





THE OLDEST INSTRUMENT IN THE WORLD Info from Peter Huegel



It's considered the oldest known musical instrument in the world and is was probably made by a Neanderthal.

Archaeologists unearthed the world's oldest known musical instrument in Slovenia – a flute crafted from the left thighbone of a young cave bear's femur bone, dating back 50,000-60,000 years. It is at least 10,000 years older than the earliest Aurignacian wind instruments discovered in German caves.

This remarkable Neanderthal creation features four precisely pierced holes and can still produce notes in a diatonic scale similar to modern musical scales.

It was found near the remains of a Neanderthal fire pit and is therefore thought to have been made by Neanderthals. The size and position of the holes on the flute are not thought to be accidental but were intentionally made for musical expression. The flute was played two-handed, with the fourth perforation used to extend the air column.

The discovery of this ancient instrument revolutionized our understanding of Neanderthal capabilities, proving they possessed sophisticated artistic and cultural expression. The flute now resides in the National Museum of Slovenia.

SOUTH DAKOTA 2025 "HOHUKAZUNTA" - RIB SLED Info from Ron Moses



Every part of the American Bison was used, nothing was wasted. The photo and description are from the Akt'a Lakota Museum in Chamberlain, South Dakota along the Missouri River. I recommend visiting the museum if you are ever traveling in the area.

A winter favorite for boys and girls. The hohukazunta is traditionally made of buffalo bone ribs. Half of the sled is made up of ribs from the left side and the half is made up of ribs from the right side of the buffalo. Elk rawhide is used to bind the ribs; chokecherry is used for the split sticks. A buffalo hide was placed on the sled before a child sat on it. Children liked to stand on the sled, hold onto the strap and slide downhill. Visit to learn more!" <u>https://bit.ly/3DR6UIP</u>"


SAGUARO NATIONAL PARK HIKE 1/26/25 by Tom & Diane Wax




