WE'RE BACK On the Road for Climate Action!



On the Road Again

As of May 6th, Athina and I are officially back "On the Road for Climate Action" to raise awareness about climate change and help point the nation towards solutions. We're passing through 20+ cities over the next 5 weeks, with a dozen climate talks officially booked and many scheduled interviews with scientists and others which we'll bring to you on camera. I write this newsletter on day 5 of our voyage. Last night marked our fourth climate talk in four days. Thus, its been a busy start. See below for some updates on the project. Of note, I'll update you

more frequently over the next 5 weeks since we're officially back on the road. Stay tuned!

Earth Day Excitement

This Earth Day marked a particularly special one as I had the opportunity to bring climate education to nearly 1,200 students at Santiago High School in Garden Grove, CA. The school set up a special stage with a giant projector screen in the



gymnasium, and brought 7 cohorts

of nearly 200 students each to come hear about the causes and impacts of climate change, and ways they can take part in the solution. It was a thrill, but also a challenge as 7 back-to-back presentations can be tiring. When speaking to the youth, I think it's important to remind them that that the future is quite literally uncertain. In life, they've probably seen images of gorgeous forests, majestic wildlife, and spectacular coral reefs, perhaps dreaming someday of visiting such places. What they likely don't realize is that these places may not exist in their adult age for them to experience. Forests worldwide are facing major threats. In the case of Colorado for instance, 20% of the pine forest is dead or dying due to climate-related impacts of the bark beetle. In the case of species, extinction rates are off the charts relative to historic norms. And sadly, coral reefs are on the brink of being wiped out, with 30% of the Great Barrier Reef dying in a single year during the global ocean warming event of 2016. In short, the world as we experience it today may not be there tomorrow. This, I believe, is important to convey to the youth.



Did You Know?

Two weeks back, Athina and I were invited to speak at the Garson and Shaw Secondhand Clothing conference in Atlanta. The theme was climate change. At the conference, we learned a lot! Shockingly, only 15% of clothing gets recycled in

the U.S. The rest ultimately goes to the landfill or incinerator. And importantly, the textile industry is a BIG consumer of water, energy, and other resources, not to mention a major source of water pollution as dyes literally turn rivers into the colors of the rainbow in some regions. In the case of greenhouse gas emissions, textile manufacturing accounts for about 10% of total emissions. When we over-consume clothing and throw old clothes in the trash, we contribute to this source of waste and pollution. Fortunately, reducing pollution associated with this industry is simple, as companies across the globe maintain street-side donation bins where you can drop off your old textiles when the time is right. While it's often thought that we can only donate clothes worth wearing again, it turns out that these bins can take any textile, regardless of condition. Even old holey socks! After your clothes get scooped from the donation bin, they get shipped off to be sorted. Clothes worthy of resale will enter the secondhand clothing market,

providing a livelihood for low income communities, while old worn out clothes, rags, and other textiles will be shredded and recycled. Isn't that great? You never have to throw away your old textiles again. Let's help boost the recycling rate of textiles and reduce textile-related pollution by reducing our consumption of clothing, shopping secondhand when possible, and recycling/donating all that we're ready to part with.
