S'EDAV VA'AKI Museum (Pueblo Grande Museum) is an archaeological site once inhabited by the Hohokam culture, just east of downtown Phoenix, next to Sky Harbor International Airport. It's a National Historic Landmark and Phoenix Point of Pride accessible by the Sky Train and the Light Rail.

It was part of the City of Phoenix Parks and Recreation Department since 1929, but is now Arts & Culture. It's the largest preserved archaeological site in Phoenix.

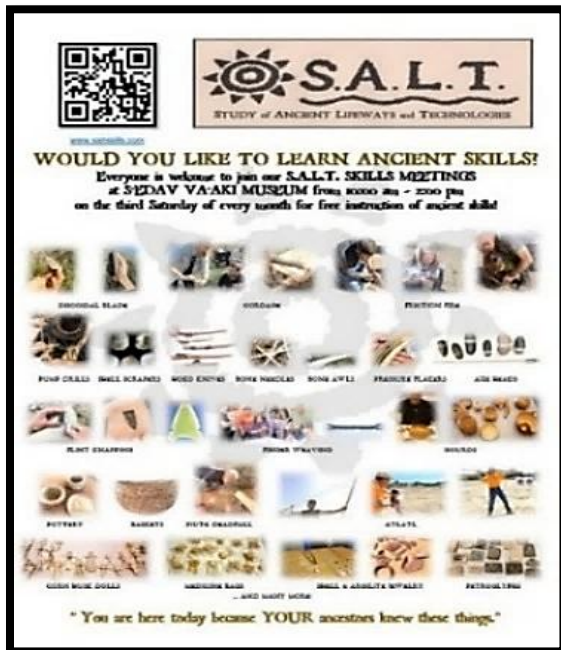

SAGUARO BOOTS

In the Sonoran Desert, birds such as woodpeckers and cactus wrens are known to nest inside of saguaros. When these animals carve out cavities inside of a saguaro, the cactus responds by forming hard tissue that functions as a scar or callus. Then, when a saguaro dies, the scar tissue also known as a saguaro boot remains. Swipe through the photos to see how a saguaro boot forms!

SOAP STONE PENDANTS & BEADS by Bill Warner

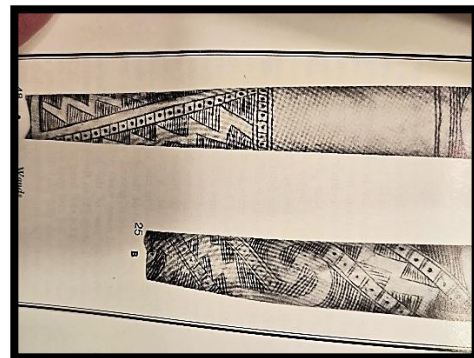
As an update on the soapstone bead & pendant potential project for a future SALT meeting--made from soapstone from Harbor Freight--here are some local artifacts from near Heber-Overgaard shown to us by Brock Stephens at the "Knap-in in the Pines" on the Rim earlier this week. Note the dark soapstone beads in various stages of manufacture, as well as the light-colored soapstone beads, especially the effigy dove. This sized project could be made from the Harbor Freight soapstone of similar color!!



After this photo was taken, I simply rubbed the piece with some cloth (the back of my knapping glove) and it polished up quickly, removing most of the fine scratches. The eye hole was drilled with the flake on the right, a flat surface of which was used to get an intermediate "sanding" before the polish. The dacite spall on the left is about like 200 grit sandpaper and was used for the rough work (note all the white talc that came off the soapstone) ...anyway, VERY easy to work material!!



Making some soapstone beads using rock on rock to drill holes/ score snap lines, and it suddenly clicked in my mind that I knew that pattern...I think I know the origin of a decoration element that shows up across the upper 2/3 of AZ in prehistoric, decorated items. Here's a pottery label and a couple ceremonial engraved bone "wands" as examples!

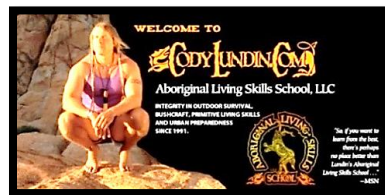

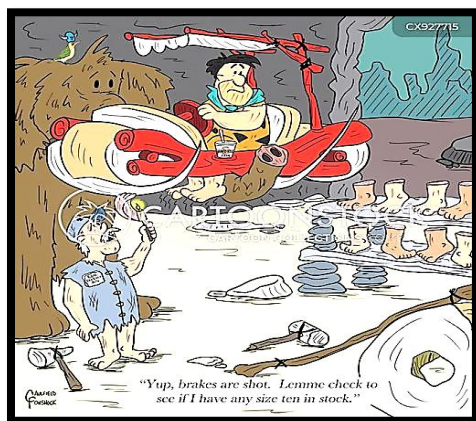
