Australian tree frog spotted with a snail on its head in Jakarta

The cute little frog was caught in a garden with a snail on its head, and immediately turned it into a fashion show. Flaunting its new, and slightly slimy, snail top hat, the Australian green tree frog posed for the camera while making its way up a tree branch. The amusing scene was captured by 30-yearold photographer Andri Priyadi in his garden in Indonesia. Mr. Priyadi, from Jakarta, says: "I spotted the frog climbing a branch at the end of my garden. At first, I thought it looked like the frog was wearing a little French beret hat. It was only when I moved closer that I realized a cheeky little snail was taking a ride on the frog's head." Mr. Priyadi was only a few feet



away from the pair as they posed for the camera. He says: "the frog seemed to be quite content with its new accessory. It was almost as if they were both posing for the camera." Mr. Priyadi spent around 15 minutes observing the mini fashion show before the frog disappeared out of sight. He says: "I'm so happy I was at the right time to take the pictures. I WILL take only those specimens needed for my collection and for exchange at the time... Shells in a box cannot reproduce while I am waiting for a place to send them.

I WILL leave behind the damaged and the young specimens so that they may live and multiply.

I WILL **NOT** collect live egg cases unless they are to be used for study, and then, only in small quantities.

I WILL **NEVER** "clean out a colony" of shells.

I WILL practice and promote these conservation rules in every way possible.




When the allotted time for bidding is over, "Pencils down" will



The Science Behind The Sting

What do corals, jellyfish and anemones have in common? These animals are grouped together in the Phylum Cnidaria and all have stinging cells. The name "Cnidaria" originates from the Greek word "cnidos," which means stinging nettle. There are five major types of cnidarians:

ANTHOZOA

True corals Anemones

Sea pens, etc.

CUBOZOA

Box jellyfishes

HYDROZOA


Portuguese Man o' War Fire coral Hydroids, etc.

SCÝPHOZOA

True jellyfishes

STAUROZOA

Stalked jellyfishes




The stinging cells of cnidarians are called nematocysts. While most cnidarian nematocysts are harmless to humans, box jellyfish have the most potent poison of all jellyfishes and can cause severe pain and even death. While the most dangerous box jellyfishes do not enter the waters of Hawai'i, the coastal waters of O'ahu do see an influx of box jellyfishes every month, 8-12 days after the full moon. The first record of a box jellyfish in Hawai'i dates back to an 1877 specimen collected in Honolulu by Theodore Ballieu, the French Commissioner to Hawai'i.

One type of cnidarian that is of particular concern to beach goers on O'ahu is the box jellyfish. In order to better understand the numbers and patterns of box jellyfish in the Waikiki Beach area, Aquarium staff worked on a 14-year research study on box jellyfishes in Waikiki. In this study researchers found that: There was no seasonal pattern, with box jellyfish numbers varying widely throughout the year.

Box jellyfish have appeared on Waikiki Beach every month of the year since August 1994; and

The high beach count years corresponded with an abundance of small zooplankton (box jellyfish food) and favorable conditions within the waters surrounding the Hawaiian Islands.



Field Trip to the Courtney Campbell Causeway.

Date Sunday Dec 13, 2015 Time meet at 9am because low tide was 11:05am.

We met on the Hillsborough County side, it was a beautiful warm day and with a breeze. Fifteen people showed up to walk around and see what could be found. We started out in water and it kept going out and exposed quite a large area. Not many large shells were found so we will have to keep watch on the area to see if they return. One small *Melongena corona* was found and left to grow. We did not stay a long time, everyone had left by 11am. Fossils were in the rocks but we had not brought any tools for collecting them. Jane found one fossil echinoderm that she gave to John. Small shells were found, like *Nassarius vibex*, *Prunum apicinum*, and bubble shells. There was some sea grasses and that is good, but with all the construction that has taken place there, it will be a while before we see lots of shells. Well worth the trip to explore and see if it is still accessible. The stairs worked well for all, and plenty of parking.
