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Quite a Month for Pride

June is Pride Month in America, where we celebrate the lives of our LGBTQ+ neighbors. Back in simpler times (like last year!) people would line the streets, party, enjoy life, and show off their colors. Did you know that Pride began as a protest? An uprising, really. Early on the morning of June 28, 1969, lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender persons rioted following a violent police raid on the Stonewall Inn, a gay bar in New York City. This riot and the protests over the following nights was a moment in the modern LGBTQ+ rights movement and the jumping off point for organizing pride marches on a much larger public scale.



Now 51 years later, people are still marching, although difficult to do in a Pandemic. This Pride month in particular is giving focus to black transgender lives. The conversation and uprising over racism and police brutality has brought light to the large number of black transgender people killed by police, bigots, and racists. These deaths have gone mostly unnoticed, as at least 15 black transgender or gender non-conforming people have been fatally shot or fatally attacked this year alone. But, it seems that things are starting to change. In the midst of the #blacklivesmatter uprising this month, a massive 15,000 person strong march took place in NYC and #blacktranslivesmatter took center stage. Just a few days and weeks after George Floyd was murdered, Tony McDade from Florida, Iyanna Dior from Minneapolis, Dominique "Rem'mie" Fells from Philadelphia, and Riah Milton from Ohio were all transgendered people murdered with very little recognition. SAY THEIR NAMES!

This year the Trump Administration announced that it was planning to roll back an important regulation about the Health Care Rights Law, the part of the Affordable Care Act (ACA) which protects transgender people from discrimination in health care and insurance coverage. This is a frightening time for many in the community as not only do they constantly fear for their safety, but now they also fear they will not get care. Although in a bit of great hope and respite, last week the US Supreme Court ruled that the 1964 Civil Rights Act protects gay, lesbian, and transgender employees from discrimination based on sex. This declaration will ensure that transgender people cannot be discriminated against in workplaces, and many

believe this is a big step toward full non-discrimination in the healthcare and insurance sector as well. The road is still going to be rocky; however, this seems to be a hopeful step in the right direction!

WHEN WILL WE BE BACK IN CHURCH?

That doesn't necessarily mean that in-person worship will resume in September; Admin will be reviewing the risks and benefits of reopening at their August meeting. Some churches have already resumed in-person worship; we hope to learn from them what a successful reopening will look like and what steps we need to take to keep everyone in our congregation safe. In the meantime, we are taking this opportunity to replace the well-worn carpet in the Sanctuary, parlor and stairs. When we get back together, it will be in a (finally!) completely refurbished Sanctuary.

Just because we won't be in the building doesn't mean we can't meet, however. The Elders are planning a gathering in the courtyard. While it may not be a full-blown worship service, it will be an opportunity to connect, to pray together, to feed our spirits with muchneeded community. Stay tuned for more information. WORSHIP LEADER - WHAT DO I NEED TO KNOW?

Thinking about being a Worship Leader, but not sure what that means? We are thinking of having a Worship Leader class soon, but in the meantime here are the basics. As a Worship Leader, you would do the following parts of the service: Welcome and Church News, Call to Worship, and Offering Meditation and sometimes the Centering Moment or Scripture. If we were in the sanctuary, you would do these all from the front, but because we are Zooming, you can do it from the comfort of your home, unless you are on vacation then you can do it from wherever you are on Sunday morning. It would be interesting to be a Worship Leader from the ocean shoreline.

So each area is just a little different, but I personally use a common theme. The theme can be based on the sermon or scripture, but there is no "law" saying you have to. The Welcome and Church News is the area we can welcome guests or people we have not seen

lately, announce the coming events (either yourself or someone else), and just get the service started. The Call to Worship is pretty much like it says, calling the congregation to come and gather to worship together. This can be done in many ways, with music, with poems, with responsive readings; let your imagination take hold. The Offering Mediation is a little more confusing. It is a call to offering. This part lets you express your feelings about what it means to give, or why do we give, or where the money goes. Some weeks we have a special offering – Reconciliation, Pentecost, Thanksgiving, Christmas, Easter, Week of Compassion, etc. – so these Sundays you might talk about what the monies will be used for. If you do not know about these offerings, please ask an Elder or Christy for this information. Also, because currently we cannot collect the offerings in person, you need to mention the many ways our offerings can be received.

Now, that doesn't seem to hard! All you need to do is take that first step and it will get easier. <u>There is no one judging you</u>. I personally like to try different things, to have some fun with the Call to Worship, to talk about what it truly means to give, and more. I feel the Worship team would be open to new ideas. Just let me know if you have questions. Below you can see we need Worship Leaders – so please sign up!

NEWS ON THE POOR PEOPLE'S CAMPAIGN

The voices of our movement rang out loud and clear this weekend at the Mass Poor People's Assembly and Moral March on Washington!

More than two and a half million of you from all across the country and around the world viewed the program on Facebook alone, more than 42,000 of you uploaded selfies and stories on our website, and you sent nearly 300,000 letters to our elected officials insisting they implement the policy agenda of the Poor People's Campaign.

We were covered in the New York Times, CNN, NPR, the Washington Post, the Religious News Service and many more!

Momentum is growing. We released the summary of the Poor People's Moral Justice Jubilee Policy Platform, which offers an agenda that can heal the nation and restore our democracy. We've also got open house zoom calls hosted by state campaigns coming up later in July where you can learn about the organizing in your state and how to get involved, so stay tuned.

Now is the time, this is the place, and we are the people. Let's get to it. *Forward together, not one step back!*

MISSION ACTION: WE LEND A



This Mission Action challenge appeared in the June issue of the *Living Word:* As July 1st approaches when officers and coordinators begin a new term, the Ministry Council proposes that our monthly outreach gift recipient going forward be selected being mindful of organizations that aid underrepresented groups and the most vulnerable. Our challenge will be to identify groups and organizations that promote racial justice along with social, economic, and environmental justice as it relates to vulnerable and historically underrepresented brethren - and prioritize such groups for our monthly outreach gift.

In keeping with this goal, our July Outreach gift of \$150 will be sent to the Equal Justice Initiative (eji.org). Their work for justice is broad based: In the area of criminal justice, they advocate for opposition to the death penalty nationwide, overturning wrongful convictions and excessive punishments, challenging children in adult prisons and improving prison conditions in general. In the area of racial justice, they educate about the legacy of slavery and racial lynching, oppose all forms of racial segregation still happening in the country, and - especially in current times - directly challenge systemic racism and all forms of racial injustice.

We think you'll agree that this month's outreach gift is well focused.

HELP THE HOPE CENTER

During "face-to-face" Sunday worship time, church members would drop off nonperishable food items into large baskets at the rear of the narthex to be donated to the Amador Street Hope Center. Since that is not currently an option - but still wanting to support the Hope Center - some of our fresh vegetables have been given to them for their food giveaway program.
