

Through the understanding and mastery of these skills, people find that they can connect not only to a simpler way of living life but also to the roots of their heritage and to a pathway to interact more deeply with the natural world.

We provide a camp with some of the best instructors in their fields, teaching what they have learned through experience, experimentation and through source materials. Some of the instructors have spent many years perfecting their crafts. Some have managed archeological sites while others have lived deeply among the wild places, hunting, raising their own food and making their own clothing and tools from the most basic elements. 
How did the Indigenous people pass along their history and beliefs for thousands of years before they had a written language?

We will be looking at several ways this was done, going in depth into how the O'odham did it, and how the people of the Great Plains area of North America did it. Their methods were very different and yet they shared some common aspects. Part of the presentation will include photos of what they used and will give details of exactly what the story was they were documenting.

At the end of the presentation everyone will get to begin recording their own history - without using writing - by making one of the items used by the Indigenous people to record their history.



We also had a table full of desserts. I made "Christmas Snowballs" which are my take on Russian Tea Balls - only a bit bigger. They are loaded with roasted walnuts and cinnamon then coated with powdered sugar with red and green sprinkles..

MUSICAL WHITE MAMMOTH GIFT EXCHANGE!



At the party we do a gift exchange where we play a game that determines what gift you are going to get of all the gifts brought in by the members. We all sit in a large circle. The wrapped gifts are passed round and round as music is playing. When the music stops, you open the gift that is then in your hand.





We like to have the gifts be something related to ancient technologies, etc. And preferably something you as a member of SALT actually had a hand in making.



I took a Damascus blade knife that I had customized the handle made from a Ram horn - and customized the knife's guard. That took some major grinding and shaping. I also made and decorated the sheath. It was leather with burnt in Native American style designs. Honestly, when I was done with the knife, I was tempted to keep it. But I didn't. Diane Wax wound up with the knife and she was VERY happy.



I got a necklace and earrings made by one of our talented SALT members. I was in awe when I opened the box. A necklace, and pierced earrings that each featured a hand-made projectile point of pink stone!

The workmanship was incredible! I knew as soon as I opened the box, I was giving them to Barb. She loves pink.



Some of the other gifts going around the circle included hand-made atlatls, pump drills, pottery, baskets, stone knife blades and spear points...Yes, we are that kind of group and proud of it. - Peter

HAFTING and KNAPPING with Bill Warner

Why I've really begun to appreciate the "rat-tail" hafting for hollow core wood handles, or in this case, a turkey bone handle to be. The right end of the bone will be cut off so the rat tail is captured into the handle, then hafted with pitch glue. The rat tail provides an anchor for "bottom of the point tip upward pressure" during cutting and exponentially strengthens the hafting. Also, really love the "confetti-in-blue-chalcedony" look of this rock-those lighter blotches are cross-sections of fossil Equisetum stem bases ("horse tail"-looks kind of like asparagus) at the edge of an early Miocene lake bed in central AZ.



It seems like knapping pretty rock is mostly disappointing as beautiful patterns disappear or diminish as the piece gets smaller during reduction from biface to preform to finished blade. The Martin Formation piece on the left shrunk to half and lost most of the bullseye rings because of a "crunchy" area during thinning, the other Martin biface on the right will likely lose its stripes in thinning, and the middle piece snapped in half because of my screw up...."it was so

gorgeous and big!".... 🐸. But finding that middle rock (from my new central AZ spot) knaps well means I have an excuse to go back for more...so, "win!"




