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STRUGGLING WITH SIN

Have you ever noticed that we often measure other people spiritually in areas we feel we are the strongest? If we have no trouble with truth we judge others by their lies. If we don't curse we judge others by their language. This makes us feel better about ourselves...I guess.

If our righteousness is embracing the Ten Commandments, we all fail the test. However, we can be thankful that God doesn't judge us this way. He judges us by our faith in the work of Jesus. It's this simple: We can either be judged by the Law or by our faith in Jesus Christ. We can be judged by our so called goodness or our faith in Jesus Christ's death. We can be judged by comparison for others or by our faith in Jesus Christ.

The Law says "Thou shalt not kill" and Jesus says "If you have hatred you have killed." The Law says "Thou shalt not commit adultery," yet Jesus says "If you look upon a women with lust, you have committed adultery already."

Today many are trying to live by the "Thou shalt nots." One may say: "I don't drink, smoke, or chew, and I don't kiss girls who do." By this measure my dog is as good a Christian as the one who says such a thing. At least I've never witnessed my dog doing any of those things. We must remember that laws are written for the law breakers, James 2:10.

Romans 7:1-6 is not a commentary on marriage but Paul is illustrating bondage to the Law in that text. He is saying in order to get out of marriage the spouse would have to die. Then he likens the spouse to the Law. The Law would have to die, and Jesus nailed the Law to the cross. Colossians 2:13-14. The Law is to us and dead in the mind of God. It died as a measure of righteousness when Jesus died. Our righteousness is in the resurrected Christ. While in the Air Force I was subject to all sorts of regulations, but when I was discharged those laws did not apply to me anymore. And when I became a Christian, the Old Testament laws of righteousness did not apply to me because Jesus fulfilled them for me. See Romans 7:5-6. God no longer judges the Christian by their ability but by their availability. That might say something about our attendance in worship...don't you think? He is not impressed with how strong we are but how surrendered we are.



Now, we all have our old nature that we have to get out of bed, feed, clean, dress, and control. Therein lays our struggle. We know what God's standard is and what the holy nature of God wants for us. At the same time we know what and who we are: by nature not holy.

God gave Moses the Ten Commandment and by that measure we all fall terribly short. King David broke half of the Commandments in his sins with Bathsheba and her husband. Talk about falling short, David is a prime example. Yet he is honored by God...why? David's heart was convicted when confronted and he bowed to God's holiness.

You see, the Law was not given for the purpose of judgement, but was given so there would be no argument as to what pleases God. The Law exposes sin. It is not sin, Romans7:7. In the following verses we see that Paul said he would not have known without the definitive words of the Law.

Don DeWelt once said: "If you want someone to break a law, just make one." You know, "Don't touch the wet paint" kind of thing. So laws were written and as a result sin seized the opportunity that was afforded by the commands. Put a child in a room and tell him he can have any toy in the room full of toys but one. You and I know that the child will have that toy in his hand within minutes, if not seconds.

In Romans7:7-13 we read words like "seizing," "coveting," "desire," and "deceiving." Our old nature does all of that...and that is our struggle until the day we lay our bodies down to be with Jesus.

The Law is not a help in overcoming our struggle, it is merely a guide so we know sin when we see it.

In some homes cursing is against the rules of good behavior, while allowing drunkenness.

Yet in another arguing and cursing are allowed, but

never strong drink. Well, God has his rules and that is how we know what sin is. It is not what the U.S. Supreme Court says but what the righteous holy and Supreme God of the universe has stated. The battle within the Christian is deciding between my way, God's way, or the current conventional thinking.

In Romans 7:15-20 Paul states he too has a struggle with sin for three reasons. First having read the Commandments he knows what sin is. Second, knowing himself he knows what he is. And finally he knows there is a conflict between the two.

He uses the pronoun "I" 21 times in these verses and that is because he knows where the problem lies: within himself. God has stated what is perfect and Paul knows that when he tries to meet that standard of righteousness he fails, even though he tries so desperately. Like a diet, "Thin" is our desire but donuts are our greater tendency.

Paul says we must die to the law...forget, it we just can't do it. Jesus nailed those commands to the cross with Himself. He has fulfilled the law for all. However, though He fulfilled them for everyone, only those who by faith and obedience to the gospel trust the sacrifice and enjoy it.

One of the most blessed texts in the Word of God, one that thrills my heart is Roman 8:1-2 "Therefor, there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus, because through Christ Jesus the law of the Spirit of life set me free from the law of sin and death."

What a blessing to know that Christ has kept the laws of righteousness for me and that beyond that He took the punishment that I deserved.

Now all of this should be an encouragement to those who struggle with sin or fret over the sins of the past. Our problem is that we don't think like God and are not as compassionate as he. It is for this reason that we not only struggle with sin but we also struggle when trying to grasp such a love.

We don't think like God and because of that we condemn ourselves over and over again. This robs us of the courage, yes even boldness in our Christian life. His love is beyond our grasp, and as the hymn states: If the oceans were filled with ink and every stock a quill we could not write the love of God. It is so vast. However, this is not a license to sin, but a reason for a gratitude attitude.

So quit struggling and start believing and you will find it easier to live nearer to the holiness of God. We can concentrate on what we are and let it drag us down. We need to let this truth lift us up.

We hope that you can attend next year and we once again can come together to give God praise and we can fellowship together.

SPRING IS HERE: On March 10, 2019, we celebrated an experience that we have very mixed emotions about. It was on that Saturday (well, actually Sunday morning) that we turned our clocks forward one hour and another time change was put into the history books. I don't know about you, but I am trying to bring myself to a better understanding of why we go through this process every year. There was some talk and still is of leaving the time in the daylight saving mode and not change it back on November 3rd. Again this is just talk and you all know what happens when politicians get together to talk and decide things.

The main reason for Daylight Savings Time is to move an hour of daylight from the morning and place it in the evening thus giving us an extra hour of daylight for activities in the evening. Could we use this time of natural rebirth to remind us that we could use a little time of spiritual rebirth or renewal? Just like the time of winter brings extended periods of darkness, we also go through stages of darkness spiritually. We get depressed in winter and we carry this depression over into our spiritual life on some occasions. But here we are celebrating spring when the sun touches us and we have more happiness. Why not have that rebirth spiritually? I know there may be newness around us, in this time of year, but unless we get up and get out we miss the challenging time.

Psalm 51:10 has a challenge for us to consider as we think of a spring time in our spiritual life. In this Psalm we are given a prayer we should utter often during this time of year. Actually we should pray this prayer each day, "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a steadfast spirit within me."

There could be times when our heart gets a little unclean and we need to do some spring cleaning. David did some soul searching and he then approached God asking for a cleansing of his heart. He admitted sin in his life and he recognized the need for God's help.

He continued his thoughts by expressing a need for a renewal of his spirit. This renewal needs to be of a steadfast nature. Steadfastness can be stated in several ways such as unwavering, persistent, committed, and dedicated. When we think about asking God to renew our spirit with more of these aspects I can only hope that we are serious and want to make changes as David did. However, are we serious about wanting a change in our spiritual life or are we just playing a game like many churches do each year they have a "Revival"? We sing a few songs, including "Revive us Again," and we meet for three extra days in a week and we call it a Revival. But where is the change within us? Now don't get me wrong, some may be touched by a revival but it has been my experience that it doesn't last long. I read Psalm 51:10 and I see David's desire for an extended renewal in all he does. As we read about David we know that such a renewal happened to him. He drifted from God and was focused on his own pleasures rather than what God wanted. But he wanted a change and he knew that God was the source from which the change would come.

May I encourage you to take a few minutes and read Psalm 51 and as you read verse 10 consider asking God to help you clean up your heart and renew your spirit with a more dedicated and persistent one. No matter how strong and faithful you presently are we know there is a devil out there who wants to see you slip away from God, so a daily renewal, rebirth, or revival will keep you close to the Master. Remember 1 John 4:4 says, *"You are from God, little children, and have overcome them; because* greater is He who is in you than he who is in the world."

Feelings may come and feelings may go, but feelings are deceiving, my warrant is the Word of God and on nothing else believing.

NO MAN LIVES TO HIMSELF Sermon by Denny Coburn

TEXT: Romans 14:13-23

INTRO: In the first half of the chapter Paul seems to be saying: Take care of yourself and don't worry about others. His points were: Accept others as they are, we are not isolated individually, and that we only have to account for ourselves. Then he moves to the last half of the chapter he seems to emphasis that we should however be looking out for our brothers and sisters.

In reading these we can see that no single truth is disconnected from any other biblical truth. One man lives to himself. While we are judged by our own faith and behavior we should not ignore others. He was addressing the strong and the weak and gives us the transition word "therefore" to address how these truths join.

I. JUDGING OTHERS, HELP (13-16)

A. <u>REMOVE STUMBLING BLOCKS</u>

- 1. "Make up your mind" Do not judge others
- 2. Be careful not to cause others to stumble
- 3. Our liberties come with responsibilities
- 4. "Stumble" (No offensive impediment)

B. <u>CONVICTION vs CONVICTION</u>

- 1. Paul was convicted no food is unclean
- 2. Knew the old covenant was temporary
- 3. Yet grants others there convictions.
- 4. If we ignore them we are not acting in love

C. ACTING IN LOVE

- 1. Ignoring this principle can destroy others
- 2. Other whom Jesus died for
- 3. It is asking little to limit our freedom
- 4. It can cause our good to be evil spoken of

II. KINGDOM vs LIBERTY (17-19)

A. WHAT IS THE KINGDOM?

- Only place Paul uses "kingdom of God"
- 1. What we eat is a liberty (we all can choose)
- 2. Righteousness is not liberty a must
- 3. Kingdom is Righteousness, Peace, and Joy in the Holy Spirit, v17
- 4. God rules and we must acknowledge it.

When Bible tells us "do not judge" we must take those words in their proper context. We should not judge the conviction of others. We are to judge and we should know how to judge the difference between what is sin and what is righteousness.

Such things as what we eat, wear, and the likes are not something that falls into the category of what is righteous. Harming others by condemning them is. We all have a right to choose in both between what is and what is not acceptable to God...for ourselves, but not for others.

So when we speak against an evil as it is described in Scripture and others tell you "not to judge, you are not. You can tell them that you are not…but that God has. But burgers or salad is their choice.

HOMOSEXUALITY AND GOD

When Paul said homosexuals will not inherit God's kingdom, he was not simply stating his private opinion (1 Corinthians 7:25). All of Paul's writings are divinely authoritative (Galatians 1:12; 2 Corinthians 2:13; 12:12). His primary condemnation of homosexuality is in Romans 1:26-27, and the divine authority of this passage is undisputed.

The Levitical law against homosexuality (Leviticus 18:22) has not been abolished (Acts 10:15) along with the Levitical law against eating pork and shrimp (Leviticus 11:2-3, 10). God's law against homosexuality is a part of His moral law, not ceremonial law, and God's moral law is still binding (see Romans 1:26-27; 1 Corinthians 6:9).

If God's law against homosexuality was merely ceremonial (and thus abolished in the New Testament times), we would have to conclude that rape, incest, and bestiality are not morally wrong either, because they are condemned together with homosexual sins (Leviticus 18:6-14, 22-23).

Homosexual acts connected with idolatry are condemned (1 Kings 14:24), but Scripture also condemns homosexuality apart from idolatry (Leviticus 18:22). Moreover, homosexuality is condemned alongside other forms of sexual sin, such as adultery and incest. Are we to conclude that adultery and incest are wrong only when associated with idolatry and that all other forms of these practices are okay? Such reasoning is warped. It is only by twisting Scripture that a person can allege that the Bible condones homosexuality.

Often when someone is going through a time of trouble and seeking help, from a spiritual perspective a friend may reply, "Oh Jesus understands" and then quotes a verse of Scripture perhaps out of context. This is done with the intention to help ease the pain, perhaps without the foggiest notion of the great theological principles that are attached to the text quoted. The intention may be good but does it give much factual information of the great concern Jesus has for our trials? Many times this approach does not indicate how our Lord has actually identified Himself with the sorrow.

It would be better to express personal concern and then direct the troubled friend to the language of the Scripture telling of the things Jesus has done regarding difficulties in our lives. Our Lord does understand we should direct one another to the things God has revealed in relation to our difficulties. Jesus demonstrated over and over by what He said and did that He deeply cares and understands.

We are told in Hebrews 2:6-8 speaking of how God is mindful of us humans and He expresses it with regard to both mankind and the suffering His Son endured and not just on the cross. *"What is man that you are mindful of him, the son of man (Jesus) that you care for him? You made him a little lower than the angels; you crowned him with glory and honor and put everything under his feet,"* v6-7. In those words we see the first principle we should always share; we are created and He is mindful of us. He is so mindful that before the creation of the world He had in mind to send His Son in human form to endure all the things we endure, and even more that we endure.

Jesus was sent in the flesh not only to save us from our sin, which is the greatest gift He could give, but Jesus suffered as we do when tempted with sin. He could make atonement "*Because he himself suffered when he was tempted, he is able to help those who are being tempted,*" Heb.2:18. The first thing Jesus suffered when He became a man was temptation. All of us are tempted at some time or another but He understands because He has been there.

People hurt people, intentionally and unintentionally. In either case the hurt is felt deeply especially if the person is close to you. But the Scriptures tell us, "But if you suffer for doing good and you endure it, this is commendable before God. To this you were called, because Christ suffered for you, leaving you an example, that you should follow in his steps," 1 Peter 2:20-21. He understands because He has been there.

Jesus the man was created, but the inner being was God and the inner was not created. He always was. He had what is called a hypostatic union in theological terms which simply means He had two natures. The external created body called Jesus in which He lived and the internal being which was "The Christ," or God in the flesh. Of Jesus it is written *"He was despised and rejected by men, a man of sorrows, and familiar with suffering. Like one from whom men hide their faces he was despised and we esteemed him not,"* Isaiah 53:3. We have One in heaven who can feel our pains because He experienced them Himself. He understands. He understands because He's been there.

Many times during an active life we may accumulate enemies. You know, we get a promotion thers think belonged to them. We may disagree with someone on an issue and that may create an enemy. It could be that they have been given a wrong impression or we may remind them of someone else and that may cause them to dislike you. But I doubt that many of us have had the experience of knowing they are plotting to kill us. Well that is exactly the case Jesus found Himself in because his disciple went through a grain field on the Sabbath and ate some of the grain, Matt. 12:1-2. When Jesus defended their actions (verses 11-12) they plotted how they might kill Him (verse 14). So if we get down because someone doesn't like us, or speaks evil of us, just take it to Jesus. He's been there.

Christ's humanity, like His deity, is an essential Christian doctrine. As the perfect mediator between God and man, Christ in the incarnation was both fully divine and fully human. To deny either constitutes heresy, See 1 John 4:3

Christ's development as a human was normal in every respect, with two major exceptions: Christ always did the will of God, and He never sinned. As Hebrews 4:15 tells us, in Christ "we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sin." Indeed, Christ is "holy, innocent, unstained," Hebrews 7:26. We see Christ's humanity in these scriptures:

- Jesus had human parents, Matthew 1:18-19.
- He had relatives, Mark 6:3, John 7:5.
- He experienced a human birth, Matthew 1:23; Luke 1:24, 26, 31; 2:6,7,22-23, Galatians.4:4.
- He experienced normal human growth, Matthew 2:11; Luke 2:16; 240; 242-50; 2:52
- He had human ethnicity, for He was Jewish, Genesis 49:10; John 4:9; Galatians 4:4; Hebrews 7:14
- He experienced normal human emotions, John 11:35; Hebrews 5:7
- He hungered and thirst, Luke 4:2; John 4:1-7; 19:28.
- He experienced weariness, Mark 6:31; John 4:6.
- He endured pain, Matthew 25:45; Mark 15:25-34; John 19:28.
- He suffered death, Luke 24:40; John 20:27; Acts 2:24.

When Jesus became a man, He revealed God to us. He became a qualified Mediator between mankind and God, due to the fact that He alone has experienced both sides of the spiritual issue between God and man. Whatever painful experience we have endured, whatever low or height we have reached Jesus experienced more in both dimensions. So whatever pain of life we may experience, no matter how much we are praised or scorned, regardless of our being hurt by others. Jesus can sympathize with us because He has been there.

Some people wonder why God sometimes seems to keep His distance. Theologians suggest that for God to continually intervene in human affairs would interfere with His overall plan of sifting the true inner character of people over a prolonged time. Each person has been given a stewardship of time on earth, and that person's allotment of time reveals his or her true nature.

Our Creator has given us that free will. We may exercise it anyway we wish or it is not really a free will. Sometimes our choices in life get us into deeper trouble than we could have imagined. It may be a sin, an error in judgement, or unchristian reaction to something or someone else. Regardless of the situation, our response to the problem that arises, regardless who instigated it that which results in trial may be the same.

Now, not counting who or what lead to the difficulty, God is on the scene watching and ready to guide us through that problem, but we must rely on His direction as given in His Word. Prolonged difficulty does not mean God does not know, does not care, will not help us or is not near. It is through the trials of life that molds us into the person He wants us to be.

If our Heavenly Father who loves dearly His one and only Son yet allows Him to suffer for things He did not do, can we honestly believe He is removed from our problems? It is for us that He sent His Son as a sacrifice, it is for us that He is preparing a place so we can be with Him forever. It is also to us that the words *"I will never leave you nor forsake you,"* are given. The hymn "Does Jesus Care When My Heart is Pained?" says it all:
