

Nereis is a genus of polychaete worms in the family Nereididae. It comprises many species, most of which are marine. Nereis possess setae and parapodia for locomotion. They may have two types of setae, which are found on the parapodia. Acicular setae provide support. Locomotor chaetae are for crawling, and are the bristles that are visible on the exterior of the Polychaeta. They are cylindrical in shape, found in sandy areas, and they are adapted to burrow.

Field trip report:

South Skyway Field Trip

November 26, 2018

We had an early morning -0.5 tide and we met at 730am to take advantage of it.

It was a beautiful morning with a very light breeze and a comfortable temperature. The sky was clear, and as the sun continued to rise, the tide continued to go out revealing the high spots of sand and seagrass. The first shell I found was a dead empty fighting conch (Strombus alatus) in the beached grasses on the shore. I had started the day photographing shore birds of several species.

My main collecting tools were my cameras, which were put to good use starting near shore shooting some false limpets (Siphonaria pectinata) on the limestone rocks. As the morning progressed, I continued to photograph various marine life. This is a favorite area of mine since I never know what I'll see here. Small hermit crabs were in abundance, as usual. They are hard to photograph since they don't like to stay still for long.

Moving along, we saw some abundant species that are common here. These included the marginella *Prunum* apicinum, and the mud snail Ilvnassa vibex.

What do horseshoe crabs eat?

They eat almost anything. Horseshoe crabs are mainly predators. They feed on small clams, crustaceans, and worms; however, they will also eat other animals and even algae. Because they have no mandibles or teeth, they crush hard food between their legs before passing it to their mouth. Like birds, horseshoe crabs also have gizzards for grinding food before it reaches their stomachs.


Florida United Malacologists Meeting (FUM)

I realize that molluscs are part of our precious national wildlife resources, therefore:

I WILL make every effort to protect and preserve them not only for my own future enjoyment, but for the benefit of generations to come.

I WILL always leave every shelling spot as undisturbed as possible.

I WILL take only those specimens needed for my collection and for exchange at the time... Shells in a box cannot reproduce while I am waiting for a place to send them.

I WILL leave behind the damaged and the young specimens so that they may live and multiply.

I WILL NOT collect live egg cases unless they are to be used for study, and then, only in small quantities.

I WILL **NEVER** "clean out a colony" of shells.

I WILL practice and promote these conservation rules in every way possible.


