Here is a great image of a Florida Cone, *Conus anabathrum*, halfway through a (relatively large) polychaete worm meal. Some species of cone snails are famous for their ability to stun and catch fish using a cocktail of toxins injected via the snail's hypodermic needle-like teeth. But most species of cones feed exclusively on polychaete worms (and other species feed on mollusks). I realize that molluscs are part of our precious national wildlife resources, therefore:

I WILL always leave every shelling spot as undisturbed as possible.

I WILL take only those specimens needed for my collection and for exchange at the time... Shells in a box cannot reproduce while I am waiting for a place to send them.

I WILL leave behind the damaged and the young specimens so that they may live and multiply.

I WILL **NOT** collect live egg cases unless they are to be used for study, and then, only in small quantities.

I WILL **NEVER** "clean out a colony" of shells.

I WILL practice and promote these conservation rules in every way possible.



# Knights - vs - Snails

A very fun topic came up in the conch-L listserv over the summer, the topic of illustrations in early publications. Not just early, but truly medieval. Before books were widely printed they were handdrawn and the text was hand-written The artisans would embellish the already fancy text with loops, squiggles, and often artwork in the margins.

Curiously, they often featured images of knights in armor engaged in combat with snails. Theories about the symbolism include snails as symbols of the resurrection, snails as symbols of outcasts (for treason, usury, and non-chivalrous behavior). The snail may be seen antagonizing the knight, and often the knight appears to be losing.

# Florida Fossils text and pics by John Jacobs

Finding intact fossil scaphopods (tusk shells) is always a challenge because of their long slender shapes. In 2013, Cheryl came across the first specimen while collecting in the now defunct SMR Aggregates pit in Sarasota. It took a lot of literary digging to finally come up with the correct identification for this interesting species. William Healy Dall described this species in 1892, and that is the publication that revealed its identity.

Tesseracme prisma (Dall, 1892) in the family Dentaliidae has an unusual squarish shell which stood out for me as a key identifying feature. This is a late Pliocene species ca. 3.5-2.5 million years old. It grew to about 50mm in length.



# Molluscs on Coins by John Jacobs

In 2022, Austria started a new set of collector coins called Luminous Marine Life. This is a series of 12 coins depicting various marine life that are bioluminescent. The images on the coins are in color, and, when subjected to ultraviolet light, glow. Thus far, three coins have been released. The first was that of the blue-ring octopus, *Hapalochlaena maculosa*. The second is a swell shark, *Cephaloscyllium ventriosum*. The third coin depicts the Antarctic krill, *Euphausia superba*. A scallop shell and sea star appears also. The obverse side of the coins has silhouettes of all 12 animals in the set. The face value is 3 euros. The coins are a copper-nickel alloy. The Austrian mint has a special album for the coins containing information on each species. At this time, due to "technical issues", commerce between the US and Austrian mint is not possible.


