Coronavirus is no excuse

The pandemic has changed many things about the way we live our lives. Shopping is now done mostly on line, as we try to avoid in-person store visits, our social interactions have decreased dramatically, and a lot of our education is now happening virtually.

For many, this means doing less; fewer visits to the store, meeting with friends less often, and children, too, have experienced a decrease in the amount of time they spend studying.

Religious life has also been affected. We have witnessed decreased attendance at Shul for prayer services, and our in-person programming has shifted to being mostly virtual.

But these circumstances are no excuse to be complacent. 

Tzedakah Fund





Dear Rabbi,

What determines if a person's Father or Mother's name is used when saying a misheberach, or during other instances when saying "son of" (ben) or "daughter of" (bas/bat)?

The Rabbi's answer....

When identifying someone, the father's name is used.

Before the invention of last names, this was the primary way of telling to which family someone belonged.

When praying for someone, the mother's name is used because she is the conduit by which the soul enters the body, illustrated in the fact that Jewishness passes through the matrilineal genes.

Prepping For Severe Weather

The following was taken from an article in the Courier Times, June 11, 2020
PEMA Executive Director Jeff Thomas stated,

Here are a few of Director Thomas' recommendations for preparing for weather-related events:

- Ensure you have access to important weather-related information. A NOAA weather radio is an inexpensive and portable option that provides location-based weather alerts.
- Prepare an emergency kit containing at least a three-day supply of food and water, medications, a first-aid kit, and any specialized items—COVID-19 supplies like masks, hand sanitizers.
- In severe heat stay hydrated and wear light, loose-fitting clothing with light colors, a hat or visor, sunglasses and SPF 30 or higher sunscreen.

Be ready, set, safe!




Bereavement Services
