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IT'S NO LAUGHING MATTER

Years ago *Readers Digest* had a section in one of their issues called "Finish the Joke." The idea was that the readers were given a premise and they were to provide the punch line to the joke. The line voted the best would win \$100. The story they provided was this: A man goes into a home-improvement store and asked, "Can you help me find a ceiling fan?" The salesman replied, "I'm sorry, we are all out of tuna fish." The man said, "I'm actually looking for a ceiling fan," and the salesman replied loudly, "I told you we are out of tuna fish." "A ceiling fan!" the man shouted in frustration, "I want a ceiling fan!"

That was the joke to which they wanted a punchline. I don't know what the winning line was, but that was premise. It reminded me of some conversations we have with theological liberals.

When a flaw in their thinking is revealed by Scripture, they change the subject, like the salesman in the story, and they are good at it. An

example could be: when a liberal is confronted with a flaw in their thinking they want to change the subject. They seldom accompany their rebuttal with logic, nor any authoritative support. Rather they drop the subject and point to flaws in the person revealing the weakness of their view.

This behavior is known in debating circles as "ad hominem" which means "to the man." It is an appeal to one's supposed prejudices, selfish interest, etc. It turns the discussion or debate back on the opposition, thus discussing their opponent rather than the original subject. They are changing the subject just as the salesman did in talking about tuna fish rather than ceiling fans.

In spiritual discussions there is a similar avoidance tactic. It's easily recognizable by the catch phrase "You are intolerant," or "That might be right for you but not for me." This statement, "You are intolerant," is intended to shift the subject and put you on the defense. The statement "that's just your interpretation (opinion)" serves the same

purpose. They must change the subject to either you or someone else to avoid being cornered.

Some can switch the subject quicker than a couch potato can change the channel. When asked about their relationship to Christ, they want to talk about "some hypocrites in the church." They might want to talk about how someone hurting their feelings. They don't seem to realize that hypocrites in the church assembly will have to give an account for their own short comings. And as for having hurt feelings, everyone gets their feelings hurt at times, that's life. They are good "subject switchers" in order to avoid seriously talking about Jesus.

The foundations of some beliefs are just "reasons" seldom rationally arrived at. They are often unexamined assumptions. and presuppositions hammered into their mind by the secular world. The media, entertainment world, and even public educational systems are saturated with unbiblical held beliefs that are generally antagonistic to Christianity. This is not to mention mankind's mind. "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways. As the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts," Isaiah 55:8-9, Eph. 3:20-21.

It is obvious the reason behind their avoidance tactics is that their positions are indefensible by logic and contrary to the Word of God. A mind that is unconverted will come to unbiblical conclusions. They are led to believe such things as human life is only valuable as long as it is wanted. Thus babies are destroyed in their mother's womb and called "choice." Their tactic diverts the subject from the precious life of a child to the mother's desires. Thus government supported killing.

This tactic is seen in the definition of marriage partners. A family need not include a husband in one case or a wife in the other. Thus we have same-sex marriages. To them a "family" is anything you desire be called one. Never mind that the Bible condemns such actions, Lev. 18:22, 20:13; Judges 19:16-24; Rom. 1:18-32. On this subject

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it's not about gender but about what a person wants even if it's one of their own sex. Do I hear "Let's change the subject, it's not my choice, God made me this way." Right! It's God's fault.

Theologically liberal people are not liberal for just any reason they are so because they reject God and anything that He stands for. When that happens it is followed by some of the most bazar thinking in all matters of life.

If a Christian wants to speak of Jesus, they are uncomfortable so they want to talk about the sins of some of His people. If we want to encourage them to attend worship, they want to change the subject to something petty. Here is an illustration of changing the subject:

Christian: "Why don't you come back to worship?"

Theo. Liberal: "As long as <u>John Smith</u> attends there I won't be back."

C: "John has to account for himself as you and I. We are there to worship Jesus not John.

TL: "Well, you have rich people with nice cloths."

C: "It's not about the way one dresses, it's Jesus."

TL: "I'm not as rich as most of the people there."

C: "Is money more important than your soul?"

TL: "I need to spend time with my family."

C: "I agree, but you can show your love by bringing them with you."

TL: "My wife can't be around crowds."

I believe you get the idea. It's not Jesus or themselves, but John Smith, people with nice clothes or money, my family, my wife, etc. When Christians discuss the issues from a biblical perspective as well as with intelligence, we can't lose the discussion, but we can lose the person.

Stop and address the "subject switcher" with love for them as seen in what you say and how you say it. They can tell if it's real love. How about this:

"Joe, I want to be real with you. I love you and am concerned about your future. I don't want to debate with you. If you never intend to take a serious look at your spiritual life and be honest with God about the day you will face Him, just tell me. But if you do intend to address the subject of your eternal destination, let's do it now." Just be honest and sincere. Looking back, the man said "A ceiling fan! I want a ceiling fan." The salesman replied, "I told you we are out of tuna fish." Customer: "I want 2 pounds of tuna." Salesman, "We have a new ceiling fan." Customer, "I'll take one."

CONCLUSION: The expectation of Mary, Martha, and others is with us today. Does omnipotence always exert its power? No, but why He doesn't at times need not be explained. A child's death, a tragic accident, or terminal illness does not have to be explained now. There is no want of love in Him, it may be love that actually allows these things. When Jesus' love and power are displayed it did not change the priests and all the Jews. An answer would not have changed them. We are to have the faith and He will supply His love, with His power and wisdom.

FALSE PROPHETS AND TEACHERS

There are those who would believe anything any TV evangelist would say. This is in spite of the fact that the Scriptures warns against false prophets and false teachers for the simple reason that God's own people can be deceived, Ez. 34:1-7, The Bible exhorts us to test those who claim to be prophets, 1 John 4:1-3.

How can Christians recognize a false prophet? Here are some clues:

False prophets make predictions that aren't fulfilled, Deut. 18:21-21.

They sometimes entice people to follow false gods such as Allah, Ex. 20:3-4, Deut. 13:1-3.

They often deny the deity of Jesus Christ, as does Muhammad, Col. 2:8-9.

They sometimes deny the humanity of Jesus Christ, again as does Islam, 1 John 4:1-2.

They sometimes advocate legalism, such as abstaining from certain foods for spiritual reasons, 1 Tim. 4:3-4.

They often encourage severe denial for spiritual reasons, Col. 2:16-23.

Sometimes they teach that marriage is bad, 1 Tim.4:3.

They often promote various forms of immorality, Jude 4-7.

If a so-called prophet says anything that clearly contradicts any part of the Word of God, his teachings should be rejected. The Word of God exposes error.

We ought to follow the example of the Bereans by comparing all truth claims with Scripture, Acts 17:11 and 1 Thess. 5:21.

Study Number One Hundred Twelve - Duty and Doctrine

"Therefore we are always confident and know that as long as we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord. We live by faith, not by sight. We are confident; I say and would prefer to be away from the body and at home with the Lord. So we make it our goal to please him, whether we are at home in the body or away from it. For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ, that each one may receive what is due him for the things done while in the body, whether good or bad. Since, then, we know what it is to fear the Lord, we try to persuade men, 2 Corinthians 5:6-11

What we believe and how we behave must always go together. Paul usually connected duty and doctrine, because what God has done for us must motivate us to do something to express our gratitude for what He has done. Phillip Brooks once said, "Christianity knows no truth which is not the child of love and the parent of duty."

A woman once said to her preacher, "You would have preached a marvelous sermon, except for all those 'therefores' at the end." However, the Apostle Paul would have agreed with the preacher because he used "therefore" and "wherefore" quite liberally in all his letters. In fact you find them in this section of 2 Corinthians verses 6, 9, 11, 16 and 17. He uses these words as he moves from what is expected to the motivation for his ministry. His enemies had accused him of using the ministry of the Gospel for his own selfish purposes, when in reality they were the ones who were "merchandising" the Gospel. See 4:2; 2:17.

We should all ask the question: "What is my ministry?" Regardless of the particular talent one may possess or the position we may have in the local congregation, the motive behind what we do and say is the same as Paul's and that is to persuade sinners to be reconciled to God, see verses 11 and 20 of this section of Scripture. We should never force people to trust Christ, or coerce them by some devious approach, such as we hear of some Muslims in other countries. Paul stated in 2 Thessalonians 2:3 "For the appeal we make does not spring from error or impure motives, nor are we trying to trick you." Put in common expression he might have said "Our message to you is true, our motives are pure, our conduct is absolutely aboveboard." The Christian worker must have the right motive for ministry as well as the right message.

In our text above we read, "Since, then, we know what it is to fear the Lord, we try to persuade men." This attitude is often lacking in ministry. A Bible scholar once wrote "Every year makes me tremble at the daring with which people speak of spiritual things." Phillip Brooks used to warn about "clerical jesters" whose jesting about the Bible robbed that inspired Book of some of its glory and power. There is a sad absence of reverence in the public meetings of the church, so that it is no surprise that the younger generation is not taking the things of God seriously.

Notice Paul stated a "goal" and that was to "please Him." There is an ambition that is selfish and worldly, but there is also a holy ambition that honors the Lord. Paul's great ambition was to be well-pleasing to Jesus Christ. The Judaizers ministered to please men and enlisted them in their causes; but Paul ministered to please Jesus Christ alone, Gal. 1:10. A man-pleasing ministry is a carnal, compromising ministry; and God cannot bless it.

Since it should be the goal of every Christian to please God, it would be wise to learn exactly what pleases the Master. The terms "pleasing" or "well-pleasing" in reference to bringing pleasure to God is used several times in the Bible. Romans 12:1 states, "Therefore, I urge you, brothers, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God..." This is a clear statement of what pleases the Lord, the presenting of our bodies to Him for service. In other words, we are to use our physical abilities to help others and avoid causing them to stumble, Romans 14:18. God is pleased when His children separate themselves from the evil around them, Eph. 5:10, as well as when they bring their offerings to Him, Phil. 4:18. He is pleased with us when we submit to our parents, Col. 3:20, aw well as with saints who permit Jesus Christ to work out His perfect will in their lives, Hebrews 13:20-21.

David was constantly pouring his heart out to the Lord in written word and song. He wrote the majority of Psalms leaving us an example of this expression. It is believed that he wrote Psalm 51 as a result of feeling the burden for his sin with Bathsheba where he begged the Lord not to take His Holy Spirit from him. He knew the Lord was his source of help, strength, and encouragement as revealed throughout the Psalms. David, regardless of what he was or was not, he was a man of faith. His faith was in the God who is perfect truth. God can't lie and in Him is no shadow of turning. One who trusts in Him will never be disappointed and this was the faith that David had in Him.

DAVID'S TRUST IN THE WORD OF GOD

Nowhere is this more evident than in Psalm 119. Turning to verse 28 we read "My soul is weary with sorrow; strengthen me <u>according to your word</u>." Recalling the word "strengthen" is the same as "encourage" David finds his encouragement in the word. Try as we might, we will not find encouragement in men, drugs, and other means. David points the way to lasting encouragement that comes only from the word of the Lord.

In this one Psalm alone we find "acres of diamonds" for the soul that needs encouraged. David either sang or wrote to remind himself of the "unfailing love" of God as seen in His salvation, verses 41 and 76. When all hope seems gone he turns to the word of God. I have written many times in this series that the loss of hope is the last straw before someone attempts suicide. David in verse 49 writes, "Remember your word to your servant, for you have given me hope." We do not have faith in faith, but faith in the God who spoke the very words that lead to faith. Faith finds its power in the One we have faith in.

David returns to the first revelation of God, the account of His creation, for comfort. He writes "Your faithfulness continues through all generations; you established the earth, and it endures. Your laws endure to this day, for all things serve you," verses 90-91. Regardless of what has befallen us, or what we have to face by recalling the eternal existence of God we return to the foundation of our faith.

The book of Hebrews tells us that "by faith we understand that the universe was formed <u>at God's</u> <u>command</u>," Hebrews 11:3. Enduring encouragement, like everything else, is impossible without faith in God, verse 6 and His righteous ones will live by faith, Hebrews 10:38.

Going back to Psalm 119 we learn that while his enemies waited to destroy David, he "pondered" the "Lord's statues." In other words he dwelt on the promises of God rather than spending useless energy thinking about his enemies. Those of God that desire to encourage themselves in the Lord will think on His word, the history of His dealings with evil, with man, our enemies and His promises.

DAVID TOOK GOD AT HIS WORD

David saw the Word of God as a "hedge" of protection for him against all that came upon him, verse 111. In this longest chapter in the Bible David wrote "according to your word" in verses 9, 21, 28, 37, 65, 107, 133, 169 and "according to your promise," in verses 76 and 170. He also knew that the word of God was as God Himself, eternal, verse 89. He saw the word of God as a "lamp to my feet and a light for my path," verse 105.

WHAT AM I TRYING TO SAY?

Our subject is: "How does one encourage oneself in the Lord?" This question begs another question: "How can one expect encouragement from the Lord without honoring the word of the Lord?" I know we are all weak frail human beings and we can get off track easily, but after lying in sorrow and self-pity for a short while, a Christian must look to the Lord for encouragement.

The Bible is the revelation of God. It not only reveals Him to us and it also reveals a lot about ourselves to us. Throughout the Bible we see God's very best men, prophets, kings, and even priests who have displayed human behavior that is anything but complimentary. Some turned away from God in shame and fear but most turned to God for forgiveness, enlightenment and encouragement. David is a great example of both; one who sinned against God and became discouraged, but he also encouraged himself in the Lord by turning to His word.

A slow and deliberate reading of Psalm 119 taking note of the number of times David referred to the word of God as his encouragement might be helpful. It surely was a great help to him. It is good to receive encouragement from friends and loved ones, but no one is a better friend and no one loves to encourage us more the Lord God Himself. So take courage "in the Lord" and in the words of our Lord.

WHY WE SAY IT

Where did the words "anxious seat" come from? The term came into popular use in the 1820's and 30's at Methodist revival meetings. Those about to be converted were asked to "walk the sawdust trail" (a term for the sawdust floor of a tent meeting) up to the front of the meeting where special seats were provided for them. It was the custom of the revivalist to recite the sins of the occupants, often citing by chapter and verse their individual misdeeds. This, no doubt, is what made the subjects "anxious: and the name was given to the seats. This was, no doubt, humiliating causing more anxiety. Other denominations practiced this as well.

The biblical practice would have followed the example of the Apostles and Peter as recorded in Acts Chapter 2. There the Gospel was preached causing conviction and those who heard the sermon asked the question: "What must I do to be saved?" The answer was given and followed, "Repent and be baptized every one of you, in the name Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins. And you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit," Acts 2:38. Here we see the history of the acts of the Holy Spirit in the Bible, followed by the acts of man in the 1800's.

OBEDIENCE

In 1 Peter 4:17 the apostle asks the rhetorical question, "What shall the end be of those who obey not the gospel?" The answer seems to be "death, destruction, and hell." Actually, Paul had answered that very question in 2 Thessalonians 1:8, saying Christ at His second coming (Parousia)"...would take vengeance on those who "know not God and obey not the gospel."

Some would say "that faith plus works." No it is "faith in action," See James 1:22 "Do not merely listen to the word, and so deceive yourselves. Do what it says." Also read James 2:14-26. You will find the words "deeds," "does," "action," "do" "did," and "does" used, in relation to faith used 14 times. In Hebrews 3:18-19 that Paul agrees with James seeing "disobeyed" and "unbelieve" as the same thing. Faith is not "simple belief-ism."
