

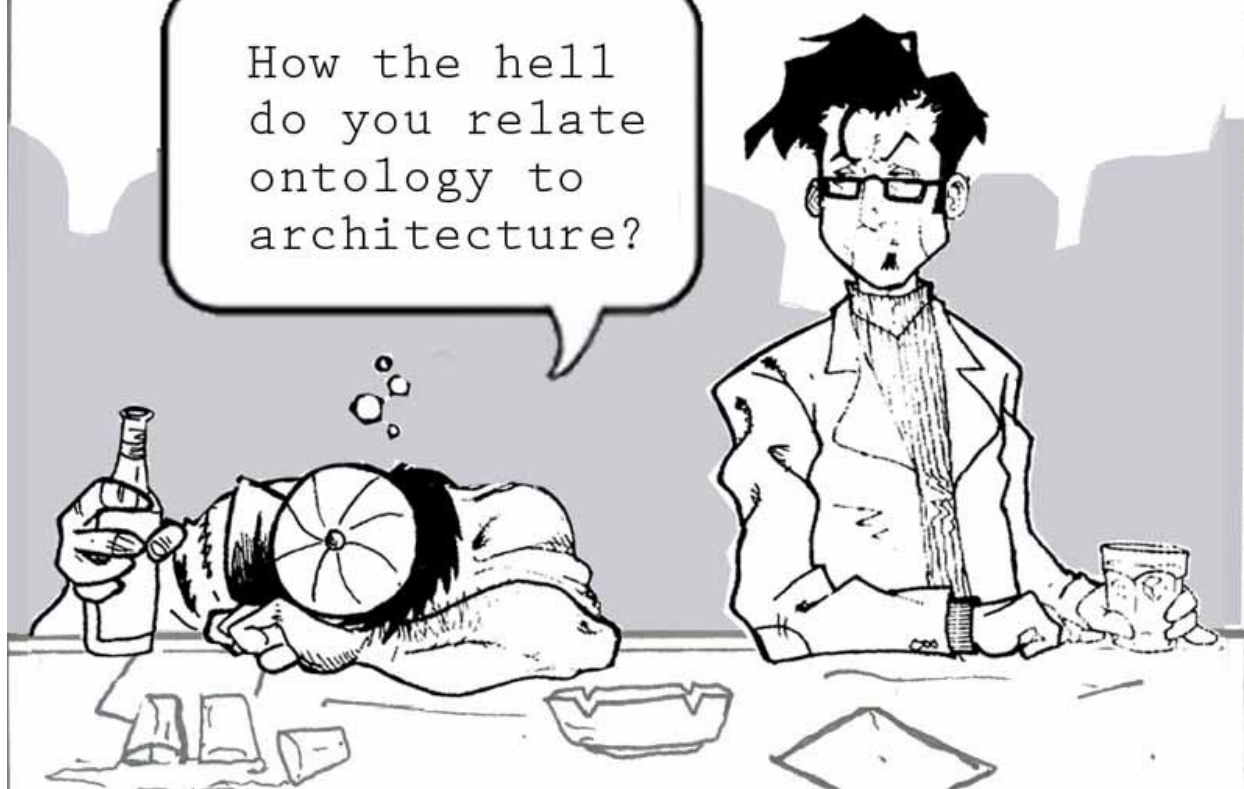


### **Ontology and Architecture (2001, 2006)**

Written during time in [Phillippe Barriere](#) 's studio at University of Kansas (see previous post) the following text was then revised and re-issued in the form of comic book in grad school in [Winka Dubbledam](#)'s studio (2006) and then again revised and re-issued in comic strip format drawn by [Chris Booth](#).

In short this sums up the ridiculous analogies and approaches of misappropriating 1970's French philosophy by [Jacques Derrida](#) and [Gilles Deleuze](#) to architecture.

How the hell

Let the "building" do Deleuze's difference and repetition. Nietzsche's eternal return (becoming) establishes the instance at which Heidegger's non-being (problem and question) is simulacrum. This instance fractures the being from its concept of being. Within infinite potential time, time possessing form, this concept of being becomes that which the being attempts to eternally return to.



In this sense: "Repetition is a condition of action before it is a concept of reflection." -Deleuze.  
However, time as pure and empty form, actual infinity of time, smashes this circle of eternal return. It rids us of the myth originating within the act. Thus, the structure of being is deconstructed and that which returns is the "yet-to-come", the undeterminable.
