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BUILDING BRIDGES

Once two brothers, Bill and Jay, lived on adjoining farms had a conflict. It was the first time in many years of farming side by side, even sharing the machinery necessary for farm labor they fell out.

Like most misunderstandings, it grew to be a major feud with bitter words and a long period of silence.

One morning there was a knock on Bill's door. He opened it to find a man with a carpenter's belt and a tool box. The man said he was looking for work and said, "Maybe you have some small jobs here on your farm that I could do for you."

Jay replied, "Yes, I do have a job for you. Look across the creek at that farm. That's my neighbor, in fact it is my brother. Some time ago there was a meadow between us and he took his dozer to the river levee and now there is a creek between us. He done that to spite me, but I'll go one better. See that pile of lumber by the barn? I want you to build me a fence, eight foot tall so I won't have to see his place or his face any more."

The carpenter said, "I think I understand the situation. Do you have the nails and posts hole digger? If you do I can start right now and do a job that will please you." So the farmer took the carpenter with him to town to let the carpenter pick out the nails and other necessary materials to do the job. Before noon they were back and the carpenter began digging, sawing, and nailing.

The farmer had to make a trip to a neighboring town for some business and when he returned the carpenter had just finished the job.

The farmer's eyes popped open and his jaw dropped. There was no fence, but instead there was a bridge stretching from his side of the creek to the other. It was a fine piece of work with handrails and all. But what marveled him the most was his brother on the bridge with an outstretched hand saying, "You are quite a brother to build a bridge after all I've said to you." The brothers met in the middle of the bridge at first clasping hands and then embracing each other.

The brother who employed the carpenter turned to him and said, "Wait! I have a few other jobs for you." The carpenter replied, "I'd love to stay, but I have a few more bridges to build," as he hoisted his toolbox onto his shoulder walked away.

This story is not true and you probably knew that, but what an illustration of how much better it is to build bridges to others rather than to build fences. Many



Christians seem to know so much but don't know how to forgive. In the first book of the Bible, Genesis 33 we have a perfect example of how to build a bridge between two brothers, Esau and Jacob.

They were Abraham's sons.

When Abraham was near death Jacob stole his older brother's blessing, a blessing that rightfully was the older brother's. Esau was wronged. This caused a rift between the brothers that lasted for years. How could God expect reconciliation? But, He does.

How was such a situation as this to be reconciled? An angel met Jacob on the road. We don't know what was said between Jacob and the angel but whatever it was, it motivated Jacob to make amends, to admit his wrong and go to his brother. I believe when we meet God in prayer the first thing we must do is confront our own wrongs and sins. This may be why some don't pray often, if at all.

Didn't Jesus say the same thing? "So if you are offering your gift at the altar, and there you remember that your brother has something against you, leave your gift there in front of the altar. First go and be reconciled with your brother, and then come and offer your gift," Matt. 5:23-24.

Next, reconciliation must be intentional. Jacob knew he had done wrong and had to make it right by taking the first step. To fail to do this, believing that "time heals all wounds." This is wrong, it only forces the hurt below the surface. We must confront the problem and do it privately between the two of you, Matt. 18:15. We can say, "I was wrong," "I haven't been honest with you," or "Your actions hurt me, and I love you too much to allow our relationship to crumble."

Third, we must accept the fact that reconciliation demands <u>humility</u>. Jacob "...bowed to the ground seven times until he approached his brother," 33:3. That was an act of humility. This puts us in a position for reconciliation to occur. This is the best way to dig the hole to bury the hatchet.

Fourth, we must allow ourselves to be vulnerable. When the brothers met "... Esau ran to meet him, hugged him, threw his arms around him and

kissed him. Then they both wept" 33:4. It should be noted that both the offender and the offended wept. We need to ask: Do we want to go through life living in a closet, safe from hurt, but cut off from a relationship that gives you peace and joy? Fifth, forgiveness is not optional in reconciling a broken relationship. Forgiveness involves letting go so you can get on with the rest of your life. Forgiveness simply means willing to let the hurt go, or if you are the offender, humbly ask for pardon.

In this story we see a glimpse of God. Notice carefully as you read the Chapter what Jacob says to Esau: "For seeing your face, like seeing God's face, since you have accepted me," 33:10. If you want to know what the face of God looks like, go to the brother or sister you have offended, ask for their forgiveness, to hear them say "you are forgiven." When forgiveness is extended from the wounded, we see the face of God.

But you say, "They have offended me." God says to you remember that both Jacob (the offender) and Esau (the offended) both wept and were glad. We as believers in Jesus Christ are to be like God?

As God has forgiven you, you are to forgive those who have hurt you. As God has reconciled us to Himself, we are to be reconciled with others.

Have you been hurt by someone else and wanted to hurt them back? Get even? Seek revenge? Retaliate? Even thought of harming them? Esau had those feelings and many think he would be justified if he acted on them. But when God intervened through an angel to Jacob, the road to reconciliation became paved.

A Sunday school teacher asked her class what we must do so we can be forgiven. There was a long pause. Finally little Johnny raised his hand. "Yes Johnny what is it that we must do before we can be forgiven. Johnny replied, "sin." He was correct though it was not the answer the teacher was looking for. Sin is always involved in broken relationships. The greatest hurt by both parties is there is no forgiveness.

I don't know what Jesus wrote in the sand when the men brought the woman caught in adultery. Was it the names of the men and their sin? Was it an Old Testament scripture? If you bring someone else's sin to God in prayer, He would have no trouble sharing our own sin with us. "For if you do not forgive other the Father will not forgive you." Be more like the Carpenter, build bridges not fences.

Study Number One Hundred Fifteen – The Loss of Hope

It is my belief that there was never a person on the earth who at one time or another lost hope, even the very best and most righteous of us. We are encouraged in the Scripture to cling to our hope. And when we do not we read in Proverbs 13:12 that "Hope deferred makes the heart sick." When all hope is lost nothing seems to matter and there are no prospects of a future.

King David was a hero of the Old Testament and perhaps the best king the nation of Israel ever had as well as the author of many Psalms of hope, encouragement and faith. Yet we see this great man of God is found lying on the floor in despair refusing to eat, 2 Samuel 12:15-23. In Psalm 38:4 David writes "My guilt has overwhelmed me like a burden too heavy to bear." In verses 6-7 he continues "I am bowed down and brought very low; all day long I go about mourning. My back is filled with searing pain; there is no health in my body." There is not an account of David with so great a physical pain...no this is hopelessness of the soul. Have you ever felt all is loss of hope? Then read on.

One of the great hero and defenders of the faith in the Old Testament was Elijah. After a victory over Baal and 400 false prophets you would think Elijah, a prophet of God, would have great confidence in the God of all hope. But you would be wrong. When he received the message from Jezebel that she was going to kill him, he ran. "Elijah was afraid and ran for his life. When he came to Beersheba in Judah, he left his servant there, while he himself went a day's journey into the desert. He came to a broom tree, sat down under it and prayed that he might die," 1 Kings 19:3-4. God had him take a nap and Elijah went to sleep. Have you ever been so down you wanted to die? Read on.

It is interesting to read of the first submarine captain Jonah. He didn't want to go the Nineveh so he sailed in the other direction. When the sailors discovered he was running from God they fed the fish...really it was just one large one. He even made the fish sick and so it vomited him up on the beach, so he thought he may as well obey. He met with great success, the city repented of their sin. When Lord showed mercy on them Jonah was so angry that his own sinful reaction even made him sick of himself that he said "Now, O Lord, take away my life, for it is better for me to die than to live," Jonah 4:3. Again, we have a good man making bad mistakes and getting depressed because things didn't go his way. Have you ever had things go so wrong, in your eyes that made you feel so disappointed that you see only your vision and hopeless? Read on.

We can hardly have a conversation about patience without the mention of Job. He was such a righteous man that the Devil pointed him out to God as a man who couldn't stand a real hard test of his faith. He was "blameless, upright, he feared God and shunned evil," Job 1:1. He lost it all, his donkeys, sheep, camels, his sons and daughters but in all this "Job did not sin by charging God with wrongdoing," Job 1:22. But even with all that going for him he wondered why he didn't just die at birth, 3:11. Did he lose hope? It sounds like it in the words "I have no peace, no quietness, I have no rest, but only turmoil," 3:26. I doubt you have lost as much as Job did. He was a truly blessed and truly righteous man, yet he was human and hope was slipping away. Have you lost as much as Job, even a tenth of what he lost? Regardless, read on.

Every child has heard of Moses and his mighty feats. He faced Pharaoh with the demands of God. He performed miracles that caused fear in the heart of the ruler of Egypt. He led God's people through the Red Sea. He was the great Law Giver, who spoke directly to God on Mt. Sinai. He returned to the twelve tribes with the two tablets containing the Ten Commandments. This great man of God has his moments also. In Numbers Chapter Eleven we see that even Moses begins to blame God and feel sorry for himself as all hope vanished within him. He asked God "Why have you brought this trouble on your servant? What have I done to displease you that you put the burden of all these people on me? Did I conceive all these people? Did I give them birth? Why do you tell me to carry them in my arms, as a nurse carries an infant to the land you promise on oath to their forefathers? Where scan I get meat for all these people? They keep wailing to me, 'Give me meat to eat!' I cannot barry all these people myself;

promised on oath to their forefathers? Where can I get meat for all these people? They keep wailing to me, 'Give me meat to eat!' I can't carry all these people by myself the burden is too heavy for me. If this is how you are going to treat me, put me to death right now, if I have found favor in your eyes do not let me face my own ruin," Numbers 11:11-15. Have you ever felt you had so much on your plate that you want to give up? Have you had so much put on you that you have lost all hope even to the point that you'd rather just die? Moses did and he lost all hope, Moses, the one who faced Pharaoh down! If you have been over your head with burden read on.

Jeremiah was a prophet of the Lord who told him he should not marry and have children. He prophesied for the Lord and the priest had him beaten for it. Imagine being beaten for doing what God told you to do. He was rejected by the very people God told him to prophesy to. His mistreatment led him to curse the man who told his father he would have Jeremiah as a son. "Cursed be the man who brought my father the news, who made him very glad, saying, 'A child is born to you, a son." Jer. 20:14. He asked, "Why did I ever come out of the womb to see trouble and sorrow and to end my days in shame?" 20:18. This complaint was before they lowered him into a cistern that had no water but plenty of mud. There is no reward for complaining. Have you ever been rejected for doing the right thing? How about being lowered into a cistern? Are you having a bad day? Well, read on.

What can be said about the abuse our Lord endured? Rejected, cursed, lied about, beaten and crucified by His own people whom He created and loved. Many people on earth have been abused in so many horrible ways and some in ways beyond description. However, no one has been less deserving of it than our Savior. He came to save us from the penalty of sin. He himself never sinned, yet He was treated as an enemy. Why? This world is filled with evil, and ignorance that everyone has had some sort of mistreatment and we ourselves have hurt others in ways we may never know...due to our own ignorance. So, what can we learn from all of this. I believe the words recorded in Jeremiah where God spoke to him: "For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord. Plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future," Jer. 29:11.

God has plans for everyone but not necessarily as a prophet as was Jeremiah. He has plans for all of us to prosper, though perhaps not materially, but spiritually. He does not want to harm us, but others may, and with permission by the fact they, as do we, have a free will. Knowing God has plans for us gives us hope, and a great future planned beyond this life. God does not look simply at the "now" but sees through the eyes of eternity.

In the garden Jesus remarked, "My soul is overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death. He said to them (disciples) Stay here and keep watch. Going a little farther, he fell to the ground and prayed that if possible the hour might pass from him. Abba, Father, he said, everything is possible for you. Take this cup from me. Yet not what I will but what you will," Mark 14:34-36. God's Son was overwhelmed with sorrow and wished that there was an easier way. He acknowledged that with the Father all things were possible. He could have called the whole thing off but did not because of His great love for us. If Jesus has not died for us we would have no hope and He wanted us to rest in the trust of our Father through the work Christ accomplished.

I don't know why bad things happen to good people, as well as why good things happen to bad people...that is not my business, nor yours. Our business is to know that the words God spoke to Jeremiah in Jer. 29:11 (above) apply to us as well. The Father's plans may be going through a temporary and painful struggle with hope. Thank God it is just temporary. People great and small go through these struggles, but His word still holds true. Hope he gives is solid; it is only our human frailties that are the problem and human facility is why He came.

THE UNIVERSAL FLOOD

The flood of Noah's day was universal, covering all the earth. He blotted out every living thing that was on the face of the ground, man and animal and creeping things and birds of the heavens. They were blotted out from the earth. Only Noah was left and those who were with him in the ark," (verses 22-23. This surely describes a universal flood, not local waters as some non-believers claim. Further, the universal view best explains the worldwide distribution of diluvia deposits. universal flood would also explain the sudden death of many wooly mammoths frozen in Alaska and Siberian ice. Investigation shows that these animals died suddenly by choking or drowning and not by freezing.

Finally, more than 270 universal flood legends exist among people of various religions and cultural backgrounds all over the world. These people attribute the descent of all races to Noah. The evidence for a universal flood in Noah's day is substantial and convincing to those who have not been brain-washed by the enemies of Scripture.
