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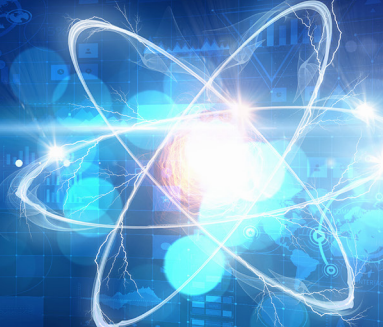
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the CMA President, Christian Amato, attended our most recent Executive Committee winter meeting in person and offered us sound strategic advice.

There are many, what I would call, routine operational activities going on. Many of us, including myself, have not been too pleased with the user interface of the Prolydian website for renewing our certifications, etc. Your comments have been heard and acknowledged. Please be patient while the fixes are made to make the site and the recertification experience more intuitive and user-friendly.

Online courses offered by AAHP have been popular. These will continue, but the Professional Development Committee could benefit from your feedback as to what courses you need or which speakers you want to hear from. Perhaps you have courses you want to offer. We are also starting a series of blogs and videos that would cater to potential exam candidates to help them study more effectively and become better test-takers. (I am very excited to hear that the HPS Society Support Committee is in the process of organizing study sessions as well. AAHP will offer CHP mentors to help with those HPS efforts.)

Our exam proctors play a crucial role in our certification process. AAHP will strive, beginning this year, to better express our appreciation to our exam proctors in a tangible way.

There are many other operational activities that ultimately will benefit our CHP community. But I would like to use the rest of my space in this column to talk about some big-picture items.

Since its inception, AAHP has enjoyed a symbiotic relationship with the Health Physics Society. The comfort afforded by that relationship, in some ways, prevented AAHP from critically evaluating its long-term strategic goals. Many things have changed in the last 40 years since the inception of AAHP/ABHP, from the landscape of the health physics profession to the Academy's relationship with HPS. Last year, I asked: What should be the vision of AAHP/ABHP? Looking back at the impetus for creating the certification process, I think the vision was (and continues to be) that all health physicists in professional practice should be certified health physicists. Obviously, that's not presently the case. We need to focus on health physicists who certainly qualify to take the step toward certification, but they have not done so yet. We need to help organize study sessions and offer resources and mentorship to those health physicists. There is a task group composed of AAHP and ABHP colleagues who are working on several initiatives, including the possible expansion of the associate membership category.

I also think that certification by the American Board of Health Physics has appeal to the international HP community. We already have a few dozen international CHPs. It would be helpful to invite international CHPs to engage more and be more involved in the operation of AAHP, as it is their right, as a CHP, to do so.

We should always remember that the purpose of creating the Academy was to provide the means for the CHP community to have input in the certification process. My plea to you is to please get involved, donate your time and energy to the

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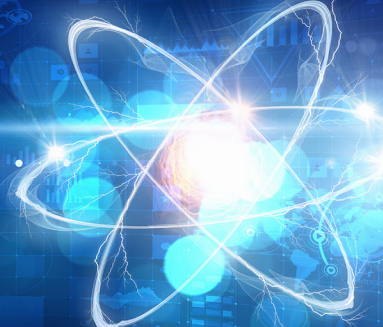
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Academy, bring your ideas, and participate in the process to grow the Academy and serve our profession.
