

White Rock Traditional Skills & Crafts Gathering Summer Lake, Oregon ~ May 4th - 10th, 2025 By Ron Moses

I recently returned from the White Rock Traditional Skills & Crafts Gathering held near Summer Lake, Oregon on May 4-10. The event organization and site location are very impressive, particularly when you consider that this is just the third year for this gathering. I met the organizers, Richard and Alicia Waters a few years ago, at Winter Count, and was invited to come and teach once they got their new gathering up and running. Their company makes and sells yurts which they also rent as temporary camping/housing solutions at events like Winter Count. White Rock is held at 4,500 feet in a high desert meadow kept green by artesian springs. The property is also part of a working cattle and sheep ranch.

Teaching yurts and shade clouds were all provided by the event. I also opted to sleep in a spacious (and furnished) Bell Tent with a real bed (Respect for elders!). There was also a very large yurt, called the Moroccan Club, which was heated, if needed, and used for activities like music, storytelling, or just relaxing.

- Making fishing hooks from deer second toe bones along with a complete hand line set. I learned this skill many years ago at my first ever Winter Count from a longtime friend, Thomas Robbins.
- Making a bone bladed knife from a split deer rib bone. This class is based on instructions by Stephen Watts and featured in the SPT Bulletins


