A Journey through the Psalms

Introduction

All through out the Bible you see scripture about hearing. Most of you do not have hearing problems so you sometimes take your hearing for granted until you get an ear infection or something that clogs yours ears then you really thank Yehovah for your hearing. How about those of us who can't hear very well and we just blessed to hear what that is what it is like every time I read Psalm 89:15.

The Sound!

Psalm 89:15-17

1. There is a blessing of those who hear the sound of the shofar and the silver trumpets because this is a direct reference to Numbers 10:10.
2. Elohim's people recognize the call to praise and they are blessed in His presence. When Yehovah's right hand is exalted (89:13), His people are exalted.
3. Israel receives esteem, honor and recognition through Elohim's gracious favor. Horn, a fricative term for power or strength (75:4), reappears in 89:24 where Yehovah raises David's horn through the divine name.

Instructions of When to Blow

Psalm 81:7

1. The assembly blew the Shofar to herald the beginning of the appointed times or before entering into battle.
2. A new moon marked the beginning of festivities which concluded with the full moon.
3. According to Yehovah's Calendar this time paralleled a series of different activities celebrated during two weeks of Fall.

He's Gone Up With a Shout

Psalm 47:5

1. Gone up could refer to Elohim goin up into heaven (Gen 17:22; 35:13; Judges 13:20) or to the ark of the covenant (representing Yehovah's presence) being carried up to the temple (2 Sam 6:5, 16-17).
2. In this psalm it probably expresses the more vernal idea of Yehovah ascending His earthly throne.
3. This is also something of a prophetic foreshadow of Yeshua ascending into Heaven in Acts 1. It says He will come in the very way he left? Question...Did Yeshua shout as He went up to His Father? Maybe?

Make a Joyful Noise

Psalm 98:4-6

1. Make a joyful noise or "break forth" always occurs in combination with rejoice or "ring out" (Isa 14:7; 44:23; 52:9; 54:1; 55:12).
2. The Scripture here is a command to make a joyful noise or the Hebrew says a ringing sound.
3. Have you ever noticed that all of these instruments require your breath...your ruach in

order for you to play them? In order for us to be able to worship Yehovah we must be in step with the Ruach.

Praise Him With the Shofar And All Instruments

Psalm 150:1-6

1. Praise Yehovah! Comes from two words in the Hebrew it's not one word Hallelu Yah.
Literally to Praise Yah.
2. The sophistication of ancient sacred music is clear from the wide range of instruments used in temple worship.
3. All three classifications wind instruments, strings, and percussion are represented. It is also only logical that everything that has been given the breath of life from the creator ought to praise Yehovah. (Psalm 149:2).

Take Away

1. There is a blessing for hearing the sound of the shofar being blasted.
2. We are commanded to make a Joyful noise unto Yehovah.
3. We are to shout, sing, clap, prostrate, bow, dancing, play instruments and all different forms of worship.

Application

1. I will listen to the sound of the shofar to get my blessing!
2. I will make a joyful noise to Yehovah!
3. I will praise Yehovah with all of my breath that I have in my body.
