and the CAL All-Star 1st Team 2001, 2002 and 2003.

Other awards included two-time Daily Journal Female Player-of-the-Year and the Press of Atlantic City's Girls' Basketball Player-of-the-Year and Female Athlete-of-the-Year.

She was honored with the Wendy's High School Heisman Award (2002) and capped her high school career as Salutatorian of her senior class.

Moving on to the next level at NYU, she led the team to a DII NCAA Final Four appearance and UAA Conference Title (2007). She was later inducted into the NYU Athletics Hall of Fame (2022). She graduated Magna Cum Laude (2007) and went on to earn her Master's Degree in Non-Profit Management.

Adrienne resides in Brooklyn with her wife Anuja and their 3-year old son (Dev).

She has spent 18+ years in the sports and entertainment industry and is currently Vice President of Strategic Planning and Social Impact for Underdog and Company.

JIM CARTER (IAABO BOARD 34)

Jim Carter is the long-time President of the International Association of Approved Basketball officials (IAABO).

His officiating career started in 1976 with the Camden chapter and includes a illustrious career in South Jersey. He has been selected on many occasions to call post-season games in the NJSIAA Tournament from opening round to the Tournament of Champions.

Jim was the recipient of the Mike Lazanoff Award (2024)

Served on numerous committees during his time with IAABO Board 34 and has been the President of Board 34 since 2018.

Currently, Carter is the President of N.J. State Board 1, which consists of all High School Basketball Officials Organizations in New Jersey.

Jim has been a member of the Collegiate Basketball Officials Association (CBOA) since 1985 and officiates Men's Division II, Division III and Junior College basketball.

He has been married for 40 years to his wife, Dawn, and is the proud father of 3 children.

LISA CERMIGNANO (GLOUCESTER CATHOLIC HIGH SCHOOL)

Lisa was a 1993 graduate of Gloucester Catholic, born in Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania, and raised in Mantua Township, New Jersey. She attended Gloucester Catholic High School (NJ) from 1989 to 1993, where she earned four varsity letters in girls' basketball and made a lasting mark on the program.

During her time at Gloucester Catholic, she was named to the All-South Jersey Teams in 1992 & 1993. 1993 saw her selected to the All-State First Team.

Cermignano set the school's scoring record with 2,038 career points, and also in her Senior Year was honored as the New *Jersey Gatorade Girls Basketball State Player of the Year.*

At the next level Lisa earned four letters as a member of the George Washington University Colonials. Over her four-year career, GW posted an impressive 103–27 record, advancing to the NCAA Tournament each season.

As a senior, she helped lead the Colonials to a historic run, defeating #1 North Carolina in the Sweet 16 and advancing to the Elite Eight against Notre Dame—just one win shy of the Women's Final Four.

She appeared in 130 career games, starting every contest as a junior and senior. She remains one of only 24 players in program history to surpass 1,000 career points, finishing with 1,278. Additional highlights include:

- 2nd in GW history for career three-point field goals made (270), later surpassed by her former player, Cathy Joens, in 2004
- Tied for 14th in career steals (194)
- One of just 16 players in program history to record 500 or more rebounds
- Named to the Atlantic 10 All-Conference Third Team (1996, 1997)
- Selected to the Atlantic 10 All-Tournament Team (1996, 1997)

In 1997, Cermignano competed in the ESPN Slam Dunk / Three-Point Competition at the Men's Final Four in Indianapolis, finishing as runner-up.

Her legacy at George Washington was formally recognized when she was inducted into the GW Athletics Hall of Fame in 2008, followed by her 1996–1997 Elite Eight team being inducted in 2019.

Following her collegiate career, Cermignano transitioned to coaching, where she spent over two decades shaping programs and players across the country. She has participated in the NCAA Tournament more than 10 times as a coach, including two Sweet Sixteen appearances, and has been part of multiple SEC and Atlantic 10 Conference Championship teams.

Cermignano is known for her leadership, basketball IQ, and ability to develop players—many of whom have gone on to successful careers in the WNBA and internationally. into advocacy, representing and mentoring collegiate and

After retiring from coaching, Cermignano turned her passion for the women's game into advocacy, representing and mentoring collegiate and professional women's basketball coaches.

She began her work as an agent and advisor with Sports International Group (SIG) in 2018 and later founded her own firm, the 2LC Advocacy Group, where she continues to champion opportunities and growth for women in basketball.

Cermignano currently lives in Ocean City, NJ.

Michael Edwards (Eastern Regional High School)

Following his freshman season at Ben Franklin High School in Philadelphia, Edwards came back home to Eastern.

Edwards propelled Eastern to its first, and only, state championship his senior season, posting 33 points and nine rebounds in the Vikings' 73-63 triumph over Sparta in the Group 3 title game.

Basketball players celebrate scoring 1,000 points in a career. Michael scored 1,082 points **IN HIS SENIOR YEAR!** He averaged 31.8 ppg.

He was a self-made player that honed his ballhandling on the parking lot at the Echelon Mall.

Along the way, Michael amassed several awards including the Associated Press All-State 1st Team (1989); New Jersey Group IV State Championship; South Jersey Scoring Champion; South Jersey Player-of-the-Year (Philadelphia Inquirer and the Courier Post); All Big East Freshman Team (1990).

Michael scored 2,351 career points with outstanding wins at Camden and against Haddonfield, who was the NJSIAA Group I Champion with a 32-0 record.

Edwards was the MVP of the New Jersey State All-Star Game (North-South Game.

He earned a full scholarship to Syracuse University. He started 48 of a possible 63 games his first two years, averaging 6.3 and 7.9 points per season, respectively.

Michael Edwards was a quick small guard for Syracuse basketball for four seasons. Edwards was able to play both the point guard and shooting guard positions.

During his 4-year career with the Orangemen, he played in 114 games, scoring 635 points. After Syracuse, Edwards played professionally in Lithuania for five years.

Michael currently lives in Philadelphia, PA. He owns Mike's Trucking, which delivers containers from overseas. Edwards has been married for two years to Ameena and he has an 8-year-old daughter named Monique.

Harold Little (Coach Clayton, Highland, Lindenwold and Sterling)

Harold "Coach Little" Little began his coaching career at Voorhees Middle School as an assistant Girls basketball coach in 1980 before moving to the Boys team

In 1985 his team set a school record, winning 28 games with 3 losses. They also captured the Camden County Elementary League Championship.

Coach Little's High School Basketball coaching career began at Cherry Hill West where he was the Freshman coach under Don Murray. He coached at Cherry Hill West from 1985 to 1989.

In 1990, he coached (JV) coach at Eastern Regional High School, and in 1991, he was hired at Clayton as the Head Boys Basketball Coach where he coached (4) years.

In 1995, Highland High School, Home of the Tartans, Blackwood, N.J. hired Coach Little as the Highland Boys basketball Coach.

Coach Little has led teams to numerous championships and has been a key figure in developing the next generation of basketball talent. During his time at Highland, his team accomplished (3) Olympic conference Patriot Division championships 1999, 2000, and 2001.

In 2000 the "Tartans" won the South Jersey Group IV championship defeating Atlantic City 76-74, in one of the most unforgettable comebacks in the South Jersey playoffs.

The" Tartans" were four-time winners of The Sportsmanship's award. This award was presented by IAABO Board (34) officials.

Coach Little was recognized by the Highland Athletic Department in 2007 for (221) wins at Highland. In 2008, Coach Little took over the leadership of Lindenwold High School and went on to coach at Lindenwold for (6) years.

In 2016, Coach Little was hired to coach Head Boys Basketball coach at Sterling High School.

With over three decades of experience in coaching and player development, Coach Little has established himself as a transformative leader in the world of basketball. Known for his strategic acumen and commitment to fostering athletic excellence.

His deep understanding of the game, combined with his passion for mentoring young athletes, has enabled him to create winning programs characterized by strong fundamentals, team cohesion, and relentless work ethic.

Coach Little's coaching philosophy centers around building a positive team culture, emphasizing discipline, and fostering a competitive spirit. He is known for his innovative tactics, ability to adapt strategies to meet his team's needs, and dedication to player growth both on and off the court.

Coach Little holds a Degree in Master of Education School Leadership from Wilmington University, and a Bachelor of Science degree in Intermediate Education from Fayetteville State University.

Harold is married to his wife Tonya and has two sons: Marques, and Mitchell and one granddaughter, Guiliana. PA.

Daniel Ljoka (Lenape Regional High School)

Dan is a graduate of Lenape High School, Class of 1977. He was a 3-Year starter for the Red and Gray.

For 45 years, Ljoka was the 2nd leading scorer with 1,105 points and averaged 19.5 ppg during his junior and season years.

Led Lenape to most wins in school history. He was the Burlington County scoring leader in 1977.

Ljoka was recognized by the Albert Carino Club as the Player-of-the-Week twice.

In addition, he was selected to the All-Burlington County Team twice, All-Group IV and All-South Jersey Teams. This Lenape grad is the only South Jersey player to make All Tournament in the 1977 Al Donofrio Conshohocken All Star Classic.

Dan played College Basketball at Rider University and University of California-San Diego.

Dan's only basketball regret is that he never played in the 3-point shot era.

His professional life includes a career in real estate development as well as 20 Years in Hollywood as a professional film and television screenwriter.

Dan has three children, Dan, Lana and Luc and his longtime partner Amy Lee. After spending their adult life in Southern California and Haddonfield, they now live in Ocean City, NJ and Miami, Florida.

Jasmine Martin (Timber Creek)

Upon graduation in 2011, from Timber Creek High School, Jasmine established herself as the All-Time Leading Scorer at her alma mater with 1,789 points. She was selected as the Player of the Year, by the Albert Carino Girls' Basketball Club, in her senior season, along with the Player of the Year honors by the Philadelphia Inquirer and the Courier Post.

This year's All-Everything inductee includes recognition by the Newark Star Ledger 2nd Team All-State, 1st Team All-Group, 1st Team All-South Jersey and the leading scorer in South Jersey.

The Courier Post named Jasmine to the 1st Team All-South Jersey, 1st Team All-Group 3, and 1st Team All-Conference.

As a senior, she was a McDonald's All-American nominee, All-Time single season scoring leader in Timber Creek history with 739 points. Jasmine also recorded 24 Double-Doubles and 1 Triple-Double demonstrating her domination.

In 2016, Jasmine was inducted into the Timber Creek Hall of Fame. Moving on to the next level at Quinnipiac University, she continued her impressive list of accolades by being named the 2015 MAAC

Tournament Most Valuable Player, the 2014 Hall of Fame Tournament MVP, and the ECAC college Player of the Week.

Jasmine is a 3-Time All-Conference selection,#2 All-Time leading scorer in Division 1 history with 1,689 points. Jasmine is one of two players, in school history, to average double figures in all four years of her playing career.

Following her stint at Quinnipiac University, Jasmine played professionally in Perth, Australia for the Warwick Senators and the Joondalup Wolves.

Martin proudly joins her Quinnipiac coach, Tricia Sacca Fabbri, as a member of the South Jersey Basketball Hall of Fame.

Julian Sanders (Shawnee Regional High School)

This Shawnee graduate made an immediate impact leading the program in scoring for his entire career with the Renegades.

As a Freshman he averaged 15 ppg with 5 rebounds per game quickly establishing himself as the team's top offensive weapon.

Hos sophomore he stepped up the pace with 18 ppg and lead Shawnee to a 19-0 start finishing as South Jersey Group IV finalist after a hard fought loss to Atlantic City.

Again in his Junior season, Julian increased his production to 19.4 ppg guiding the Renegades to another post-season run and advancing to the Group 4 Semifinals.

Sanders averaged 22 ppg as a Senior and won the Group IV Championship going undefeated inn South Jersey and finishing the season with two losses (Freehold Township and then Bloomfield Tech in the Tournament of Champions.

His leadership and consistent excellence helped Shawnee to national recognition finishing #19 in the nation (*HoopScoop Magazine*, 2007).

He earned numerous honors including McDonalds All-American nominee (2007), Star Ledger 1st Team All-State (2007), State Champion (2007), Player-of-the-Year by the Burlington County Times, the Courier Post and the Philadelphia Inquirer.

Sanders still is Shawnee's All-Time Leading Scorer with 2,056 points.

The next stop for Julian was at Indiana University continuing his success at the collegiate level. Sanders became one of the most prolific shooters in IUP history and a key contributor to one of the winningest eras in program history.

He was the PSAC Freshman-of-the-Year, averaged 12.3 ppg. He was ranked #1 in the PSAC and #4 in the nation in 3-Point percentage.

As a sophomore, he was a member of historic team going 33-3 which advanced to the NCAA Division II National Championship game.

His Senior season he averaged 17.3 ppg shooting 46% for field goals and 42% on 3-Point tries. He was only one of two players in program history with over 100 career wins. Julian is the All-Time leader in 3-Pt. made with 333 and 3rd in All-Time points scored (1,655).

Professionally he played for Club Lagomar (Montevideo, Uruguay) and Al-Nasr (Libya Tunis)

Now based in South Florida, Julian is the founder and owner of Triple Trey Academy, a basketball training and development company dedicated to youth, collegiate and professional player development.

Through Triple Trey Academy, Julian continues to share his life-long passion for basketball – developing the next generation of athletes with the same work ethic, precision and heart that defined his own career.

Matt Tomlin (Wildwood Catholic High School)

This Wildwood Catholic graduate (1954) was the successful coach of Wildwood Catholic High School from 1979-1994. His teams put together a 309-106 record and winning an amazing 74.5% of his games, still the highest in school history.

He won three Cape-Atlantic League championships and one South Jersey championship.

Coach Tomlin was selected, *Coach-of-the-Year* an astonishing seven times while Christmas Tournaments were his specialty. His teams won eight Christmas tournaments in his sixteen years of coaching the shore team.

Matt was the Press of Atlantic City's Coach-of-the-Decade.

Tomlin is a member of the NJSIAA Coaches Hall of Fame as well as the Wildwood Catholic Hall of Fame.

As a coach, Tomlin has had a tremendous impact on his players. He has coached six 1,000-point scorers. 37 of his players went on to college with 20 of them playing at the next level. Eleven former players went on to coach with two former players becoming referees.

Coach Tomlin is married to his wife Janice and has four grown children, nine grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

He retired as a School Business Administrator.

History of the Club

The Basketball Club of South Jersey, a long-time dream of founder Al Carino, was organized in the fall of 1962 with the help of Courier-Post sportswriters Charlie Schuck and Walt Burrows.

During the first year, men such as Al Mattern, Sam Strauss, Bob Kenney, Dick Carpenter, Ben Mark, John Kling, Bill Thomas and the late Rev. William Hart added their support. An All-South Jersey team and the Coach of the Year were honored at the first postseason banquet and the Suburban Newspapers presented the Suburban Cup. State Champion coaches were feted.

In 1964 the Courier-Post initiated the Top Ten Award and in 1966 the Club selected the first *South Jersey Collegiate Player of the Year* and held its first South Jersey Invitational Tournament. In addition, the International Association of Approved Basketball Officials (IAABO), Camden District Board 34 presented the initial *Sportsmanship Award* in memory of Kenneth E. Smullen.

In 1970, the Al DiBart Memorial Foundation began the top scoring award and named it the "Bob Elder" Award.

That year the Club held its Unsung Heroes night for seniors who contributed to the team.

1971 saw the best foul shooting award. It now honors Tom Bowe and is presented by IAABO Board 34. In 1973 the Club honored its first woman coach for winning a state championship.

In the fall of 1974, the Club began honoring girls at the regular meetings and the 1975 banquet cited the girls' scoring champion in addition to the girls' *Coach-of-the-Year*.

The Courier-Post added the girls Top Ten Award.

Charles Nash began honoring the South Jersey girls' scoring champion and named it the Sara J. Taylor Memorial Award in 1975.

History of the Club (Continued)

In 1976, the first *Female College Player of the Year* was honored by the Club with the aid of the women officials of West Chapter 5 honoring

Ginny Whitaker, the former long-time Athletic Director at Cherry Hill East.

Charles Nash began honoring the South Jersey girls' scoring champion and named it the Sara J. Taylor Memorial Award in 1975.

In 1976, the first *Female College Player of the Year* was honored by the Club with the aid of the women officials of West Chapter 5 honoring Ginny Whitaker, the former long-time Athletic Director at Cherry Hill East.

In 1977, the first *Small College Player-of-the-Year* was honored. A player from a Division 2 or 3 college is recognized.

1978 saw the first All-Star games featuring senior boys and girls from South Jersey.

The Major College Player-of-the-Year Award was named in memory of Samuel Strauss in 1980.

Hall-of-Famer Tony Caracci began to sponsor an annual award to the Outstanding Guard in South Jersey in 2000.

2004 was the inaugural year the *William G. Thomas Award*. This award is named after long-time President Bill Thomas and sponsored by the Carino Club. It is presented to the individual who had the most successful 3-point shots during the season. The "Most Courageous Award was renamed in memory of the late popular coach from Haddon Heights and Triton, Albert "Butch" McLean, who passed away in 2012.

December, 2019 saw William G. (Bill) Thomas, one of the few original founders of the Club, becoming President Emeritus and long-time officer Jack Mongulla being named President. The year 2024 saw Robert (Bob DeLambily) taking the reins of the Club

Hall of Fame

Al Carino, the founder and longtime President of the Basketball Club of South Jersey, set the wheels in motion for the establishment of a South Jersey Basketball Hall of Fame in 1980.

Carino's first step towards that goal was to call upon Doug Frambes, former Riverside High School coach and a sportswriter at the Courier-Post to form and chair a committee for this purpose.

Frambes along with Walt Burrows, Stan Mroz, George Pims, Dick Carpenter, Jack Harte, Al Mattern, Charlie Nash, Bill Thomas and Bob Viggiano met to set the ground rules and the format to be used in the selection process. In addition to selecting former outstanding coaches and players, the committee decided one inductee each year would be chosen for distinguished service to basketball in the area.

The first banquet and induction ceremony was held in February,

1981 when 13 inductees were welcomed into the Hall of Fame. Carino was the first recipient of the *Distinguished Service Award*.

The following year the Hall of Fame was expanded to include women. Bob Kenney, Sports Editor of the Courier-Post and Ginny Whitaker, Athletic Director for Cherry Hill East High School were added to the selection committee for this purpose.

After five years of serving as Chairman of the Selection Committee, Frambes stepped down but remained active on the committee. In 1985 Viggiano, also a sportswriter at the CourierPost, was named the new chairman of the Selection Committee.

Later Dick Carpenter served as Chairman and in 1996, Harry Beaudet assumed the role of Chairman until 2014 when Bill Hiltner (former Sterling coach) was appointed chairman. To date almost 400 individuals in the history of South Jersey basketball have been inducted into the South Jersey Basketball Hall of Fame.
