





Peter at work...

I spent my Saturday morning at Pueblo Grande Museum with my friends in the SALT group. We are there the third Saturday of every month demonstrating some ancient technology or lifestyle to the visitors of the museum. The fun part is one member teaches and demonstrates and EVERYONE participates.

Today was Argillite Day. We all selected a piece of Argillite rock and spent a few hours using water, sandstone, and muscle power to shape the rock into whatever we wanted. Most of us made an ancient stye pendant for a necklace.

Turquoise and obsidian were valued by ancient people across the Southwest for thousands of years. Argillite was lesser known but equally valuable. In other parts of the country, it's called pipestone, and like its namesake suggests, is used for carving smoking pipes. It was also used to carve beads, pendants, bracelets, and effigies.

Argillite is made of compacted mud or clay, and in Arizona most argillite comes from deposits in a rock formation called Mazatzal Quartzite. This distinctive deposit of argillite was mined at least a thousand years ago near Prescott. The argillite mine near Prescott was the source of many ancient artifacts found in Arizona.

The argillite we used today came from those ancient mines. The process we used is relatively simple. Select your piece of argillite, envision what you want it to become, and then figure out how to continually wet it and rub it on a piece of wet sandstone until you have removed everything that is not what you envisioned. Your hand will get VERY tired of holding the pieces of rock (I got cramps in my hand) and your arm and shoulder will get VERY tired from the repetitive motions of rubbing the stone back and forth over the wet sandstone.



Did I mention it is VERY messy? It is VERY messy. Argillite is ancient mud that has hardened into a rock. Using the sandstone and water you effectively are turning the parts of it you don't want back into mud. Dark orange mud.

When we had the shape we wanted, we reverted to a "modern Indian" technique of using 1200 grit sandpaper to smooth the surface rather than the method of rubbing it on leather that would have been used in the past. Finally, it needed to be oiled. You can use two techniques.



The ancients would often use their own body oils from their nose and forehead to oil the stone. This imparts your spirit into the piece. Or, they used animal fats.

When I was done smoothing my piece, I used both my nose oil and forehead oil to make the piece shine. My spirit is now imparted into the pendant. After spending many minutes rubbing those oils into the piece I also used some bear fat. Yes, we had bear fat handy. Why wouldn't we? A few coats of bear fat also got rubbed into the piece.

So, a bear and I now inhabit the stone pendant which I will now turn into a necklace.

FYI the pipe in the photos is one I own made by Ray Redwing. Ray is Santee Sioux. He was born and raised in South Dakota and has taught pipe making at Pipestone National Monument in Minnesota for many years. — Peter Huegel

Scallop Fishermen Find Wooly Mammoth Tooth, Will Auction It to Help Support Ukrainians

The nearly seven-pound, foot-long fossil will fetch thousands to fund humanitarian relief efforts in Ukraine

The New England Fishmongers crew made an interesting archaeological discovery late last
December when they hauled in a large fossil while dredging for scallops off the coast of
Newburyport, Massachusetts. The fossil was later identified as a wooly mammoth tooth. The tooth
has been kept inside a restaurant in Maine for the last few months, but the Fishmongers crew has decided
to auction off the fossil and donate 100 percent of the proceeds to help with the ongoing humanitarian
crisis in Ukraine.

On Dec. 20, Capt. Asher Molyneaux and crew were dragging their nets off Plum Island near Newburyport when they brought the large, brown chunk aboard the Finlander II. Molyneaux first noticed the fossil while the crew was picking through a pile of shellfish, and he later told National Fisherman that he immediately recognized what it was.

"I looked back and saw what looked like some kind of arthropod stuffed into the pile," Molyneaux said. "I went back and grabbed it and said, 'That's a mammoth tooth.' I don't know how I knew that. I must have seen a picture somewhere."

Molyneaux and crew gave their discovery to Capt. Tim Rider, owner the Finlander II, who brought it to the University of New Hampshire. UNH Paleontologist William Clyde confirmed that it was a wooly mammoth molar, and although the university did not carbon date the fossil, Clyde estimates the tooth is somewhere between 10,000 and 15,000 years old.

Rider then took the ancient piece of New England history to his restaurant in Kittery, Maine, where it has stayed for the past few months. It wasn't until recently that Rider decided to auction off the fossil and use to aid humanitarian efforts in Ukraine.

The wooly mammoth molar is currently listed on Ehay, and the auction will close at noon EST on Sunday, March 13. At press time, the top bid was \$9,600.

Rider told NBC-10 Boston that he plans to donate all the proceeds from the auction to World Central Kitchen, a non-profit organization that is working to provide fresh meals for Ukrainian families and refugees. WCK currently has stations at eight border crossing across the country, along with additional locations in eight Ukrainian cities, including Odessa, Lviv, and Kyiv.

"If it makes several thousand dollars, that's good, it's going to help someone," Rider said. "Obviously, I can't solve the world's problems as a fisherman, but I can contribute to help the people that are suffering.



Green River Canoe

We will explore for river bank clay and learn about ancestral pottery skills, make stone tools with a variety of rock, harvest Tamarisk and Willow and learn some weaving techniques, and learn about the Canyonlands bio region flora and fauna. Participants bring their own food and cooler, tents, sleeping gear, dry bags, 5 gallon water container (per person), camp chairs. cooking stove, pot and pan, and eating dishes. Kitchen tables, group tarp, dish washing set up and "groover" buckets with t.p. and cleaners supplied. The tuition includes canoe rental. (Have your own canoe? Take \$100 off tuition if so.**)

We will meet at Green River State Park by 11am Wednesday, August 17th, load canoes, do a shuttle run, put a few miles" on down river" and camp at the Crystal Geyser.

On Monday, August 22nd, we will "take out" at Mineral Bottom and head back to Green River for a final dinner celebration, at Ray's Tavern, our river runner's tradition.
