THE SHELL COLLECTOR'S CODE OF ETHICS

I realize that molluscs are part of our precious national wildlife resources, therefore:

I WILL make every effort to protect and preserve them not only for my own future enjoyment, but for the benefit of generations to come.

I WILL always leave every shelling spot as undisturbed as possible.

I WILL take only those specimens needed for my collection and for exchange at the time... Shells in a box cannot reproduce while I am waiting for a place to send them.

I WILL leave behind the damaged and the young specimens so that they may live and multiply.

I WILL NOT collect live egg cases unless they are to be used for study, and then, only in small quantities.

I WILL **NEVER** "clean out a colony" of shells.

I WILL practice and promote these conservation rules in every way possible.

Molluscs on Stamps

While there are thousands of stamps from around the world depicting various molluscs, sometimes even the more common varieties haven't been depicted or there are very few stamps showing them. This is the case for our club shell *Melongena corona* (Gmelin, 1791) (King's crown/Crown conch). Shown here are the only stamps I've found depicting our club shell.

Guinea, located in west Africa, issued this stamp and souvenir sheet in 1998, which is interesting since *M. corona* is a Florida/Caribbean species. It is not unknown for countries to issue stamps depicting subjects that have nothing to do with that country. Regardless, it is a nice depiction, and they got the species name correct.


Montserrat, an island in the Caribbean under British control, issued a stamp in August 1988 with a colorful depiction of the shell. It was reissued in November 1988 with an overprint for the visit of Princess Alexandra and a surcharge changing the value from \$5 to \$1.50. In May 1989 the stamp reappeared with the overprint OHMS (On Her Majesty's Service), making it an official mail stamp.





Guinea-Bissau, west coast of Africa, issued this sheet in 2017. The fifth stamp shows a sinistral *M. corona*. The 1st stamp with *Strombus alatus* is also shown sinistral. Artistic license, I suppose.


New ammonite John Jacobs

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
