


in English it is "Central Platform Mound."





RECONSTRUCTING ANCIENT POTS by Peter Huegel

Well, the project of trying to find a pot in a pile of broken sherds is coming close to an end. It was not what I had hoped for, but I was able to bring back to life a couple of ancient Native American pots. It also raised some questions because I ran into things I have never seen before.

Two of the pots – not complete but complete enough to label as a pot rather than a large sherd – look to have been made at the same time by the same person. The odd thing is BOTH pots are misshapen! Why would someone have purposely put all the work into gathering and processing the clay and shaping it into a pot that is purposely misshaped? The other oddity about BOTH pots is that they were both fired for WAY too long, or they were both in a major fire AFTER they were made. They are black clear through from inside to outside. At first the pieces looked like pieces of volcanic rock.

Two of the other pots are large plainware pots. They are nearly complete. Both have "smudged" interiors. Smudging is a process of blackening the interior of the pot to make it more waterproof. These pots were obviously made to hold some form of wet food or liquid.

A fifth pot – only about 50% complete – is going to be an additional challenge for me. It is going to require that I do something I have never done. I am going to attempt to fill in with a special plaster the missing pieces. On this pot it is necessary because the small place that connects the two sides is not strong enough to hold if the pot is handled by anyone.


There are still several groups of sherds that are probably from the same pots, but they do not connect to each other enough to say it is a "pot." BUMMER.





MINI EGYPTIAN BOW DRILL by Tom Wax

This goes to show that you can make fire with a very small Egyptian Style Bow-Drill. It fits in the palm of the hand where as a traditional type Bow-Drill would need a longer bow limb. This little Egyptian Bow-Drill will fit into a large pocket or small leather bag. The bow limb itself is only seven inches long with the cord length at six inches from end to end. I made two embers with this little Bow-Drill.


