I WILL **NOT** collect live egg cases unless they are to be used for study, and then, only in small quantities.

I WILL **NEVER** "clean out a colony" of shells.

I WILL practice and promote these conservation rules in every way possible.

They brought core samples and shell specimens collected from the cores.



Our shoebox display was shells beginning with the letters "S" for Santa and the letter "C" for Claus. Mary Ellen went a few steps further with a shell for each letter in the name Santa Claus. "S" *Scaphander lignarius*, "A" *Aporrhais pesgallinae*, "N" *Niso aeglees*, "T" *Typhis bullisi*, "A" *Atlanta peronii*, "C" *Cadulus carolinensis/quadridentatus*, "L" *Limopsis vaginata*, "A" *Arene vanhyningi*, "U" *Umbraculum umbraculum*, "S" *Simnia uniplicata*. John also brought in some shells for the theme. *Thaisella chocolata* with eggs, *Cabestana spengleri*, *Pinna carnea*, *Cymbula granatina*, *Conomurex luhuanus*, and *Cellana exarata*.

Which Whelk Is it?

The difference between Channeled whelks, Knobbed whelks and Lightning whelks is distinct.

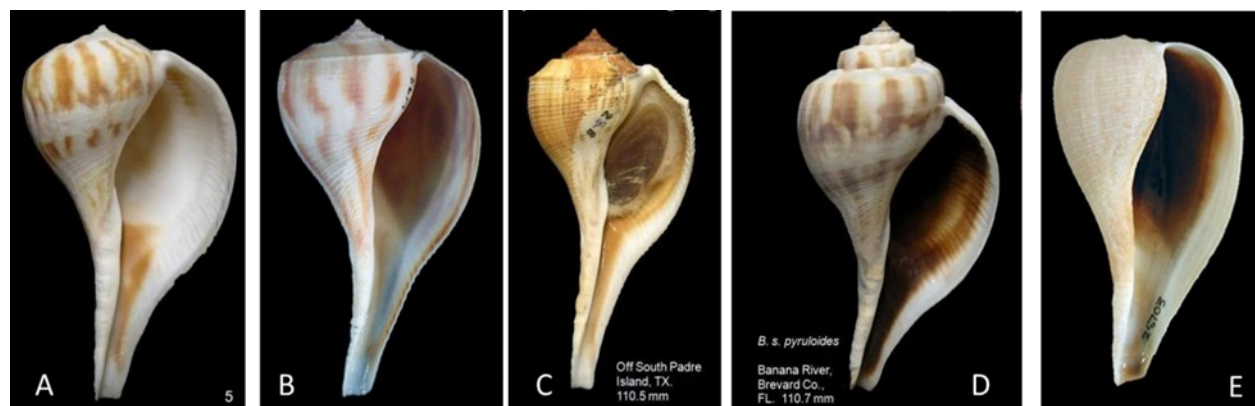

First, lightning whelks are sinistrally coiled and both knobbed and channeled whelks are dextrally coiled (as pictured, spire up, the aperture is on the left or right, and the shell coils counterclockwise or clockwise). Lightning whelks have more pronounced coloration, their knobs are more triangular than channeled, and rarely if ever have any periostracum. Channeled whelks have more rounded knobs (especially in juveniles, below) and may have a fine hairy periostracum. Finally, the suture has a notable deep groove or channel in channeled whelks.



Pear whelks



When it comes to pear whelks, there remains in my mind some confusion. Abbott 1974 identifies the True Pear Whelk as *Busycon spiratum spiratum* (Lamarck, 1816) ranging from Texas to Yucatan. The Say's Pear Whelk (*B. s. pyruloides*) range is reported as North Carolina through the gulf coast of Florida. Finally, the Texas or Shouldered Pear Whelk (*B. s. plagosum*) range is listed as Texas to Yucatan.

True Pear Whelks are said to have a rounded weak shoulder, heavy shell, strongly spirally grooved, and interior strongly lirate (raised threads that follow the coil). Current taxonomic status is *Fulguopsis spirata*. (A – Image from Let's Talk Seashells). Say's Whelks are said to also have a rounded shoulder, but have thinner shells, weak spiral threads, and sometimes a thin periostracum. Current taxonomic status is *Fulguopsis pyruloides* (B – image from Bailey-Matthews National Shell Museum). Texas Pear Whelks were said to be longer and narrower, have an elongated siphonal canal, a more pronounced shoulder with a carina (essentially like a keel or sharp edge) and a deep canal at the suture which can be square or v-shaped. Current taxonomic status is *Fulguopsis plagosus*. (C – image from Let's Talk Seashells). Depending on which guide you use, they may appear as genus *Busycyon* or *Busycotypus*. AND. There are at least four other varieties proposed: *F. feldmanni*, *F. keysensis*, *F. texana*, and *F. pyruloides rachelcarsonae*. If you look at enough websites and books, especially older books, you'll undoubtedly confuse yourself. See for example, a specimen called *B. s. pyruloides* on LTS (D) which seems to be intermediate. I've collected shells like this around Tampa Bay and wondered if they were channeled whelks - *I don't think so* - and will pay more attention now. There are many other examples on-line.

I suspect some of the differences and confusion comes from camera angle and some from gender dimorphism at maturity (female whelks can develop a fuller, rounded whorl at maturity) and possibly changes in shape as the whelks grow (allometry). I also wonder if the flare in the suture at the aperture is more developed in a mature female? Either way, this species complex remains uncertain in my mind including defining characteristics and appropriate ranges.

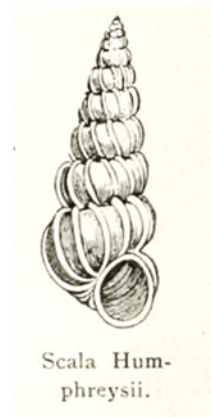
P.S. – one should never **ever** confuse whelks and figs *Ficus papyratia* (Say, 1822) (E). Atlantic Fig Snail (Photo from BMNSM)



An image from The Nautilus (Volume VI, No. 2) July 1892. Some remarks on New Jersey Coast Shells. By John Ford. One of the most prized specimens was this *Fulgur canaliculata*. Other “common” species included *Ostrea virginica*, *Venus mercenria*, *Mytilus edulis*, *Litorina litorea*, *Pecten irradians* and *Scala humphreysii* (a wentletrap).

Mollusca on Stamps

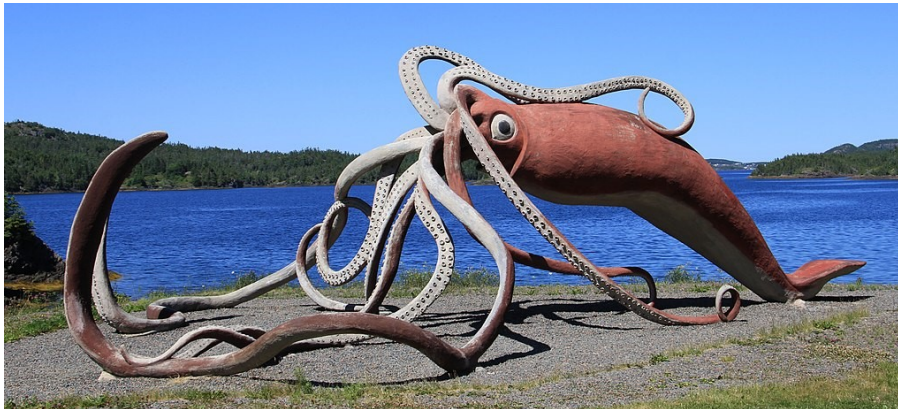
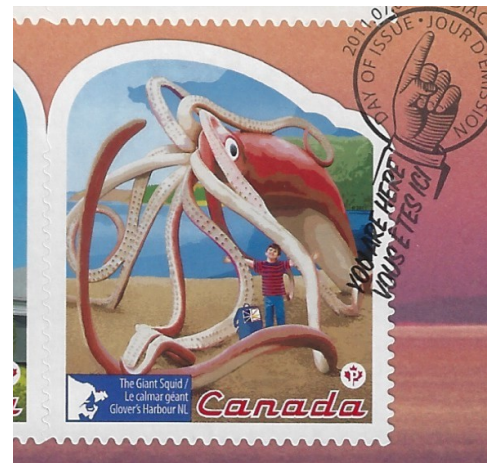

On July 7, 2011 Canada issued a set of 4 stamps showing Roadside Attractions. One of those stamps shows a replica of a giant squid. The text on the back of the First Day Cover mentions the squid being found November 2, 1878 at Glover's Harbour, Newfoundland & Labrador Province and is in the Guinness Book of Records as the world's largest at 16.8 meters/55 feet.

The "life-sized" concrete and metal sculpture of the Thimble Tickle giant squid, Glovers Harbour (July 2017)

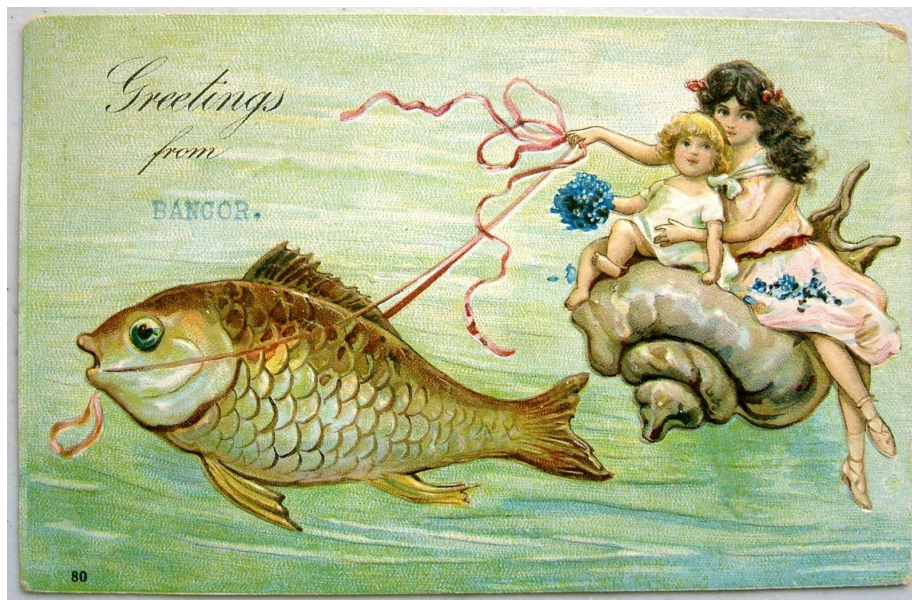
The Bailey-Matthews National Shell Museum & Aquarium

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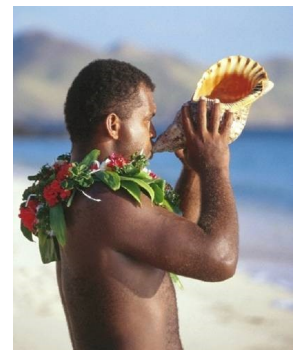
