THE SHELL COLLECTOR'S CODE OF ETHICS

I realize that molluscs are part of our precious national wildlife resources, therefore:

I WILL make every effort to protect and preserve them not only for my own future enjoyment, but for the benefit of generations to come.

I WILL always leave every shelling spot as undisturbed as possible.

I WILL take only those specimens needed for my collection and for exchange at the time... Shells in a box cannot reproduce while I am waiting for a place to send them.

I WILL leave behind the damaged and the young specimens so that they may live and multiply.

I WILL **NOT** collect live egg cases unless they are to be used for study, and then, only in small quantities.

I WILL **NEVER** "clean out a colony" of shells.

I WILL practice and promote these conservation rules in every way possible.

Shell Trip Outing, November 17, 2016

Robert Gould, Doug Boddy and I headed out at 5:50am from Largo, to do some shelling on the nud flats by South Sunshine Skyway Bridge. It Was 56° F when we left home. Low tide was predicted about 7:30am, so we thought we'd arrive a little early and do some exploring. It was a cold, windy day, and the tide was not out enough until about 8am, so we stayed in our cars to keep warm.

Even though there were not a lot of shells to find on the mud flats, we did find a good variety for the 1 1/2 hours

we were shelling. Most abundant were the nassarus and ceriths. We also found quahogs, sunray venus clams, Stearn's cones, Giant Atlantic Cockles, lightning whelks, augers, pear whelks, a King's crown, olives, carditas, a Mortan's Egg Cockle, and prickly cockles. Bob found a nice pitted murex. I found a pretty colored prickly cockle and Doug found a nice sized disc dosinea.

We also spotted horseshoe crabs, a starfish, and orange and yellow sea sponges.

I recommend shelling the mud flats at low tide by South Skyway Bridge. It's very accessible and a good variety of shells can be found. All in all, it was a trip worth taking.

Velella velella: have you seen me?

Velella velella Linnaeus, 1758

Velella is a genus of free-floating hydrozoans that live on the surface of the open ocean. There is only one known species, Velella velella, commonly know as sea raft, by-the-wind sailor purple sail or little sail. Each individual Velella velella is actually a hydroid colony. They are about 7 cm long and deep blue in color with a small stiff sail that catches the wind and propels them over the surface of the sea and can strand them on our beaches. They are carnivorous and generally eat plankton, which they catch with their tentacles and sting them with nematocysts, their toxins are effective against their prey and relative-

ly benign to humans.. Velella velella live in warm temperate waters in all the world's oceans. Each "individual" Velella is really a hydroid colony with many polyps that feed on ocean plankton. These are connected by a canal system that enables the colony to share whatever food is ingested by individual polyps. Each colony is either all male or female. Each Velella colony produces thousands of tiny jellyfish (medusa) by asexual budding., they are about 1mm in size. Each medusa are provided with many zooxanthellae that utilize sunlight to provide energy to the medusa. The medusa develop to sexual maturity in about 3 weeks and their free-




spawned eggs and sperm develop into a planktonic larva called conaria, which develops into a new floating *Velella* hydroid colony.

The sea slug *Fiona pinnata*, sunfish *Mola mola* and violet snail *Janthina janthina* prey upon the *Velella velella*.

It is now thought that the Velella and not a colony by rather a a single very large hydrozoan polyp. Here is a graphic that shows what a normal Hydroid is and and what the *Velella* is. Most hydroids are attached to a hard substrate.
