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ARE YOU AN INFANT IN CHRIST?

Immaturity personified: A forty year old married man told his friends at work, "My wife walked in the bathroom unannounced and sank all my boats. I'm thinking about telling her mom on her." Does that sound too ridiculous to be true? Well, yes, but read what the Apostle Paul wrote to some Christians about their level of immaturity.

He called them "infants in Christ," that feed on "milk," that they were "worldly." As evidence he wrote they were jealous, quarrelsome and acting like "mere men." The last remark inferred they were only living like a child who is only interested in their own being. In other words, like animals, only acting on emotion rather than rational beings.

All of this is in the third chapter of the First Corinthian letter. Paul drew the difference in three levels of being: the lost he listed as those without the Spirit, the immature, and the mature. We all know the lost are those outside of Christ or simply those *"without the Spirit."* So I want to address only the last two which he called the "worldly" and the "spiritual." The first he also called infants, or in some versions they are referred to as carnal, the second or spiritual he called mature, 1 Cor. 3:1ff. The spiritual were those who had advanced in Christian growth. They were the ones learning, growing, and doing service for the Master. But Paul's greatest concern was for those he referred to as "infants" or "worldly."

He referred to both groups as "brothers" but included the women as well. Much as we do when we speak of the "brotherhood" we refer to both genders.

From that reference on there was a vast difference between the infants and the mature. For example the one was spiritual minded, the other "men of flesh," the first were "mature" and the latter "babe" or "infants." The mature were eating solid food (deeper scriptural meaning) while the babes were still on milk, weren't sufficiently advancing in the Word majoring on simplest truths. He told them, "You need milk, not solid food. Anyone who lives on milk being still an infant is not acquainted with the teaching about righteousness. But solid food is for the mature, who by constant use have trained themselves to distinguish good from evil," Heb. 5:13-14. If we grow "Then we will no longer be infants, tossed back and forth by the waves, and blown here and there by every wind of teaching by the cunning and craftiness of men in their deceitful scheming," Eph. 4:14.

> Signs of infant Christians are (1) Concerns for the physical more than spiritual, (2) Constantly feeding on simple truths

rather than deep truth about righteousness, (3) Jealously concerned about what others do or don't do, (4) Quarrelling with others, and (5)

Easily led astray by the cunning and craftiness of false teachers, usually by some "new things."

On the other hand the mature saw themselves as nothing with nothing to quarrel about. This is revealed when we compare ourselves with others.

The mature see themselves as simply "fellow laborers," too busy to quarrel with others about their status in the Kingdom. The mature are servants with assigned tasks while the immature acted like "mere men" only interested in themselves. What a contrast!

We all need to grow up spiritual. Paul also wrote in the same letter "When I was a child, I talked like a child I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child. When I became a man I put childish ways behind me," 1 Cor. 13:11. "Therefore let us leave the elementary teachings about Christ and go on to the maturity, not laying again the foundations of repentance from acts that lead to death, and of faith in God, instructions about baptism, the laying on hands, the resurrections of the dead, and eternal judgment," Heb. 6:1-2.

These are all very important but they should have been settled long ago. Most of them should have been established before these are truths which led us to our baptism. Maturing in righteousness is the obvious first step <u>after</u> our conversion, learning more truths concerning things such as suffering for Christ, endurance, character and hope, Rom. 5:3-4. These are areas in which we all must grow.

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the place to begin maturing is reminding ourselves daily that the only way we can improve the world around us is to begin with self. As did Job in 13:23 *"How many wrongs and sins have I committed?" Show me my offenses and my sin."* That would be a wonderful start, but that is only a start

David asked "Test me, O Lord, and try me, examine my heart and my mind," Psa. 26:2. Both David and Job were only men, but David's sinful ways displayed for others to see down through the ages, and Job's suffering was beyond anything we will ever have to endure and stands as examples for all time.

David asked God "Search me, O God, and know my heart; test me and know my anxious thoughts. See if there is any offensive way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting," Psalm 139:23-24.

We all know, or at least should know, that every relationship, and congregation has its problems. In light of this and the scriptural admonition, we need to ask ourselves if we are part of a problem or part of the solution to problems. Maturing will help us always ask ourselves such things.

After self-examination we are able to move to the next step. In Matthew 22:37-40 Jesus tells His disciple that second only to loving the Lord with all of their heart, soul and mind was "...like it: Love your neighbor as yourself. All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments."

The mature Christian never blames others for their own failures. We can be faithful to God even when others are bad examples and display discouraging attitudes. God will not allow us to be tempted beyond what we can bear...so don't blame others as the famous counselor, Carl Rogers, encourages. We are believers in God not men.

Maturity in Christ will brighten your day as it allows you to be happy as you ignore distractions, insults, and things meant to discourage. Christian maturity can possibly stop the tongue of someone in the world because you give them nothing to criticize, legitimately. It will also encourage others to do the same thing.

We have influence even if we are not aware of it. To the world you might be one person, but to one person you might be the world.

As the comedian from Canada, Red Greene often says, "Remember we are all in this together so keep your stick on the ice." Since Christianity is more important than hockey, keep your mind on Christ.

DON'T DROWN IN A MUD PUDDLE

A godly man who was talking about the spirituality of life said, "If you're going to drown, don't do it in a mud puddle." Both men allowed little problems to cause them to spiritually "drown in a mud puddle."

How about you and the way you handle rebuffs, grief, and irritations that are common to all? Be careful of the little "mud puddles" that are in the lives of all of us.

Three elderly gentlemen were talking about what their grandchildren would be saying about them in fifty years. The first said, "I would like my grandchildren to say, 'He was great fun to be with." Fifty years from now it doesn't concern me what people will be saying about me, what my greatest concern is what the people say about me now. An even greater concern to me is what the world is saying about Christians today. In order to know if a person is a Christian in our society you almost have to have a program, such as at a ballgame. I often wonder if the world is looking at Christianity and scratching or shaking their head saying, "who are these people anyway, and what are they doing? They have such diversified beliefs, one group believes one way and another believes something different." The real alarming fact is that the world's question is a correct one.

That brings me to an issue that is problematic in the New Testament Church today. However, this matter is not new. It began around the 1800's or The issue is **BIBLICAL** perhaps before. LIBERALISM. This problem has been destroying the credibility of the Church for years. The dictionary defines "liberal" several ways, but I want concentrate on only one of them: to "BROADMINDED - Especially not bound by authoritarianism, orthodoxy, or traditional forms such as: One who is open-minded or not strict in the observation of orthodox, traditional or established forms or ways."

What does it mean to say that a person is a liberal, or to say that someone may be so described? The answer, as is often the case with, "it depends." "Liberal" shares a root with the word "liberty" and can mean anything from "generous" to "loose" not literal or strict, to "broad-minded." Politically, liberals and conservatives are against each other daily. For one it has taken on negative connotations when used in a political sense, and has been this way for years.

What does all this have to do with the Body of Christ? In modern Protestantism it emphasizes freedom from tradition and authority, the adjustment of religious beliefs to some scientific beginnings, and development of spiritual abilities. One definition of liberalist is, "a person who believes that government should be active in supporting social and political change." I believe some allow government to introduce changes in our churches that may be politically correct but are 100% contrary to the Bible.

Liberalism embraces the thought that everyone should be allowed to live with no restraints, viewing the Bible as just another good book with man as the authority. Conservatives believe in preserving biblical values literally. Liberalism sees the Bible as interpreted by secular science and modern thinking. It has no authority to them and the teaching of Jesus and the apostles should be taken with a grain of salt. After all, the Bible was written a long time ago and doesn't apply today. The social gospel is much more conducive to living in peace and with love.

However, man has sin and the penalty for sin is separation from God. But liberalism says "all we need is love, sweet love" and many have accepted this false teaching which results in the belief that: 1. The Bible is good but is full of error. It isn't Godbreathed and man has the right to choose what to follow. God is a god of love and it's alright if you believe some of the Word. (See 2 Timothy 3:16-17). 2. The virgin birth of Christ is a myth. (See Isaiah 7:14 and Luke Chapter 1) 3. Jesus didn't really die nor resurrect on the third day. (This contradicts all of the New Testament). 4. Hell is not real and man can achieve peace simply by being good and a loving neighbor. (See John 14:6). 5. The Bible is a good book but is just a book full of stories and there were no miracles. If there are no miracles then there is no Christianity. (See 1 Corinthians 15).

Biblical liberalism instructs people to pick and choose what they believe and what they "feel" is right while denying parts that just don't fit their way of thinking. Liberalism has infiltrated the church today by the teaching and preaching of men who want to make it appear that the Bible is relevant, credible and beneficial in <u>some</u> way, yet not the ultimate authority. As a result Christianity is being divided and Satan is having a hay day.

In closing may I encourage you to read 2 Timothy 3:16-17. Every word that makes up the Old and New Testaments is from God. The Father has given us His Word so we can be found faithful. We are not to alter or change God's Word to make ourselves feel good or to make our actions more politically correct. Faithfulness to God is what gets us to heaven. Revelation 2:10.

WHY?

TEXT: Romans 8:18-28

INTRO: Did you ever wonder why? What I mean is why bad things happen to good people or why good things happen to morally bad people. I think, even the most spiritual of us have asked this at some point. I had this question pop into my mind a lot when I was younger, but not now. Not even when suffering, death, and tragedy strike. The reason I don't question such things any more is due to the content of our text. Some translations have this section of the Book of Romans headed "Future Glory."

- 2. God has a purpose for all things
- 3. He is God in bad times as well as good

B. HARD TO SEE

- 4. It's not in us to direct our paths, Jeremiah 10:23

C. HIS PURPOSE IS

- 1. To keep man's soul from the pit, Job 33:28

- 3. With God bad things have good results, Rom. 5:3-6
- 4. Things, good and bad, can backfire without Him

II. SEE HIS HAND

<u>CONCLUSIONS:</u> Our text states "...all things work together for the good of those who love him and who have been called according to his purpose." Notice two "great qualifies:" 1. All will turn out for the good of those who LOVE HIM. "If a man loves me he will keep my words," John 14:23. 2. If we are called according to HIS PURPOSE. God loves us and asks us to just "get even with Him" and love Him back. But the second qualifier is that we yield our lives according to His purpose, not our own.

"For God did not call us to be impure, but to live a holy life. Therefore, he who rejects this instruction does not reject man but God, who gives you his Holy Spirit," 1 Thess. 4:7-8.

Worry and frustration is in reality a failure to trust God because He causes all things to work together for our good. Peter and Judas both sinned. Judas didn't see the good, Peter eventually did.

INTELLIGENT DESIGN

A couple of years ago my eldest son was visiting and I wanted him to view a DVD I had received, and for the life of me I can't remember from who. Anyway the conclusion of seven scientists, all claiming they were not practicing Christians concluded after and in-depth study of DNA that life came from "intelligent design." That is what the Bible teaches. An intelligent God designed us as intelligent human beings and has taught us through Scripture to act intelligently.

DNA is a nucleic acid that carries generic information in the cell that is capable of self-replication. The volume of information contained in DNA staggered their collective minds. A single human cell has enough information capacity to store the *Encyclopedia Britannica*, all 30 volumes, three or four times over.

Where did this information come from? Somebody (God) had to program that complex information into DNA. Just because we can name it ("DNA") does not mean we know all about it. When those scientists said they had concluded it was from "intelligent design," my son said, "What did they say?" He heard correctly.

The complex code in DNA requires the involvement of a super-intellect and the only candidate that fits the description is the God of the Bible.

BARN-a-book (a Barnabas Ministries study series)

A series of studies in encouragement by Denny Coburn Study Number One Hundred Seventeen – Claiming the Grace of God

Around 40 years ago, I met a gentleman from Hungary, named of Frank Kunsabo. At the time I was preaching for a new congregation and working in the local medical clinic. He was my counterpart working in the hospital and both the clinic and the hospital were housed in the same building sharing the same cafeteria. On one of my breaks and sitting alone at a table, I noticed this distinguished looking man who also sat by himself. After a short while one of the ladies near me asked if I knew the man. I replied that I didn't and she informed me that I talked to him often because we shared information on the phone daily. So I decided to introduce myself because he only knew my voice.

After a few introductory words I asked what he was reading. He said it was a book on reincarnation. I asked Frank rather bluntly, "You don't believe that stuff do you?" He laid the book closed on the table and replied in broken English, "No, not really, I was raised Roman Catholic, but know I need to search for truth." His reply gave me a great opening so I said, "Frank, I preach every Sunday at a congregation not far from here. I'd love it if you came to hear what I believe to be the truth." He indicated that he might, and I accepted that as "I probably won't but thanks." To my surprise and gladness he showed up with is wife.

He attended the following week and to my great joy he came forward for baptism. After his immersion as we stood before the congregation, I asked if he had anything to say. I will never forget his comment. He said, "Now I know what it is to be in a <u>state of grace</u>." He quickly grew in his understanding of the Bible, as I and others could see, he certainly did know what it was to be in a state of grace.

Many people have fallen into discouragement because they, unlike Frank, do not know or have forgotten the grace of God that not only saves us but also sustains us...even in bad times. There is no greater encouragement to the soul of a person than to know we are saved by the grace of God.

What does it mean to be "saved by grace?" Suppose you were a king in conflict with the king of a neighboring kingdom and he had you surrounded with an army many times more powerful than yours. Further imagine you were doomed to die. Both you and the other king knew it but then with a white flag of truce in his hand, the other king's son approached with a plan whereby you would not only be spared but also granted an honored place at his table. Now wouldn't you call that offer grace? Also ask yourself, "Wouldn't your seat at the table be considered a "state of grace"? Frank did. He trusted the message he heard and by faith obeyed that Gospel message.

Obedience is included in faith, but I do not agree that it follows that such logic makes every act of obedience necessary for salvation. There are acts of faith that we incorporate into our lives as we grow in grace. But, I have found that there are people who become discouraged because they have failed in some area. Read carefully the following illustration which distinguishes the difference between being saved by grace living a perfect life of grace.

If you wanted to enter a golf tournament you would find there were differences between the rules for entering the tournament than rules for playing the game of golf. Let's say two of the rules for entering the tournament were that you were to be a recognized pro, and have a sponsor. These are the basis to get into the tournament. Once in the game you break a rule that will not cost you the game, but will cost you a penalty. To equate baptism with *"praying without ceasing"* or never saying or doing something that is condemned in Scripture is ludicrous. There is a vast difference between being in grace and living graciously. The two should present in our lives but it is sad but true they do not always. Standing in grace and living a life of gracious living should go hand in hand...but they don't always

So, why do some people abandon their trust in the grace of God and become discouraged and wander from the faith? The problem is us, not God. A short study of the meaning of grace will answer the "Why question. The fact that the grace so freely given by our Father is not translated into gracious living is the cause for some to not "feel" they are standing in a state of grace. This is in the mind of His children not in the Father. The promise of the peace is not enjoyed by His grace because of our disobedience. "Grace" is not a word that is translated into "license." For example the grace God extended to Noah was predicated on him building the ark, Genesis 6:8. In that passage we are told, "By faith Noah, when warned about things not yet seen, in holy fear built an ark to save his family. By his faith he condemned the world and became heir of the righteousness that comes by faith." Faith must be demonstrated by our actions or it is dead faith, "As the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without deeds is dead," James 2:26.

The root word for "faith" is translated various ways in the Bible. For example it is translated "persuaded" 22 times, "trust" 8 times, "to have confidence" 7 times and "obey". Both the Greeks and Hebrew understood faith to mean both trust in God and obeying God. In the Hebrew letter the third chapter is an illustration of this truth. In verse 18 and 19 we read "*And to whom did God swear that they would never enter his rest if not to those who <u>disobeyed</u>? So we see that they were not able to enter because of their <u>unbelief</u>." The word translated "disobeyed" is the same word translated "unbelief." Why, because the one is inferred by the other.*

When we fail to live up to the high calling in Christ Jesus, we "feel" abandoned by God. The fact is that we have abandoned God and internally we sense the loss of joy and peace and that causes us to lose hope. The loss of hope is often devastating and we do not "feel" we stand in a state of grace. As Roger Chambers so eloquently pointed out, we are saved in the mind of God...not our mind.

In Galatians 5:7 Paul asked **"You were running a good race. Who cut in on you and kept you from obeying the truth?"** Often the answer to that question is "it was I, myself that caused me to not obey the truth.

We must drum it into our heart and mind that we are SAVED BY GRACE. Trust in the grace of God can be short circuited in our thinking. It is not grace that is short circuited but our thinking.

Everyone experiences disappoint or sadness to some degree, sometimes because of circumstances or just something in ourselves. In Psalm 13 David demonstrated what it means to trust God in tough times. Feeling forgotten, forsaken, sorrowful, and subdued, David cried out to God for illumination of the grace of God. He asked God how long the Lord would forget him, and how long would the Lord hide his face from him? He concluded with the words, "But I have trusted in your steadfast love; in my heart shall rejoice in your salvation. I will sing to the Lord because he has dealt bountifully with me," Psa. 13:5-6.

It is the opinion of every writer of the New Testament, all inspired by the Holy Spirit to write the truth as God has revealed the truth that we can't save ourselves and must be saved by grace. The free gift is grace. Our acceptance is by faith. *"For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith and not from yourselves, it is the gift of God not by works, so that no one can boast,"* Eph. 2:8-9. A careful reading of this passage will reveal that the gift is "grace" received by faith (which carries with it obedience). The gift is not faith, the gift is grace and we receive it by faith.

If you "feel" you have lost your standing, examine your faith revealed by your behavior. If you think you are not standing in grace, the cure is in you, not God. He wants you to KNOW you are loved and He extends grace daily.

LEARN ING with Larry

Our English word "liberty" comes from the Greek word ελεψτηερια (ELEYTGERIA). It is found in Gal. 5:1 "It is for freedom (liberty) that Christ has set us free. Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again by a yoke of slavery." This Greek word is also used in verse 13, "You, my brothers, were called to be free. But do not use your freedom (liberty) to indulge the sinful nature; rather, serve one another in love."

We choose in Christ to either be slaves to sin or righteousness. In Romans 6:20-23 Paul writes: "When you were slaves to sin you were free from the control of righteousness. What benefit did you reap at that time from the things you are not ashamed of? Those things result in death! But now that you have been set free from sin and have become slaves of God, the benefit you reap leads to holiness, and the result is eternal life. For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord."

In this passage the Greek word for freedom is the adjective ELEYTGERIA. This means that in Christ we get to choose to be free from sin, death and hell, or to be slaves to those things that lead us to eternal separation from God or be unseparated from God for all eternity. I am blessed to receive the FREE gift of eternal life in Christ!
