WITHHOLDING TAXES ARE REDUCED- BUT WATCH FOR A YEAR-END CASH SQUEEZE

The first direct benefit from the law is evident in your pay check. Withholding taxes taken from your salary have been reduced to reflect the new reduced tax rates. The prior 18% rate of withholding is now reduced to 14%. But before you spend the extra money from the drop in withholding, check to see that the saving in withholding does not leave you facing a sizeable balance to pay on your 1964 tax return. If it will, consider having your employer withhold a larger amount so that you will not be troubled by the need for making an estimated return and payments, or face the need of digging deep into your pocket to pay the tax due to under withholding.

STATE KC URGE CHANGE IN "FOUR BLACKBALL" RULE

Delegates to the 65th convention of the Ohio State Council, Knights of Columbus, have recommended a revision of the KC "blackball" system of barring applicants.

Under present rules, four "blackballs" can bar an applicant. The convention resolution urged that the supreme convention in New Orleans Aug. 22 change the rules so that "one-third of the members present and voting at the meeting" would have to cast blackballs before a prospective member could be barred.

Recently criticism has been leveled at the knights in some parts of the country for allegedly using the "four blackball" method to keep Negroes out of councils.

The resolution, taking note of that criticism, said "the continuation of this present antiquated method of electing applicants to membership . . . will constitute possible approval of any racial prejudice in our order."

The Ohio Council is believed the largest state council to recommend the change in voting procedures.

Delegates to the weekend meeting here heard Archbishop Karl J. Alter of Cincinnati and Msgr. Angelo J. Trivisonno, pastor of Akron St. Anthony Parish and state chaplain, urge a voting change.

Another resolution recommended state legislation to provide bus transportation for children attending non-public as well as public schools.

The resolution pointed out that last September Ohio's attorney general said legislative action was necessary before transportation of non-public school children can be furnished by public school boards.

Lawrence E. Hoeffel, Napoleon farmer, businessman and civic leader, was named the council's Catholic man of the year.

Don W. Emerson of Bay Village was re-elected state deputy. Other state officers re-elected were Leo P. Stark, Columbus, secretary; Robert E. Vogel-pohl, Cincinnati, treasurer; Edmond A. Sar-rus, St. Clairville, warden, and John W. Kiser, advocate, Norwalk.

Honored as the top three councils in the state were the Vatican Council, Parma, whose grand knight is John J. Andriush; Coshocton Council, James C. Homold, and Northeast Council, Cleveland, Rudolph J. Nosse.

J. "Place your support behind those who are striving to raise the level of community morality. Add your voice to public opinion in support of your public officials and legislators who are seeking sound means to stem the current tide."

"Strive to make objective judgments in differentiating between liberty and license. Join, or otherwise support, those sound and reasonable organizations in your community which are working to eradicate the sale of obscene matter."

"Should your child receive smut through the mails, notify your local postmaster."

"Help provide a sound environment for young people in your community. Make sure that your own children acquire a healthy knowledge of sex facts in your home. Encourage them to spend their energy through normal, wholesome, creative outlets."
