

Texas Notary Fees (2025)

The following are the maximum statutory fees Texas notaries may charge as of 2025, according to the Texas Government Code § 406.024 and the Texas Secretary of State. Sources: [Texas Secretary of State](#), [Texas Notary FAQs](#).

Notarial Act	Maximum Fee
Acknowledgment/Proof (first signature)	\$10.00
Each additional signature (same document)	\$1.00
Oath or affirmation, with certificate/seal	\$10.00
Certificate under seal (not otherwise provided)	\$10.00
Copy of record or paper, per page	\$1.00
Taking deposition, per 100 words	\$1.00
Swearing witness to deposition (certificate & seal)	\$10.00
Protesting bill/note for non-acceptance or non-payment	\$4.00
Each notice of protest	\$1.00
Protesting in all other cases	\$4.00
Certificate and seal to a protest	\$4.00

Remote / Online Notarization: A Texas online notary (or their employer) may charge an additional fee not to exceed **\$25** for performing a remote/online notarization, in addition to other authorized notary fees.

Enforcement & Overcharging: Texas notaries are prohibited from charging more than the statutory maximums. Violations may result in disciplinary action by the Texas Secretary of State, including suspension or revocation of the notary commission, and possible civil penalties.
