Guruji's lineage traces back to Ustad Khadim Hussain Khan, Kallan Khan, and Ustad Ghagghe Khudabaksh, the founder of Khayal in the Agra Gharana.

I hold a Ph.D. in Music from the University of Mumbai. My doctoral research, titled "The Literary & Musical Aspects of Ancient & Modern Bandishes of Khayal Gayan in Agra Gharana: An Analytical Study", explores the aesthetics of the Gayki of Agra Gharana.
