"Let's Make Sure We Don't Get Too Comfortable" Genesis 50:15-26

When we turn in our bibles to the book of Genesis we stand in awe of God's creative ability, do we not? For in the opening verses of chapter one we see God's power in brilliant fashion as he speaks the world into existence. So great was this spectacular display that God later reminds Job what the experience was like when he asked, "Where were you when I laid the earth's foundation? Tell me, if you understand. Who marked off its dimensions? Surely you know! Who stretched a measuring line across it? On what were its footings set, or who laid its cornerstone—while the morning stars sang together and all the angels shouted for joy?" (Job 38:4-

7, NIV). Imagine that, if you will.

Now turn in your bibles to the closing verses in the book of Genesis. What do you see? What began in glorious splendor and the creation of mankind in the Garden of Eden ends with a broken-hearted family and the closing of a casket in a foreign land called Egypt. How can we

explain it? How could something start off so well and end so badly? Well, actually it's quite simple - sin entered the picture and seemingly destroyed everything God intended.

But before you shut your bibles let me caution you not to write God off just yet - for his grace is always greater than our sin, is it not? And his grace is revealed clearly in vv. 24-26 of that last chapter wherein Joseph said, "I am about to die. But God will surely come to your aid and take you up out of this land to the land he promised on oath to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. And Joseph made the sons of Israel swear an oath and said, 'God will surely come to you aid, and then you must carry my bones up from this place.' So Joseph dies at the age of a hundred and ten. And after they embalmed him, he was placed in a coffin in Egypt." But what does it mean and what is the application for us during the COVID-19 pandemic?

Throughout his word to us God continually cautions us not to get too comfortable in this life. Not in our location, our culture, our way of life, nor even in our relationship with him and one another. Everything, and I do mean everything, in life is short-lived and ever changing. been so drastically altered by a virus that first appeared in a faraway place called Wuhan, China? But, like it or not, here we are in the 21st century experiencing a national lockdown on everything we knew, loved, and took for granted - without exception.

In looking backward on Joseph and his father Jacob's (Israel) lives they too experienced similar circumstances to what we are now undergoing. Both had good lives that were tremendously blessed by God himself; yet both experienced major interruptions. Jacob's interruptions came when he fled his father's house in fear of his life after cheating Esau out of his God-given birth rights. Joseph's interruptions came after sharing a simple dream with his over-jealous brothers. One could look at them and say - they were simply getting what they deserved in both cases. After all, doesn't the bible say "thou shalt not covet?" and "one should never cast their pearls before the swine?" Well, yes it does in both cases but that's clearly a topic of considerable discussion that we will save for a later date.

In the middle of January the Center for Disease Control confirmed the first American case of a new coronavirus that had already claimed the lives of six people in China. By late February and early March we realized that our country was headed toward a national lockdown created by what was now labeled as the COVID -19 pandemic. Little did we realize, at the time, how drastically and quickly our lives and circumstances would change.

Almost overnight we experienced the shut down of our way of life in America as our school systems, colleges, universities, restaurants, as well as many of our factories and manufacturing facilities shut their doors. Our hospital and nursing facilities

were locked down to outside visitors and families found themselves distanced from loved ones. And yes, whether we liked it or not or even agreed with everything that was happening, this eventually forced us to greatly alter the way we worship. Pastors who wanted to connect with their church family were forced into new territory that most of us were unfamiliar with and unprepared for.



By Saturday, March 21st we were forced to make major adjustments in the way we would gather for worship the following day as we began "streaming" our services live on Facebook. At the time I was thinking that

none of this could have happened at a worse time because churches around the world were preparing to celebrate the death, burial, and resurrection of Christ. But it was during those moments of utter darkness that God began speaking and I must confess I was positioned to listen well.

He reminded me that his church is not institutional but relational. As such, we could spin our wheels for the next 50 years discussing what he did yesterday or we could join him where he is working today. I don't know how you feel but that for me is as we say a "no brainer." But he also reminded me that the church was indeed his church because he, through Christ, purchased her with his precious blood. Therefore his church, in both Nickelsville and around the world, was not reliant on human beings for her success.

With all of this in mind we were faced with major decisions. Would we sit back and lick our wounded egos? Or move forward as best we could by faith, relying completely on him? The choice was ours and ours alone. So on Sunday, March 22nd we launched our worship streaming live on Facebook. Oh there were some things we did as always like our annual Easter devotionals during Passion Week. But the element of gathering together as we always have on Easter Sunday was gone, or was it? And the recurring question coming to my mind was - have we become too comfortable? In our way of living in America? But moreso than anything - in our worship of God?

For more than a month we've gathered online as we stream and we now have multiple Life Groups who are meeting online weekly as they utilize Zoom Video Conferencing and other means of communication. But what does all of this look like for us? Well folks, let me be the first to admit that I greatly miss seeing each of you. The loving fellowship we experience as we gather is a small taste of Heaven itself. All of us miss shaking hands, hugging necks, and telling each other how much we love one another. Yet there is something I must share with you. In the last month, God has used your church to reach more than 75,000 (seventy-five thousand) people with the good news of the gospel. And might I add this does not include the people that each of us have been able to reach through telephone calls, text messages, and other forms of communication that we engage in daily. Neither does it include the people who are joining us as we engage in online bible studies through our Life Groups and School of Theology.

My prayer is that each of us will look beyond the outward cir-

cumstances that temporarily surround us to the opportunities that God is opening before us. I think he is showing us a world that we never knew to exist. As such, we dare not revert back to our former ways of "doing church as usual" but that we "fix our eyes on Jesus" and grasp the future that awaits us.

Let's get back to that closed coffin that held Joseph's body. Hundreds of years later the children of Israel would be forced to make a choice - follow Moses out of Egypt as they carried the coffin of Joseph with them or remain slaves for the rest of their lives.

Thankfully they chose to walk by faith and not by sight. As such, they experienced deliverance and were able to enter the Promised Land. My question is: Will you join me and the rest of our faith family as we continue in our homeward journey?

We look forward, in great anticipation, to that time when we can gather once again as a church family; however, until that time please don't forget that your church is completely dependent on your financial support in fulfilling Christ's mission!
