

The Music of Manufacturing

- **Node Zero** remains the human hand on the treadles — the absolute veto that no algorithm can override.

Blockchain supplies the modern punchcard. Once a measure is executed and sealed, it cannot be retroactively altered without breaking the chain. Each block becomes a verified card in sequence.
