Dear Parish Family:

I find Advent to be a gift from the Church to us. Not a Christmas gift, but a gift of invitation. An invitation to take some time away from the hustle and bustle of the busyness of this time of year and to truly prepare for the real meaning of Christmas – Jesus!

The lessons read at the Eucharist and the Daily Prayer Offices during the Season of Advent are ones of expectation. The hymns we sing echo this theme – "Come, thou long-expected Jesus", "O Come, O Come Emmanuel", "On Jordan's bank the Baptist's cry announces that the Lord is nigh". We are all invited to join with the Blessed Virgin Mary as she waits for the coming of her Lord. In some sense, we are called into the expectancy of a woman who is "with child". We, too, are called to carry Jesus. But, we are also called to see Him in the people and world that surrounds us.

During the season of Advent be counter-cultural. If we take the time to be quiet (perhaps at the Cluster Quiet Day!), to pray, to read Scripture, to meditate -- perhaps you could consider coming to the midweek Eucharist during Advent. If we truly take the time to prepare, I believe that Christmas will be all the more joyful because we are preparing for the real meaning of Christmas – Jesus!

Dear Parish Family:

At a recent Vestry Meeting, I presented my Our church building is designed to plan to consider using only Rite I for our worship. This will only affect the two Sundays a month that we have been using Rite II at the 10:30 service – all of the other services are already Rite I. I polled the 10:30 congregation two Sundays in November and a majority were in agreement with this plan.

I think that this may be a way for us to "stand out" in the Community. We can advertise ourselves with "Traditional Worship for Contemporary People". Two years ago, we decided to make a concerted effort to focus on attracting retirees and people of a "mature age". This may help.

I also think that it is a way for us to focus on worship as a means of formation in our lives as Christians. Many years ago, when those who live in Christ. the current Prayer Book first came out, the All Saints' Convent decided to try Rite II and after awhile felt that it did not lend itself to the spiritual life of that place. With this in mind, I share my reflection on our Church's architecture and excerpts from an article in the "Living Church" magazine on the theology of Rite I. Please see those below.


I hope that this change will be a positive one. We can evaluate it at next November when we have had the Church Year to try it.

Traditional Architecture

represent our life's journey with Christ. As we enter the church, there is a holy water stoop. Some people choose to bless themselves with this water, making the sign of the cross. This water represents the water's of our baptism where life in Christ begins.

The Nave – the place where the congregation sits for worship is a bit like an upside-down ship. If you look up at the ceiling, it looks very much like the hull of a ship. The word Nave comes from the same root as the word Navy. This represents our journey together – the



The Quire – where the Choir sits, represents the angels in heaven as they sing the praises of God.

The Sanctuary – where the altar is, represents God's presence. This is particularly represented in the presence of our Lord Jesus Christ in the Blessed Sacrament, which is reserved in the tabernacle on the altar so that the priest can take the Sacrament to the sick and shut-in.

As we journey with Christ, we walk from the waters of our baptism into our lives together. At the end of this earthly life, we continue our journey with those who have gone before us as well as the angels to finally come before the very presence of God.

Excerpts from "The gospel according to Rite I"

"The Living Church" October 17, 2017 ... A serious reading of the Rite I liturgy reveals God's people "with unveiled face, beholding the glory of the Lord ... being transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another. For this comes from the Lord who is the Spirit" (2 Cor. 3:18).

Consider, for instance, these words: "And here we offer and present unto thee, O Lord, our selves, our souls, and bodies,

to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice unto thee; humbly beseeching thee that we, and all others who shall be partakers of this Holy Communion, may worthily receive the most precious Body and Blood of thy Son Jesus Christ, be filled with thy grace and

heavenly benediction, and made one body with him, that he may dwell in us, and we in him. And although we are unworthy, through our manifold sins, to offer unto thee any sacrifice, yet we beseech thee to accept this our bounden duty and service, not weighing our merits, but pardoning our offenses, through Jesus Christ our Lord." Here is the acknowledgment of "our manifold sins" and our need for a Redeemer. In the presentation of "our selves, our souls and bodies to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice" to God, we experience the transcendence spoken of by St. Paul in 2 Corinthians 3:18. It is in this transcendent experience that we are brought to the Good News, realizing, as John Wesley once wrote, the change that God works in the heart through faith in Christ, our hearts

"strangely warmed." It strengthens our trust in Christ alone for salvation, assuring us that he has taken away our sins and saved us from the law of sin and death. ...That is the transcendence Rite I may provide for the worshiper. If one is fully open to the experience, within the old language is a power that can lift and encourage the weary soul. "Come unto me, all ye that travail and are heavy laden. and I will refresh you" (Matt. 11:28). In the difference, beauty, and "highness" of Rite I's language is God, "who is able to do far more abundantly than all that we ask or think" (Eph. 3:20). Rite I becomes a means of God's grace by lifting worshipers to him.


The language of Rite I puts before me a

vision of God as my Almighty
Father who loves me and
invites me into his presence:
For while we were still weak, at
the right time Christ died for the
ungodly. God shows his love
for us in that while we were still
sinners, Christ died for us.
Since, therefore, we have now
been justified by his blood,

much more shall we be saved from the wrath of God. (Rom. 5:6, 8-9) Grace — that is what Rite I communicates. Its Comfortable Words confirm it. "Ye who do truly earnestly repent you of your sins, and are in love and charity with your neighbors, and intend to lead a new life, following the commandments of God, and walking henceforth in his holy ways: Draw near with faith." The very invitation to draw near to God is Good News. "Almighty God ... hath promised forgiveness of sins to all those who with hearty repentance and truth faith turn unto him." "Every word of God proves true; he is a shield to those who take refuge in him" (Prov. 30.5).


