

## VIEW FROM THE BIMAH

At the time of the writing of this article, we are sandwiched between two Tzedakah oriented seasons. Last Shabbos was Shabbat Shkalim, and the upcoming shabbos is Parashat Trumah. They both deal with charity, but in different ways.

Shkalim is the Mitzvah that every Jew had in Temple times to contribute a half shekel, to be used for the yearly communal offerings. This Mitzvah is commemorated with a special Torah reading, always conducted on the Shabbos that proceeds the month of Adar.

Trumah deals with the collections of moneys used for the building of the Holy Temple. In this instance, each person contributed whatever they were able to afford.

Why the need for two separate collections? Couldn't the fundraisers of the time do one collection, and then allocate the money to wherever it was needed?

Therein lies the lesson; G-d was teaching us that when it comes to the building of the Holy Temple – representing the infrastructure of Jewish life – there are two ways of giving, each one necessary, and each developing and nurturing a different part of the human character.

There were budgetary campaigns, which helped cover the ongoing expenses, and there were also special capital campaigns, necessary for the construction of the Mishkan and all of its accessories.

Similarly, our congregation has been blessed with a mirror process than that of the Holy Temple. We are currently successfully engaged in two very special projects, investing in the future of our community.

We are in the midst of renovating our Shul. Much headway has already been made in the demolition and framing of the new layout (see photos) and it is moving along very nicely, thank G-d. A few dedication opportunities remain, as we enter into the final phase of fundraising. Please contact me if you would like to take part in this special project.

In addition to the above, Young Israel is undertaking a fundraising initiative to cover the ongoing expenses of the Shul, including for some necessary maintenance of the building.

This effort is independent of the renovation campaign. To participate, please get in touch with the Shul treasurer, Norman Ferstenberg, or the President, Charles Miller.

May we always be blessed with the necessary resources to fulfill all of Hashem's commandments, especially the Mitzvah of Tzedakah, and to do it joyfully.


funds are needed. Please be in touch with any of the YI board members or myself if you would like to participate in this great project that will benefit the future of our community for many years to come. Thank you!

## Tzedakah Fund





## YIOL HISTORY—PART ONE

Now that the Shul's interior renovations are underway, I thought it would be interesting to research the origins of Young Israel of Lawrenceville (YIOL). I looked through the archives in Rabbi Goldenberg's office and here's some interesting history...

YIOL's roots began in 1971 when a group of Jews who lived in Lawrenceville wanted to have a regular minyan in town for Shabbat and Holidays, rather than rely on one of the Orthodox shuls in Trenton. They called themselves the Minyanaires and met at neighborhood homes. Services were led by Dr. Irving Levy. According to a newspaper article and photo, Barry Cohen was the first Lawrenceville Minyanaire Bar Mitzvah in 1974. His father Irving had created a "mini-shul" in the Cohen basement, including an Aron Kodesh for the Torah. The siddurim were on loan from "The People of Truth" - is it just me, or does Anshe Emet sound more Jewish? If anyone knows how to get in touch with the 62 year old Bar Mitzvah boy Barry, I'd love to hear his recollections.

By August 1975, Young Israel of Lawrenceville was in formation, with the first President Dr. Israel Nebenzahi and the first Rabbi Neil D. Winkler - Winkler was aware of the Minyanaires and let it be known he was interested in what we now call a start-up (as a coincidence, Rabbi Winkler was my mother's neighbor in Ft. Lee in the 1990s and she went to his shul. I verified it's the same Rabbi Winkler as the shul website says he was the

former Rabbi in Lawrenceville, NJ!). Rabbi Winkler is now a columnist for the Jewish Press and I plan on asking for his memories of Lawrenceville.

By Rosh HaShanah 1977, plans were announced to start a Hebrew School. For the next 13 years, in addition to the Cohen residence, the YIOL minyan met at the Heyden residence, Sugerman's, Greenwood's, a Texas Avenue storefront, the High School, the Middle School, Lawrence Plaza Apartments and Lester's house on Darrah Lane.

By 1990, the families of YIOL saved enough money to buy a house. There was as a lot of drama and difficulties getting permission to use a "neighborhood" house as a Shul - this sort of thing happened in suburbs throughout the US and still occurs today. There was a newspaper headline in the archive about how "lawsuits, withdrawals, wetlands hampered efforts" for YIOL to buy a property but I didn't find the article describing the details.

Our building had its first Shabbat services on 6/17/91 and the grand dedication celebration occurred on October 27, 1991. The shul library was also dedicated in 1991.

A great "Fun Fact" of my research was learning that the Rabbi hired in 1991 to lead YIOL in their new building was Joel Finkelstein! This is an amazing instance of hasgacha paratit as YIOL in 2023 has the amazing Joel Finklestein, Danit, Leah and Avraham always participating in shul events, Jewish activities and tefilot (prayer services).

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# THE MINYONAIRES

## How A Group of Jewish Families Worship Together on the Sabbath

A house of worship. These words literally describe the homes of the Minyonaires, a group of families in Lawrence Township that worship together on the Sabbath and Holidays. I was privileged to worship with them recently and it was an experience I shall never forget. There was a warmth, a feeling of closeness to God that is completely lacking in a structured synagogue. Everyone is involved from the elders to the children.

As soon as the service began, I knew these people were here to pray and I felt a part of it. This was religion as it must have been in Biblical times and down through the ages. This was the way it was meant to be. As Dr. Irving Levy, of Princeton, began the chanting of the prayers, each one joined in and their voices rose as one. And when the Torah was brought into the room and each one could reach out to touch it, perhaps he felt just a little bit closer to God. With the reading of the Torah, all the men were involved at some point, and even the children were permitted to stand with the group around it. They wanted to be part of it and they were.

**DR. LEVY**

Dr. Levy, who is an ordained Rabbi, prefers to worship this way. He said it gives him a feeling of self identity that is missing in the synagogue.

At the close of the service the children uninhibitedly led everyone in the singing of the Psalms. Mrs. Arthur Sugarman feels this active involvement in the service is a wonderful thing for them. They are learning by doing, which is a better teaching aid than words alone.

**3-YEARS AGO**

The Minyonaires are a traditional group that formed three years ago. Several of the families adhere strictly to tradition and, since the closest synagogue is 5 miles away, it is a hardship getting to services on the Sabbath and Holidays. Thus, forming the Minyonaires was the answer for these families. Leon Cohen, Eugene Greenwood, William Greenwood, Arthur Rtkin, and Arthur Sugarman are the original founding families and indeed are the pillars of the group, sharing their homes on a rotating basis. Others have joined and there are times when their numbers swell to 60. One of the most loyal and devoted who hasn't missed a Sabbath since its inception is Arthur Garfing.

The Minyonaires recently reached a milestone with its first Bar Mitzvah. Barry Cohen, who was the Bar Mitzvah boy, said he was the guinea pig. "It was beautiful," elated Mrs. Cohen.

**LEON COHENS**

The Leon Cohens are enthusiastic supporters. They have turned the basement of their home into a miniature synagogue and have built an Ark to house the Torah they have donated to the Minyonaires. This Torah has been in their family for several generations, and it was from this that Barry read his Torah portion for his Bar Mitzvah. The prayerbooks and Bibles are on loan from the Congregation People of Truth.

The Minyonaires invite anyone who is interested to join them in Sabbath worship. Just contact anyone of the five families for information.

## Why Do Jews Send Mishloach Manot (Purim Baskets)?

One of the mitzvot of Purim is sending gifts of food, called *mishloach manot* (literally, "the sending of portions") to acquaintances. The obligation is to send a minimum of two ready-to-eat-foods to at least one person. Males send to males, and females send to females. Often this opportunity is taken to send gifts to many friends and relatives. The source for [mishloach manot](#) is in the Megillah. "Mordechai... enjoined the [Jews] to make the fourteenth day of the month of Adar... feasting and joy, and sending portions one to another, and gifts to the poor."<sup>1</sup>

One of the themes of [Purim](#) is friendship and unity. When Haman asked King Ahasuerus for permission to destroy the Jews, he said "There is a certain people who are scattered and separate..." In contrast, Queen Esther knew that Jewish unity was essential when praying for G-d's help. She instructed Mordechai to "Go, assemble together all the Jews" for fasting and prayer. [G-d](#) is our father, and He loves nothing more than seeing His children unified. When we are united, we merit G-d's blessing and salvation. We give gifts of food on Purim to strengthen our bonds of friendship with our fellow Jews.
